Finance and jnsurance Review.

## MONTREAL, JANUARY $3,1879$.

THE SUGAR IUUTIES.
It seems mobable that at the ensuing mecting of the lominion Board of Trade thero will be a full discussion of the dillicult but very important question of the sugar duties. It is hardly probable that in Canada, any more than in the United States, there will be a concurrence of opinion on the sulject between the im. porters and refiners. We noticed that the subject was discussed recently at Halifax, and that there was rather a strong feeling in faror of acl valorem cluties, which, it they could be faily assessen, have much to recommend them. It must be borne in mind that it is of the greatest importance in adjusting customs duties that all importers should bo placed on the same footing, and that there should be as little temptation to fraud as possible. In order to obtain the required revenue for sugar, and, under existing eircumstances, it may be assumed that it will be scarcely possible to abandon any portion of that revemue, it would reguire something like 50 per cent. ad valorem to be levied on that article. Now experience has proved that such arate as 50 per cent.
or evon a much lower one, is so great a tomptation to frudulent dealers, that they will be sure to evale. Whe duty not only to the loss of the revenue, but to that of the honest trader. The present combined mote is probably the best that can be adopied, but it is well worthy of consideration whether, before the Government conmits itself to any policy on the subject, it would not be advisable to ascertain what changes tho United States propose to make in their tarill on sugars. The subject has of late been occupying the attention of both importers and refiners in New York, and wide difterences of opinion seem to prevail. Moreover, the tendency ampens to be to admit suga's of a higher quality, according to the Dutch standard, at a lower mate than formerly. It was recommended very lately that the high duties should only be imposed on sugas above No. $16 \mathrm{D} . \mathrm{S}$, hub those tuties, it mush be oluserved, were prohibitory, and if Canadian relineries should be again encouraged, it, would seem to follow that the duties should be so regulated that the required revenve would be raised on sugars egual to and below No. 16. The sugar and iron duties are probably the most complicated of any that the (iovermment will have to consider.

IHE FUTURE OF CANAL 'IRAEELC.
The oflicial returns for the yem 1878 received at the prodtuce exchange of New York, from the auditor's oflice, show that the whole amount of freiglit carried on the canals of that state from the opening to the close of navigation was $5,170,52,2$ tons, against $4,055,963$ tons last year; being an increase of 214,850 tons. The whole amount of tolls received for same was $\$ 903,343.15$, and $\$ 880,190 \cdot 20$, respectively, being an increase of $S 113,146.95$ in toll receipts. The total miles boats cleared was, $8,431,002$, this year, against $7,019,615$ miles in 1877 . We camnot compare the increase of traftic of the camals of the state of New York in 1878 with the traftic on the canals of the Dominion for the same year, as the last oflicial return printed in 1878 gives only the tratfic of 1876. From other sources of information, and notably from the clecline already noted in the exports of cercals during this year, we may draw the conclusion that the increase in the states has had no corresponding advance in this country. But we look forward to the next season with high anticipations of increasing our western trade through the Welland canal, which has had its capacity largely extended. As vessels of heavy draft can now pass through without breaking bulk,
we expect that the grain and provision trade will be drawn in the direction of the St. Lawrence as the shortest cut to Earope. In our high anticipations, we forget that a movenient is being made by the Legislature of the State of New York to so amend the constitution as to make the state canals practically free to commerce by abolishing tolls. This idea Jats been gathering strength all along the line of the canal, and, from prosent indications, it is certain that the question will overbop all others at the appoading session of the Legishature.

Were this movement to succeed, is this country in a position to follow the example and to entirely abolish tolls on Cama. dim canals? The estimated expenses for enluging the Wolland and st. Lawrence canals and deepening the bed of the 5 th. Lawrence river is $830,300,000$; of this amomb there is work under contract for sla, Sbo, out ; and, if the cosi of these improvements is not borne by the commerce which is benelited by them, it must fall upon olher interests within the comentry.

A comparison between the arerage freight from Chicago on wheat and corn to New York and to Nontreal in 1877 establishes the fice that the advankage is allearly in fivor of New York, according to the report of the New York Produce Exchange.

According to this table, the freight has been for wheat per bushel, IJ 24 cents, near. ly 114 cents, from Chicago to Now York, and $11 \cdot 35$, about $11 \frac{3}{8}$ cents, to Monbrents and for com 9.83 cents per bushel from Chicago to New York and $9 \% 0$ cents to Montreal. The abolition of tolls on the canals of both combtries would be to the advantage of the party having the heaviest foll mate. The tolls on property on the New York canals have been, by the necessities of trade, reduced from four mills to one mill per 1,000 lbs. per nile, the latter being
the prosent rate on graih, or sixty-nine cents per ton for tolls through the Erie canal. The tolls on the Welland canal, including the right to pass the ofler canal free, are ten cents per 1,000 lus, or six mills on wheatand five mills amd six-tenths on corn per bushel. Evidently were boh countries to abolish the tolls on their canals, the advantage would be greatly in favor of the State of New Yolk, ats the ligher rate of tolls would cause, by the abolition, a larger reduction on the freight.

