**DISCUSSING MULOOK'S CHARGES OF  
LAX CATTLE QUARANTINE**

His Amendment Voted Down by a Majority of 40—Col. Tisdale Anxious to Have the Erie Fishery Regulations Changed—Col. Powell Suspended by Major-General Herbert.

OTTAWA, July 4.—On motion to go into supply this afternoon Col. Tisdale brought up the question of the Lake Erie fisheries in which his constituents were deeply interested. In October, 1892, he proceeded, the department ordered the prohibition of all fishing in November. Against this arbitrary and unnecessary order he protested in the House of Commons. The Minister of the Interior, the order was suspended for that year. But he again found it necessary to protest against a renewal of the prohibitory order next year, and in the course of that letter urged the necessity for the fisheries to be put on a footing of equal footing with other fisheries. He pointed out the injustice of prohibiting fishing while the American fishermen were allowed to pursue their fishing operations within sight of the Canadian shore. The Minister's reply was that certain regulations on the lines suggested had been issued in regard to the use of seines, posts and gill nets, and that it was not intended to establish regulations for the protection of the fisheries to the detriment of the industry beyond those of recuperation.

Continuing the member for South Norfolk read a list of correspondence showing that he had persistently opposed interference with the operation of the fishermen. He had taken the trouble to compile a list of these and these showed that there was no necessity for curtailing the number of licenses. The American fishing boats were in the miles of water right in Canadian waters, although, thanks to the Minister, they had been largely excluded. The fact that last year's catch was as large as 1892 argues against it, and if the protest against American fishing was continued the result would surely justify the Minister in allowing the Canadian fishermen to carry on their business as usual.

Mr. C. H. Tupper defended his course. Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, in the course of his reply, said that as the month of November was an unusually stormy period for the compulsory observation of that month as a close season, he had declined to deal with it until the fishing season was completed. The hon. member had referred to the depositions committed in Canadian waters by fishermen from the United States. A firm which has turned over a million and a half dollars worth of groceries in a year forced to wind-up owing to the stringency of the times.

The World regrets exceedingly the report in circulation that one of the largest wholesale houses in the city is quietly liquidating. The firm of E. B. Blain & Co. have within a few years built up an enormous trade in groceries, and they are to be commended for their enterprise.

The success they met with was probably a little too rapid, and they, with other firms, were easily induced to put capital into outside issues, including the Port Arthur, Duluth and Western Railway. It is said that the firm has lost \$1,000,000, which they met with heavy losses.

For the past few years the profits in groceries, as well as in other lines, have been gradually diminishing, and trade had to be extended to keep aggregate sales up to those of former years. This firm, according to reports of travelers and others, find it impossible to continue, and they are gradually selling off their stocks of general groceries.

Many other business firms have lately been reducing their staff and expenses, among those who have left the firm being R. E. Montgomery, their chief buyer, but it will probably be some months before they get rid of their large stocks of goods. It is said by some that the yearly turnover of E. B. After a long and animated discussion the resolution was adopted without dissent. The following resolution, moved by Hon. Mr. Satter and seconded by Hon. Mr. Fitzgerald (Tasmania), was also adopted after careful debate: "That this conference is of opinion that any provisions in existing treaties between Great Britain and any foreign power which prevents the self-governing dependencies of the Empire from entering into agreements of commercial reciprocity with each other or with Great Britain should be removed."

A survey of the cable route. It was resolved on motion of Hon. Mr. Foster, seconded by Sir Henry Wrixon, Victoria: "That the Imperial Government be respectfully requested to undertake at the earliest possible moment and to prosecute with all possible speed a thorough survey of the proposed cable route between Canada and Australasia, the expense to be borne in equal proportions by Great Britain, Canada and the Australasian colonies."

The cable should extend to Cape Colony. It was moved by Sir Charles Mills, Cape of Good Hope, seconded by Sir Henry De Villiers, and resolved: "That it is in the interest of the Empire that the Imperial Government be requested to extend from Australasia to the Cape of Good Hope a cable for the purpose of securing the most direct communication between the Imperial and South African Governments for a survey of the latter route."

ALL LAMB WANTS RE-ELECTION AND CIVIC FIRE INSURANCE.

A Sub-Committee Endorses His Scheme, Which Will Go to the Executive, The Mayor, On Being Appealed To, Declines to Declare His Position On the Question.

The sub-committee of the Executive that has charge of the proposed municipal bureau of insurance met yesterday. Ald. Lamb presided; the other members present were Ald. Atkinson, Dana, Burns, Jolliffe, Graham and Frankland.

The supplementary report which was given in extenso in yesterday's World was read and discussed by the committee; also the letter of Mr. Robert Maclean which appeared in this paper's fortnight.

The chairman maintained that this letter of the secretary of Fire Underwriters confirmed him in the position he had taken re the insurance. "My own insurance on 23 cottages is for only \$700 insurance."

The effect insurance re-stated his position: "That the 40 different insurance companies doing business in Toronto have a combination to control the fire insurance for their own gain and profit, and that they have charged for insurance are fully fifty per cent. too high."

"In view of these facts we recommend that a committee be appointed by the Legislature to obtain power for a municipal bureau of insurance, and that the present bureau of insurance be abolished."

"That this committee have power to investigate the existing rates of fire insurance, and to recommend such changes as may be necessary."
