MUCH GOSSIP.

WHY CHAPLEAU DECLINED
RAILWAYS AND CANALS THE ONLY
PORTFOLIO ACCEPTABLE.

"One Cannot Tell What the Future May
Have in Reserve" is the significant re-
sponse of His Honor's lieutenant. That
the Banque du Peuple will become
Regarded as Certain.

Montreal, Que., Oct. 2.—Hon. J. A.
Chapleau arrived in the city late
last evening. His Honor refused
to speak to the press when he reached
the Windsor-pleading, but to-day
the Lieutenant-Governor gave out for pub-
lication a tremendously long recital of
his trip across the continent, but the
following is about all there is of in-
terest: "I may tell you that there is
no possible political significance in the
fact that I remained over at Ottawa,
where I enjoyed the well-known hospi-
tality of Sir A. P. Caron. As a witty
English Prime Minister has said, 'I
had to breakfast somewhere, and I
do not know a better place than with
my old friend, the Postmaster-Gen-
eral.'"

As a matter of fact, Mr. Chapleau
has said nothing, but your correspond-
ent learns from an intimate friend of
the Governor that His Honor has no
idea of re-entering public life at the
present time, although the same gen-
tleman adds, "one cannot tell what
the future has in reserve." Another
gentleman who passes to know almost
everything that goes on in the mind of
the Lieutenant-Governor says that
nothing less than the portfolio of Railways
and Canals would tempt Mr. Chapleau
to enter the Cabinet.

As an item of news it should be said
that the universal opinion in Montreal
is that at the present time Sir A. P.
Caron would like to see Chapleau re-
turn to public life, but that Hon. J. A.
Chapleau is strongly opposed. Sir

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THREE KILLED AT M.C.R. CROSSING
OF SIX ENRAGED PEOPLE IN A WAGON
THAT WAS KILLED AND ONE SERIOUSLY
INJURED.

Essex, Ont., Oct. 2.—William and
Thomas Mooney, aged 19 and 17 years,
respectively, and Dennis Burke, 21
years old, were instantly killed, and

boys' father, were badly injured at
the Michigan Central crossing here
this afternoon. The party were in a

drove on the tracks before they
saw the approaching express and the
train struck the wagon and it was

were struck on the head and were
badly mangled and cut. Ed. Mooney
and Miss Jones were thrown to one
side and were not injured. The boys

SIR PRINCEPOTE IN MONTRÉAL
His Visit to Ottawa, He Declares, is Not
an Ostentatious Display on a
Pleasure Trip.

Montreal, Que., Oct. 2.—Sir Julian
Pauchoote, British Minister at Wash-
ington, arrived here to-day accom-
panied by his secretary, Mr. J. H. G. G.
of the British Embassy. Sir Julian told
your correspondent that he was sim-
ply making a pleasure trip through
Canada. He had met Sir Mackenzie
Bowell and Sir C. Hubert Tupper and
was glad to see these gentlemen in
Ottawa, although the Minister had
no official business in this country. Sir
Julian regrets that his Excellency was
away, but all the stories about an
arranged meeting between the
British Minister and His Excellency
were unfounded.

GALES OF THE BRITISH COAST.
A Number of Disasters Reported from
the South and East.

London, Oct. 2.—Terrific gales pre-
vailing along the British coast are
causing a number of disasters. The
Russian barque "Letonia" is ashore
three miles from the Southport pier,
and the life-saving boat had the
greatest difficulty getting alongside of
her and rescuing her crew, owing to
the tremendous sea. The large steamer
"Bude" is ashore, and the crew were
rescued with the assistance of the
brig "Ketch." The "Ketch" was ashore
at Hircouk, and the crew were rescued
by two boatsmen. The boat, con-
sidered a wreck, was afterwards re-
covered and the crew were saved.
The schooner "Helen" was also wrecked
near the Somerset coast, and the crew
were rescued by the "Helen" and the
"Duck." Both crews reached land safe.

A number of tugs and other small
craft have foundered or been wrecked
along the Somerset coast, but no losses
of life are reported.

AN INDIGNATION MEETING.
HIS BODY TORN TO PIECES.
FRIGHTFUL ACCIDENT TO A GRAND
TRUNK BRAKEMAN.

John Cameron Run Over by an Express
Train at Unionville—One Arm and Leg
Cut Off; the Other Leg Stripped to the
Bone—His Body Badly Lacerated—Af-
fecting Scene at the Station.

John Cameron of 135 Tecumseh-street,
a brakeman on the G.T.R., was struck
at Unionville yesterday evening by No. 1
express from the east. The accident
occurred at 8:10.

Cameron was breaking on a freight
train which slowed up at the switch
to allow the express to pass. He is
supposed to have jumped off his train
backwards while unaware of the close-
ness of the coming train. He went un-
der the wheels of the engine and five
cars had passed over him before the
train stopped.

His left arm and left leg were cut
off, his body badly lacerated and the
flesh torn from his right leg from knee
to ankle.

All that was left of him was brought
to Toronto on the train which had torn
him to pieces. He died at 8:45 and was
carried into the western baggage
room, where he lay in a semi-conscious
condition for two hours.