Is the total and uncouditional abolition of the toll systema possibility ? :uny turitation tombling to lowor the tolls so as simply to enver the actual expenses mishtisuceed, but what is now proposod goces mom lutther and would hing turon the genemal community charges that justly slonk be bono by the commeree which is henefited by the use of the eamals. In He state of New Yoik, the actual ammmt of tolls is burully sullieient to cover the expenses of ordinary repaip. The so-abled conslitutional canals, which eamot be disposed of at the preşent rate of tolls, show a surplus of receipts upon expenses of 8230,0000 on the Drie canal and a deficiency of $\$ 113,505$ on the Champlain, Oswego and Cayuga canals, leaving a net protit of opemting these cmals of sildsest. 'live lational canals which may lie sold by the state, if any purchaser coud he fomm, leave a net loss in working of $=113,253$, cousequently the abolition of tolls in the state of New York is simply the assuming ly the commonity of heavy expenses that theretotore had been equally diviled among tho interested proties- hise Westem States as owners of the commolities mansporten, amb the prople of the state as cariers.

Ahe position of Canala, even in case of abolition ol the tolls, wand not be so much affected. We have only $6 S$ miles of camals in a high state of efliciency, boing all new or lately refiled; the State of New York, has 300 miles of the Erie Canal to keep in thowough repair at high cost-some Stion,000a year-and for many years the Cumal Commissioners have not earned to themselves a repulation for economy and foresight, while in this comntry no imputation of such a nature has ever been hinted at. Palizanship and political influences have happily nothing to do with public works on this side of the borders. In this there is another soutce of economy in the operating of our canals.

In conclusion, therefore, it is to be inferred that the abolition of tolls on the canals in the State of New York camnot take place without injuriously effecting general interests, and that the vedue-
tion of tolls to the mere covering of expenses could not alter the general mies, which are alrealy so low as to be sameely sullieient to pay the enst of working.

## CURIUUS DMSCLOSURES, No. .

woolden calrets.
Wroolens form one-clevently of the whole importation of Canada, and amount to $88,928,297$ for the fiscal year $1876-7$. A thorough investigation of the fighres combining to make so large a sum could not fail to brines to light many anomalies, were it unt for the lack of sufticient information in the Govermment Blue Books on this important part of our foreign supplies. In no country besides Camada conht so large in amount be disposed of in such an ofl-hand mamner. After enumerating the imports of woolens, blankets, carpets, fimmels, iweeds, wearing apparel, worsted and yarn, the Government reports contitin the following entry: "All obler [no designation, no quantity $]$, value, $S \pi, 804,-$ Sit? ; duty, sl, 015, $571.36:$ Very close on threedifths of the whole importation of woolens, and one-twelfth of the whole revenue derived from customs, are thus disposed of withont any record of the nature of the goods or their fuantily, amd with no means of asectaining the propor tion of the luty fo value. Gur held ol investigntion is consequently rembed, the more so as the $59-10,437$ worth of elothing or wenting apparel represent an umknown qumblity imported. However earpets exhibit swhicient proofs of the umdervaluation smad wath of uniformity in ap. praismment we have already pointed out in other articles.

Woollen cappets rre importen from Great Britainand the UnitedStates. The whole importation for the yeur miter review anmounted to $1,318,629$ yards, of a value of $\$ 698,319$, and the average value peryord, 5 sic. As nzual, we shall separate the English imporiation from the American, and exhibit the value in each Province of cappets from both countries:

Leaving the smaller provinces apart, the average of 60c. in New Brunswick, 58c. in Outario, and that of 48c. in Quebec are
inconsistent. The same qualities of goods are imported in the four Provinces:'Thpestry, Brussels, Axminster three-ply are in demand everywhere, mad every prominent retail store keops carpets of these tescriptions from $\$ 3.50$ to 75 c . a yarl. The price of 00 c . per yard is already very low when compared with English price lists, but the average of 4 sc . per yard in Quebec has only as corresponding figure in England, the atair-carpets, with figured borter, sold net at $z_{s}$. ld. per yurd, $5-8$ width. The annual report of the New York Chamber of Commerce for 1877 gives an averige value per yard to imported woollen eapets of s1.25.

In the live Provinees, the avemge value ol Ameriean mupels varies from 40 eents to 35 cents per yard. 'The Now Jork Dry Gomls lieporler and the New Yorlc Mercantile Jomrual, whose price lists of duy grods are doubthess correct, do not confain any quotation for enpols so low as those above. Bigelow, Hurforl, Joxbúry, Lowell, Grompton Cupet Companies, R. S. Tliggins \& Co., Rromey Brothers, have not in their calabogte nay gonds at such figures, and the Now lork Chamber of Commerce in their report give st as the arerage value of exported American carpets.

