LOCAL AND PROVINCIAL.

COGNITION.—The Vancouver city council has adopted the Coquitlam water scheme.

FRONT SAN JUAN.—The steamer San Juan, arrived from San Juan at 8:30 o'clock last night with a cargo of chickens, hens, eggs and one horse. The San Juan has taken the place of the Lotus on this route, and is a larger and more capable vessel for the trade which is growing continually.

THE HARRIS MURDER.—The man Crawford, upon whose evidence mainly Freund and Lee were held for trial, attempted, says the Colonist, on Friday to leave Victoria, although bound over to appear at the approaching assizes. He was promptly arrested by Officer Morley's efficient assistants near the boundary line, within a few hours from the time he left Ladner's, and now lies in jail.

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THE BLOCKADE RAISED.

The Line Clear and Through Trains Running.

The Collected Mail Are All Forwarded From Victoria for the East.

Mr. H. Abbott, general superintendent, C. P. R., wired, The Colonist yesterday that the road was clear in the mountains and that regular trains would recommence running to-day. The postal authorities have accordingly arranged to forward all mail matter, and accordingly every letter and newspaper was forwarded by this morning's boat for Port Moody.

Other telegrams received confirm the statements that the line was once more clear of the snow. Mails will now arrive with regularity, as it is thought further serious slides will occur, and that train service, so far as the Pacific division is concerned, will now be interrupted.
