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#### TRADE AND COMMERCE.

Commercial Journal Office, Tuesday Morning, Jan. 29.

#### VICTORIA.

Business continues steady. A number of Eastern travellers are now doing the province in the interests of their houses. Local dry goods travellers will probably go on the road towards the end of February with spring samples. In the grocery and provision trade there is but little doing except furnishing the supplies for the sealing schooners. Some of the most enterprising jobbing houses report that although trade is quiet generally that their business will average up well with that of past years. Indeed, a well known travelling representative of a local wholesale firm has stated that after having given the subject considerable attention he feels justified in stating that trade m the agricultural districts of this province is very dull; in fact, the merchants are hard up for cash or collateral, while in the mining, fishing and fur trading sections cash or its equivalent appears to be plentiful, and the business men and traders of these parts meet their bills at maturity. From the mining districts the remittances are in gold dust, and from the traders, raw furs, both of which are readily converted into current coin. It is expected that considerable financing will have to be done by many in the trade for the 4th of February.

#### FRUITS AND VEGETABLES.

Potatoes are reported plentiful, in fact more offering than for which there is a profitable market. The California Fruit Grower says:

Under date of the 14th we have advices from the Riverside Fruit Exchange regarding the conditions prevailing in the South. During the first few days in the present month \$2 per box for Navels was the price, but owing to the difficulty of selecting well colored fruit thus early in the season, it was found necessary to advance the price to \$2.25 per box. The advance was to cover extra costs of getting good fruit selected from various parts of the tree, and from no disposition to cinch buyers. The demand for early shipments this season has been quite unusual, although actual shipments have thus far been unusually light.

The Exchange management take a very hopeful view of the situation, and now that they feel the strength and staying qualities of the Exchange can be no longer questioned, expect to realize good results to the orange growers throughout the southern section of the State.

#### GROCERIES AND PROVISIONS.

Eastern creamory butter is firmer. Liverpool coarse salt is quoted 50c. per ton lower. A local importing house cut cut the usual price to enable them to work off surplus stock, and their quotation was met by other importers. Coal oil is quoted 10c. per case lower. The sugar situation continues interesting. It is said by prominent men in the trade that the importation of refined German sugar here has not yet been a success. The German beet sugar is in 220 lb. bags, which are considered inconvenient by the trade, who have been accustomed to handling 100 lb. sacks. It is also stated that the quality is not as good as the B.C. refinery or China sugars now on the market: also, that the cost to importers and wholesalers is slightly higher than that of China granulated. The s.s. Sikh brought a new supply of Hong Kong granulated for R. P. Rithet & Co., Ltd., consisting of 125 tons, comprising 3,926 bags. The The report is current that the sugar refineries of the East, having been compelled to steadily lower their prices in order to compete with imported German beet sugars, are going to import German raws, and, by putting a superior refined beet sugar in the market, will endeavor to keep out the German refined. The B.C. Refinery are reported to have a large shipment of German raw en route, and will work in harmony with the other Canadian and American refiners to drive German refined sugar out of the American market.

#### B. C. FISHERIES,

An important resolution was the other day adopted by the Provincial Legislature on the subject of that most important interest-the fishing industry. We are all \* aware that our resources in the matter of food fishes are in no way properly understood. Sir Charles Tupper, who for so long a time endorsed the attitude of the omniscient Mr. Wilmot, has admitted that the information possessed by the department, which, one may remark, ought to have been well posted, amounts to very little, and experience having shown that unless we make our demands and insist upon their being complied with they will not be attended to, the only thing to be done was for the Provincial Legislature, armed with the authority of the people, to make its representations. The B.C. Board of Trade and in fact all the other commercial organizations of the Province having been treated with scant courtesy by the dealers in red tape by whom official positions are occupied at Ottawa, that which was necessary was for a representative body like the Legislature, which very possibly has the means of making its influence felt, to take up the matter.

It required the enterprise of Mr. Rithet to demonstrate what could be done at the outer dock, before the Dominion Government were able to realize that vessels of the the public handling of outward deepest draught could be brought been necessary for private enter-

submarine wealth. The process in connection with several other channels for development-notably that of mining-has been much the same. Outside capital and enterprise have among the first to demonstrate in almost every department what are our resources, and it is to a large extent in that way that our immense halibut banks have been prospected and connected with the Eastern markets. The Dominion Government ought long ago to have obtained and supplied more definite information in regard to our fishery capabilities, and if it had we are convinced that the substantial results would have before this fully compensated for throutlay involved in the investigation.

As we have said, it is only after persistent effort on her part that it is possible for British Columbia to get anything. We hope that nothing further in this particular will be required than the transmission to Ottawa of the demand formulated by Dr. Walkem that steps should be immediately taken to locate the various fishing banks, under the superintendence of a properly qualified person in a properly equipped vessel provided for the purpose, and that a thorough inquiry and report should be made of the different species of fish, commercially valuable, which may be found to inhabit British Columbia waters. It surely ought not to be necessary for us to continually represent the immense amount which we pay into the Dominion Treasury and the small pittances which are doled out to us from it.

Outward manifests are not to be available for examination by others than the officers of the customs department or the particular merchants concerned in each case.

#### THE CASH SYSTEM.

Among the advantages of the cash system in business it is said that whereas under existing conditions money is turned over on the average but six times a yearthe average of commercial credit being two months-were the business done for cash the circulation would be increased over eight times in actual practice. In addition there would be avoided interest discounts, bad debts, expenses and other charges, besides the vast amount of mental anxiety and loss involved in collections. Although there is plenty of money in the banks-more indeed than those institutions can in the meantime profitably and safely employthere is a very great shortage in the amount of the circulating medium, due, as we have often pointed out, to a vast number of people who are able to pay for what they buy, parchasing on credit, depositing their cash in the banks and drawing upon it the much reduced rate of interest that now obtains, but whose small percentage is largely due to their own niggardliness and lack of enterprise.

The monetary stringency, the reductions in the rate of interest on the other side, and, it is also true, the instability of the United States Tariff have all combined to reduce the earning power of both capital and labor and we have also suffered.

There is, however, this consolation for the people of Canada. Despite the fact of there having been what are described as hard times and that there has been a deficit as between the revenue and expenditure of the Dominion, it is worth noting that our trade has not fallen off as might have been expected; though from causes which are not within our control, being in countries other than Canada, our exports have decreased. We are and must be importers to a large extent owing to the fact that we do not and cannot produce a large variety of goods, the figures relating to whose importation give an increase of \$30,000 in her some idea of our purchasing power.

Comparing the years 1894 and 1890 we find that whereas during the last named year our imports amounted to \$112,765,584, they reached in 1894 \$113,094,783, an increase of \$329,199. 