The lack of unifomity in the appraisement of merchandise we have shown to exist in so many cases, has before now been complaned of by the trade, without having eftected nuy reform. In the pro. ceedings of the fourth annual meeting of the Doninion Board of Trade, held at Ottawa in February, 187t, the dologates, by a resolution, called the attention of the Govermment to the system of examin. ing goods at the rarious ports of entry, and recommended that the same be as tiniform as possible. In the discussion on the motion, one of the formto dele. grates expressed himself as follows:"L ean only say, with regaid to my own experiance, thatsometimes thave acturlly sent gools by way of Montreal in order to get then entered at a lower rate of duty, or perhaps admitted free altogether. I had to do that in order to be able to
compete with Montreal dealers, because the rate in Toronto is much higher." It does not seen that this state of allins has experienced any change since the motion of February, ISTA, notwithstanding the alleged entry of goods at 'Joronto of the over exportations of Amerion firms at reduced invoice walues already treated of in our columns.

## GOVEDNMENP JOAN.

We noticed in a late number the suggestions made by some of our cont empor. aries that eflorts should he made by the Govemment to induce our own people to subscribe for the loans which it may from time to time require, aud which it was supposed would be successful. Wecalled attention to the fact that for several years an opportunity has been afforded io all disposed to lendmoney to the Govermment. to obtain Dominion 5 per cant stock, and we adduced a lite return which wo found in the Official Giazelle as evitence that the aggregate invested in such stock was only $y$ $\$ 199,900$. We have since ascertaned that the return on which we based our statement hat reference to the post ollice deposits alone, and did not comprise the amount translemed to the $\dot{\mathcal{U}}$ per cent. stock, which is managed by amolher department of the Government. The result. of further encuinies is that sinee the establishment of the tansfer system, there has been hansfored from the Jost Olhce Sivings lamk into Dondinion stock, $89,045,200$, upwards of one million of which has been releemed, being about $\$ 1,000,000$ at the credit of the investors. It is to be observed that, although we have used the term "Dommion Stock," which is the mame by which it is desigmated, it is not what is genemally under stood as stock, as the govemment redeem it on a notice of three months. We have thought it desirable to correct the error into which we had fallen from assuming that the Post Onice Savings Rank retum embraced all the money borrowed by the Govermment at 5 per cent., but the subsequent information only proves that the Govemment has oflered alleady the more liberal terms to Comadiam investors, and that they have availed themselves of the facilities oftered to them io the oxtont of over a million of dollats.

1.     - At a large and influential moting of the lictou, N.s., Dontrd of Trade, held the 27h ult, Messers. R. G. Haliburton, of Gttawa, amid. R. Noonan, of Picton, were elected delegntes 10 the Duminion Board. The Pieton Buard cordially upproved of Dr. Fortin's plan tor telegraphic commonication with the Gulf and ports of the Lower St. Lawrence.

## OS TLRE $n E E L N S U R A N C E$.

There are two points of view from which to look at the practice of lire re insurance, lirstly, as to the soumhess of the principle itself, and seondly, as to whether it is a desimble business. liegarding the prin. eiple we candidly confess our disapproval of it, for, although there may be exceptional instances (in large cities especially) whete a company, from certain arrangements, camot help becoming occasionally overerowded in its lines, and consepuenty as a matter of prutence seelis to relieve itself by re-insumane, it is these very exeeptions which prove the rule we wish to uphola, viz.: that re-insurance is only striolly legitimate from prutential motives, amb should not be indllged in as a means for securing of inereasing busi. ness. It is eviclent that by re-insurance a company assmmes an extra liabilidy, jhasmuch as it gumantees a groater amonnt. than it teems wise to entry, and virtually insumes the sum or sums it. phees in the re-insuring ollices. Our theory is that an nsturance compaly should only write what it means to retain, in which we are suslained by many of the best underwriters, and the same las been for the most part camied out on this sicle of the Ahantie so fitr, though we regret to observe that the desire to obtain the control of the business of large firms by some companies or their agents has begun of late to inerease the necessity for re-insumnce beyond the legitimatelimits we have named above. In Great Buitain, on the other hand, re-insurance for a long period has entered into the ordinary business of fire compmies, even those oflices that clisapprove of the principle having been forced to comply with it, and this difierence between the methods of the ohl and new worlds in this respeet arjes in agreat measure from the opposite characters of the inhabitants of each, and the circumstances surrounding them. In England there is almost a rooter antipa. thy to change, and, further, insurers have such perfeet confilence in the stability of their companies, some of whieh were inaugurated when fire insurnoe was in its infancy: that they see no just canse for divithar their risks, however lumo, unless, perhips, as a mattor of friontship, they give a share to more tham one company; still thes prefer to have the momber of their policies as small as possible, in order to save thouble in accomits, and it is not. at all uncommon for a merehant in dondon ay biverpool to hold a policy for 830,000 or $: 40,000(\$ 150,000$ or $\$ 200,000)$, aml even more, issued by a single oftice, leaving the latter to dispose of what it does not desire to hold. We deprecate
this system, but it has grown up with the business and would now be extremely dillicult to alter; and, while entering our protest agrinst what we believe to be an evil, we are willing to almit that to a certain extent good has come out of it, as it has helped to preserve the tanift by destroying much ol direet competition among the oflices. On this continent aflairs wear amother aspect, for here the people have not, as a mass, that objection to change commonly met with in the oh country; and agrin, insurers have been so aceustomed to see the disastrous termination of so many fire oflices that they only put a moderate amomet into any one company, and lience the oflices are not asked to accept the heavy lines so prevalent in England, and, consequently, do not recuite to re-insure to anything like the same extent.

