The Superintendent Will Not Answer the Charge—The Trustees Part of the Amity.

The World had an interview with Superintendent Hamilton yesterday and asked him his opinion of the sewage water and Mr. Coghill's criticism of the condition of the pumping well.

The Superintendent said that he would make no statement except to the committee on waterworks, but intimated that he expected Mr. Coghill to put what he had said into writing.

"I did not say," Mr. Hood states in his affidavit, that the well was leaking like a bucket.

"Where you at his house on the night in question?"

"Yes, I was there, but I did not say that; he may have said so. While I was there he told me to get a specimen of water and show me the condition of affairs. He went to the well for this purpose and I heard the water running from the well with a greater force than I thought was possible."

"Mr. Coghill made his coffee dam as usual," said Mr. Hood, "and what he was unable to keep the water out of it."
