The vital objection of the president is to the twenty years suspension of immigration, which he construes as virtually prohibitory and therefore violative of the spirit, if not of the letter, of the negotiations upon which the

treaty was based and as a breach of national by Mr. Laurier, who strongly supported the bill on the ground that the governments of Ontario and the Dominion having enter-ed into an agreement to leave the matter to arbitration, this parliament was in honor commissioners on this point and counter propositions on the part of China to show that the understanding of the latter country in an agreement which was ulti-mately made was that immigration would be restricted for a reasonable period. 