We maintain that it is more in accord. ance with equity and sound business principles for a company only to take up the line on every risk which it considens safe to cony; and, procoeding to the second part of our sulyect, thero cm be no two opinions in our judgment, that if re-insurance is to be practised at all the only way in which it can be desimalle, or, in other words, be made to pay, is lou it to be reciprocal. It is but matural to sumpose that if office "A" wishes to secure good business from ofice " 13 " it must tender an equal proportion in retmm, otherwise " $B$ " will take its surplus lines elsewhere where it will roceive " quin pro ruo," unless indeed it unloads itself at "A's" expense of those risks which it does not care particularly about, and merely accepts as an inducement to obtain other first class business, not under the circumstances feeling bound to allow "A" to participate in this latter. That this should be so must be manifest to all who know any thing of mercantile matters, and it is for this reason that offices doing simply a re-insurance business in England hive not found the same satisfactory in its results. The "Tlome" of New York, one of tho strongest A merican companies, has recently decided, after ten years trial, to withdraw from the field, nothaving been able to ohtain a suticient amount of direct business to reciprocate in re-insurance, and, therefore, not finding the lation a success. Suprosing it were aranged by an insumance ollice (well managed and doing a prolitable business) to give a re insuring company a certain proportion of each and every risk taken by the former, then the two would prosper side by side, but this is not the case; the direct oflice can aud does carry all it can take on the very best property with per-
haps an isolated instance here and there, and every underwriter is aware that for a class of risks to pay you minst writo a number commensurate with the premiums charged, and the better the risk the lower the rate, and consequently the greater the number required to strike the average. One dwelling at is. $6 d$ per cent. would never reimburse a company, but 20,000 might, and thus the reador will perceive that re-insuring offices in the satme position as the "Home" receive only so few of the very choice hazards as to rm a great risk in proportion to the small amount of premium.

In conclusion, we are of opinion that it may be taken as an axiom in fire insurance that if a company is not strong enough, or has not suflicient interest, to secure business direct in a foreigu country, it hat better remain at home, for the restals of unreciprocal re-insumance will sooner or later be disappointing if not absolutely unprofitable.

## PRICES OF CANADIAN COTTOAS.

The following appears in the Dundas Irve Bamuer of tath ult., a cony of which has just reached us:
Oomberion-Sos appears that the oommal of Commere was incarrect in the stutement that the prices of cotton goods had been tecently raised. We do not get the fommat of Commerce, and took the extract which we mithlished from amother journal into which it hat been copied, and we did not see that the statement lised afterwamds been corvected to "reduced" instead of "increased." The fournol of Commerce is suppused to be the most relinhle tade joumal in the Dominion, and we gave the extmet becunse we supposed it to be entirely reliable. Hat the manaree of the Dundas Gotton Works combescended to make these facts kitown to us, they would have hatd a juace in our columns before this, and we now make the correction most cheerfully.

We do not know whence our contemporary derived his information as to the guotations published in this joumal, as we have not the pleasime of an exchange with him, but wherever obtained we beg to assure him that he is quite mistaken in crediting us with stating at any time during the past season "that cotion goods had been recently mised.: We quote for his beneft from our dry goods report, date October 3lst:
"Cotton goods are about. sto 10 per cont. lower in England, and our Ganadian mills are preprring to lower theirs in proportion, the $V$ alleyfiele baving already reduced 10 per cent. ${ }^{\text {H }}$-Journel of Commerce, Noo. 1 st, 1878.

We make no cloubt the sontce of the True Banucr"s information was the following extract from the Toronto Monctary Times of October 18th, under the head of "Toronto General Markets : "

It is reported that the cotton mannfactmors of the Cornwall; Hochelaga and lundas mills have recently adounced the price of grey eottons about $7 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent. and white cotions
about 10 per cent.- Monctary Times, Oct. IS $/$, 1878.

