

A DOUBLE EXECUTION-O'SULL VAN'S "HAPPY FAREWELL."

Resinald Dann and Joseph O'S van, who were sentenced to death for the murder of Field-Marshal Sir Henry Wilson, were executed at Wandsorth Jail on Thursday morning last

When ner entered the cell of O'Sullivan the condemned man rose took a step forward, and submitted quietly to the grim but quick pinion cell nearby by the hangman's assistant. Both men were escorted simultaneously to the scaffold. A yard or two from the fatal spot they met. A slight smile of recognition and enpuragement passed across O'Sullivan's face and was returned by Dunn.

Long before the hour of executi a crowd began to assemble outside the jail. A special force of police were on duty. There was no disorder. The Leary, an Irishman living in London, and conductor of the Catholic Singing Guild, and leader of the Knights of the Blessed Sacrament. The mourners included the brothers and sisters of the condemned man. Men and wom en, and young girls knelt in prayer in a group around Layman.


