owing to the rough water. In the meantime Hosmer had bailed out his shell and pulled over the course to secure second money. Ross subsequently followed Hosmer's example and finished third. No time was taken.

The second race for four-cared working boats, distance three miles, was contested for by the Central No. 1, the Riversides and the Bradfords. The letter practically shandoned the race owing to the condition of the water. The Centrals won 125 mins.

The next race was for four-cared working boats, three miles, for prizes of \$250, \$150 and \$50. The competing creavs were the Columbia No. 1, the Central, the West End, which consisted of Teemer, Hosmer, McKay, John Bruin and the Ross-Lee crew of New York, comprising Ross, Lee, Plaisted and Blank.

This proved the only exciting race of the day, At first Columbia led, with the Centrals half a length behind, while the two other crews were laving a sharp brush at the outer edge of the course. For the first mile it was a pretty race. In that time Columbia's stroke had shipped an oar and thereby destroyed their prospects. The West End got the lead before the stake was turned and was an easy winner, with the Central crew second, the Ross-Lee crew third, and the Columbia last; time not given.