The True Banner will observe by the foregoing extracts that the shoe is on the wrong foot, that our Toronto contemporary is alone responsible for misleading the trade, - for the erroneous report with which we have been wongly charged, and we thetst our Dundas friend will see lit to give us due credit in the matter.

We are continually roceiving from our subscribers letters of thanks for the correet, uselul information. coniained in our market reports, stating they have saved more than five or six times the price of subscription in making a single purchase of goods. Whe prices of Cianadian coltons, which wo were the first to publish in Canadi, seem to be thoroughly appreciaterl by our readers ; and a Guchph subscriber informs us that he cleared some $\$-900$ on a purchase of sugar made on the strength of one of on reports.

## WHAT EDUCATION IS OF MOST VALUE.

We do not expeed to ginin the good will ame opinion of the teachers and puotessors in out sthools, colleges and aculemies, lity or clerical, by the articles we purpose publishing under this houd, as we shall be obliged to mon comter to the generally received, old established, and therefore respectable ideas upon the subject, the theory and practice, the chameter and method of the education nowdays imparted to our youth, preparatory to lannching thent upon the sea of life with its strugerles, its meertainties and frequent disappointments. If, howover, we succeed in set ting our readers a-thinking seriously upon the sulyjed (we address the protical business men of the country), and aid in directing public attention to the necessity for an early modification of ont educational system, which must be effected sooner or later in the direction of rendering it more practical, more suitable as a preparation for the duties of manhood, of eliminating what is useless from our collegiate courses, nubling them more jational, our etionts shall not be altogether in vain. In these articles we purpose availing otuselves of much that has ap. peared on the subject from time to time, in Jonding marames and reviews, opinions that have already borne fruit in other countries, in Europe, and to some extent in the United States.

In the order of nature, the ornamental precedes the useful. People often submit to great physical suftering for the salke of fashion, from the Orinoco Indian of Irumboldi, who, however averse to bodily labor, would sometimes work
for a formight together to purchase pigment wherewith to make himself admired, to the motern female who cultivates a wasp-like waist to the certain injury of her lungs, and whose bomet or hat is not wom lor protection from either heat or cold, for convenionce or conifort, much ats out extremos of climatem:y demand it. Colored beads or trinkels are more prized by wild tribes thin cottons or bromieloth, and the sume womian amons them who would not hesitate to leave her hut without a firg ment of clothing on, woukl not dare to commit such a breach of decoum as to go ont umpaintel. Even among ourselves the stermer sex think more about the fineness of tho fabric than its wamble, abont the ent thim the convenience.
'The like relations hold with the mind. 'lhat knowletge which conduces to personal well-being grives way to that which brings applause. In our schools and acarlemies this is especially the case. It sounds likeaphatibude tosay that duroughout his allter carece, a boy in nino cases out of ten applies his Latin ind Grook to no puctical purposes. In his shop or his ollice, in m-matring his business on his fanily, in performing his part as director of a biank or a milivity, lio is very litite aded by thits knowledge he took so many yeats to acquine, so lithe, that genemally the greator patt of it drops out of his memory; and il he occasionally vents a Latin quolation or alludes to somo Greek my hat is less to theow light on the topie in hand than for the sake of effect. If we inguire whit is the real motive for giving boys a classical chuention, we tind it to be simply conformity to public opinion. Mon dress their children's minds as they do their borlies, in the prevaiting fashion, and a boy's drilling in Latin and Greek is insisted on, not because of their intrinsic value, but that he may linve the "educa. tion of a gentleman," tho badgo marking a cortain social position and bringing a consequent respect. Not what knowledge is of most real worth, is the consideation, but what will bring most applause, honor, respect-what will most comituce to social position or infuencewhat will be most imposing. As throughout life, not what wo are, but what wo shall be thought, is the question; so in education the question is, not the intrinsic value of knowledge so much as its extrinsic eftects on ouners. With this dominant iden, direct utility is scarcely more considered than by the South Sea islander in tattooing his body. The compartive worths of different linds of knowledge hwe been as yet scrvcely even discussed. There is no standard of rela-
tive values upon the sulject, and the need of such a standard has scarcely been felt. We have, it is true, occasional remarks on the importance of this or the other class of information; but whether the clegree of its importunce justilies the expenditure of the time needed to acquire it, and whother there are not things of nore importance to which the lime might be better devolen, are querios which, if raised at all, we disposed of quito summarily accorting to personal predilections. Tho stamding controvensy respecting the comparalive merits of chassice and mathematies, is occasiomally revived. To suppose that deciding which of these is best, is deciting what is the proper course, is much the same thing as to suppose that the whole of dietetics lies in determining whether or nob bruth is moro nutitivo than potatues! The question which we conlend is of suel great moment is not whether such or stueh knowledge is of worth, but what is its relative worth. When they have named certain alvantages which a given course of staty hats sechred them, porsons are apt to think that they have justitiod themselves, quite forgething that the atequateness of the culvantage is the point to be judged.
There is, porhaps, not a subject to which men devote attention that has not some vuluc. A year diligently spent in getling up 'heraldy', would very possibly give a little further insight into ancient manners and morals, and into the origin of names. Any one who should leam the "distances between all the towns and villages in the Dominion might, in the course of his life, find one or two of the thousiand facts he had tequired of some shight service when antaging a joumey. No one would tolemte the proposal to devote sone yems of a boy's time to gelling such informa tion at the cost of much more valuable infomation which he might have aceruired. The time for aeguing an education is so limited not only by the shortness but the business of life that wo ought to be especially solicitous to employ what time we have to the greatest advantage. Before devoting years to some subject which fashion or lancy suefests it is surely important to woigh with great care the worth of the results ats compared with the worth of varions altemative resules which the sume years might hing otherwise. This then is the question of questions in education, how to decide among the contheting clains of various subjects on our attention, how to determine the relative values of the different kinds of knowledge.

With this view a measure of value is the first requisite, and respecting this as oxpressed in general terms there can be
no dispute. Every one, in contending for the worth of any particular order of information does so by showing its bearing upon somespart of life. In reply to the question, "Of what use is it?" the mathematician, linguist, naturalist or philosopher oxplains the way in which his learning beneficially influences action-saves from evil or secures good-conduces to happiness. When tho teacher of writing has pointed out how great an aid writing is to stuceess in business-hat is, to the obtainment of sustenance-unt is, to satisfactory living; he is held to have proved his case. Aud when the collector of dead facts (say a numismatisi) fails to make cletur any appreciato efleots which these facts cin produce on human welfare, he is obliged to atmit that they are comparatively valueless. All then, either diredty or by inyumation, apmeal to lhis as the ulthante test.

How to live?-hat is the essential fuestion for us. Not how to live in the mere material sense only, but in the wis. cst sense. The genemil problem, which comprehemls every special problem, isWhe right ruting of combue in all direstions umder atl circmustances. In what way to treat the body; in what way to treat the mind; in what way to manage our allairs; in what way to bring up a limily; in what way to behave as a citi. zen; in what way to utilize all those sources of happiness which nature sup. plies-how to use all our ficulties to the greatest adrantage of ourselves and others -how to live completely? And this being the great thing thing neellul for us to learn, is, by consequence, the great thing which otucation has to teach. 'To prepare us for complete living is the function which ellucation has to discharge; and the only rational mode of judging of any educational course is, to julge in what degree it discharges its fumeliun.

## THE NINETEENTH CENTURX.

I'bisunal, Rule-What is a Columial Govemxon?
The December number of the Nine. lecnth Century, which has just come to hand, contains two articles which jossess considerable interest for Camalians at the present time. We refer to "Personal Rule -A leply," by 'I. E. Kebbel and " What is a Colonial Governor," by Edwad S. J. Wilson. The article first noticed is a reply to "The Progress of Personal liule," by Henry Dunckley, which appeared in the November number of the same periodical. Mr . Dunckley is the author of the letters which appared over the nom de plume, "Verax," and which nttracted n
good deal of altention bolh in England and Canada. They wero a review of Theo. dore Martin's life of the Prince Consort. As our system of govermment, boith in the Dominion and in the several Provinces, is simiar to that which prevails in England the controversy cimnot but be interesting to us. During the cliscussions which hive taken phece in Camada on the subject of " Personal Rule" reference has been moro than onco mate to the dismissal of tho Melbourne Ministry in the year 1834, by King William IV. Mr. Jebbol gives an interesting statement of Sir Robent Peel's views regarding that erisis, and it would be difficult to cite any higher constitutional authority. At the time of the dismissal Sir Robert Peel was absent in laty and was stmmoned home by express to assume the position of First Minister. We quole from the article:
"He (ixir Robert Peel) thought that the " King's dismissal of his Ministers was a "premature and impolitio step; but he " mowst distinclly maintamed that, in so "duing, llis Majesty was acting strietly " "ut only within the linits of the Consti" Lution, bat accoming to the spirit in " which it was to be achministered after "the heform Bill of lsae. And he con"sidered that le was himself; if he had " chosen, perfectly at liberty to have tried "conclusions with the existing Pariament
"and to have chdeavoured to wear out "the aulverse majority as Pitt had done "in 1783. He was perfectly prepred on "Constitutional grounds only, to take up a "position in the House of Commons as "King's Minister, though only at the "head of a minority, and to encomiter " successive defeats till he had cither con. "verted the House or had enlisted the "sympathies of the nation in his own " favor. He did not adopt this course, " nol, 1 repeat, because it was unconstitu"tiomal, but becanse he thought it would "be unsuccesstul."

It will be recollected that, in $1783-4$, Pitt fought during nearly a whole session a hostile majority led by Lord North and Mr. Fox, sufiering repeated defeats, but biding his time. Mr. Kebbel says: "Macaulay, writing of M1. Pitu's beha"viour in ifS3 4 says that, instead of dis"solving at once, Pitt wisely determined "to give public opinion time to ripen." Mr. Kebbel quotes from Mr. Gladstone's late article, "Kin Beyond Sca:"-"The "limit of concession by the Sovereign is "at the point where he is willing to try "the experiment of changing his Govern"ment; and the limit of concession by "Ministers is at the point where they " become unwilling to bear-what, on the "whole, they must bear as long as they
"remain Ministers-the undivided re"sponsibility of all that is donc in the "Crown's name." "lhat is to say, continues Mr. Kebbel; " the Sovereign may have "opinions of his own on the great public "questions of the day, which he may re"quire his Ministers to adopt, and if they "refuse,"try to find others more accommo. "dating." The brief quotations that we have made will enable our readers to judge of the tendency of Mr. Kebbel's article.

Mr. Wilson's article has special reference to the appointment of the Marquis of Lorne as Governor-General of Cimada. fe seems to have an apprehension, as we believe wholly without cause, that there is some danger of " ${ }_{a}$ collision between "the vice-regal authority and the claims "of the colonists," and that, owing to the personal relations of Fis Excellency to our Gracious Sovereign, such collision would be of more serious consequence than in the case of an ordinary Governor. Mr. Wilson is very strong in his opinion as to the Constitutional power of the Gov-emor-General. He says :-"The right of the Sovereign todismiss Ministers has been asserted as strongly by Whigs as by Tories, by Brougham as by Pitt. "Brough"am placed on record his opinion that it " is the unguestioned power of the Crown " to choose and change its servants, and "that 'no one would think of questioning "the foundations of this power, or of ob" jecting to its existence, or of wishing to " restrict it.' Pitt, a genemation before, "had used language no less decisive. The "Sovereign exercises his opinion on the " sentiments as well as the capacity of his "Ministers, and, if upon either of them, he "judges them to be incompetent or in "any degree unfit, it is the prerogative, "and with perfect loyalty, let me add, the "the duty of the Crown, to dismiss such "Ministers." Mr. Wilson refers at length to the recent case at the Cape of Good Hope, when Sir Bartle Frere was compelled to dismiss the Molteno Cabinet, citing the telegram sent to the AtomeyGeneral in the following terms: "It is "with extreme pain and regret that 1 "have been compelled to remove Messrs. "Molteno and Merriman from office, a " measure forced on mo by their resolute "persistence in courses of action which I " believe to be unconsitutional and ille"gal, and by their refusal to resign when "informed they had forfeited my confi"dence, and that their resignations would "be accepted."

The object of Mr. Wilson is to suggest the propriely of defining more closely by an Act of the Imperial Farliament "The "right of intervention which a Colonial
"Governor can and must exercise ts the "representative of the Queen." We wholly dissent from the proposition that the intervention of Parliament is either expedient or necessary. A strict adherence to the principles of the British Constitution on the part of the GovernorGeneral and of the Lieutenant-Governors of the Provinces will enable them to steer clear of all difficulties. Few Governors have escapod censure from one or both of the political parties, but no difficulty has arisen with the Imperial Government, which is what is chiefly appreliended by Mr. Wilson, and, after an attentive perusal of his very interesting article, we fail to discover the danger which he apprehends. Our object in these remarks has been rather to direct the attention of our readers to the articles in the Ninetconth Century, and to give some idea of the views of the writers than to offer any opinions of our own on the suhject.

Montreal and Quebec, January 1, 1879.
The year 1878, like its recent predecessurs, has resuted in disappointment amd further falling of in sales and prices. . The continual expectation of better times and a better demand bas not been realized, and the gear closes with a disheartening feeling amongst manufacturers and shippers as to what '70 has in store.
At the begining of the year it was hoped that the unfavorable lugging seitson would re-act advantagcously, but even the little prodaced was hardly wanted, and the markets would not have felt any appreciable difference if there had been no new cut at all. Stocks in Quebec at opening of 1878. were about an average year's shipment, without any new supplies. Present stocks are materinally heavier by some 60 million feet B.M. Un the Ottawa stocks are about an average, if anything a trifle heavier than last year, though a good portion, chiefly common grades, are held by second hands.

The falsing off in shipments to Enghand was, orer 200 million feet B.M., and yet the markets there were glutted, and consignments were in all cases sacrificed; shipments to France were greater than they had been for some years, but other continental ports show a falling off. To the United States shipments were rather more than in 1877, but sales were only practicable at juw prices.
It might now we reasonably sumped that curtailment would be in order, to alow demand to overake the suppiy. As far as square Timber is concerned this is beiug acted ulon, the bulk of last year's cut is still in lirst hands, with no demand and no early prospect of sales. We are glad to say the new ent will be small ; but we caunot sny the same of Saw Logs, which are being largely taken out by many who hast year got out Square timber, and are
now turning all their encrgies to Saw Logs. if the winter prove favorable the crop will be very large.

The following gentlemen were elected directors for the year: D. L. Loekerby, A. Atchison, Juhn Rogers, James Odbrien and Alex. Goudie. A grant of Si00 was voted to the General Hospital.

- Mr. Geo. Il. latterson, manager in this city, of the Whtertown Agricultural Insurance Company, has been unearthing a pecaliar case of alleged incendiarism. The scenc is in Abhotisford, Q, and the principal actor, a Mr. I'ayruss, whose premises, insured in the Canada and afterwatd in the Ottawa Agric. Ins. Co., had been twice bumt down within a year, the secoud time on the esrd Sept. Inst, and whict Mr. Payruss attributed to the ill-will of such of his neighbors as belonged to the faith he lutd formeny professed. He accused these peonle of
writing him letters threatening to burn his property, but in the investigntion which took place on the 27 th inst., in which Mr. Patterson appeared on behalf of the Company of which he has till recently been manarger, suspicion pointed so strongly against Payruss that he was commited to stand his trial for inceudiarismat the next session of the Crimimal court at St. Hyacinthe.
- The Halifan Ohamber of Gommerec, at its meeting on the 2 thin ult.s prissed the futlowing resolutions:-
"This Chamber is of opinion that in the tarilf on sugar the aim shouk be to encurage the importation of sugar from the places of production, particularly the West Indies; that the duty should be tid valorem, independent of all incknges, and that there should be a diference of at least five per cent between raw and rehued sugars. Resoled, that when a bounty is granted. on export sugrar from any foreign country, such surar, whon imported into Catiada, shall be met by a countervaling duty."

Mr. Bremner said he had hately received a letter from New York, stating that the Americans would fight hard to retain the Chandian. sugar trade, and were prepared to spend immenee sums of money. Delegates were instructed to urge the Dominion Board to petition the Government to extend drawhek privileges now accorded to goods sent to Newfoundland to bermurla; to urge the importance of Sova Scotia conl and iron mines, and ask that a faritr be arranged to enconage these industries; to ask for the immedinte abrogation by the United States of the duty levied on tin catus containing fish, it being a gross violation of the Washington Treaty; to ask for the suspension of the bankrupt Aet for five years, and in the meantime that a law be made declaring null and void prefercutial nssignments. The Foard aljourned to Friday to discuss the winter port, and other important questions.

Rephatatonv.-The Buston Fournal of Commerer says: A well-athenticated report comes to us from Washington, indieating that our Government is seriously considering the practicability and policy of making a new move in the matter of the fistorins, and ats speedily as possible replateng the heaty duties formerly levied on Cansiditn fish. Having paid the awad and catried ont our engagements with Ftuglath, it is now thought better 20 build up our own fisherits by judicions legisation than to see them perish through Ganadian commetition.

The knowledge that there was a screw loose sume where came to the cars of $1 t$. T. O. Newburn, haspector of Customs for Gnthrio, whe, on ferreting out the case, fund that the ploughis hard been chtered at a startling undervalation. It suems the pary to whom they were consigued was a relative of one of the proprietors of the South brud tron Wows Go. He refused to latve the invoied price raised to a fat figure, even on the trgent request of the nppraiser at Statford. Me. Mewhurn seenred the services of Nessrs. Cossitt of Guelph, nimd Thompisun armessers. Gopp bros., Hamition, who made a careful apprasement of ile plomghes and athixed their lowest value at thirty per cent. more than the invoices showed. The goods which had been entered at ss, ino were thus found to be worth abont Ste, pro. Upon the Whole duty thots increased which had pain a line of fifty per cent. Was levied, and the uphot of the mater was that the Sonth Benders, who had originally paid some 5500 , land to pay in all about $s 1,4 t)$, which does not include atit the costs of the case, which were also levied. The importers are donbtless wiser if not sidder men.

- In a recent apticle on cheap transportition to the seabuard the Toronto Mail says:"A novel scheme has been broached, which promises, if successfin, to revolutionize camal navigation. The locomotive towage system is proposed as a means of facilitating and cheap. ening transportition on the Erie canal. A company has been orgmized to build a marrow gange malway aloug each bank, to tow boats with locomotives in summer, and to use the tracks for ordimary passenger and freight traffie during the season when the camals are closed. The freight rate will not exceed threefourths of one cent per ton per nile for through freight. This new system of towing is to be practically tested on the Frie water winy, and the result will bo watehed with interest. Another proposition for facilitating and reforming canal transportation is the ridening of the Erie "ditch" by one foot, which, it s claimed, would lead to steambonts superseding those towed by lorses. This, it is believed, can be done at a comparatively trifling expense by cleaning out the channel which has been choked by years' accumulation of grobage. While the adoption of any one of these unethods may tend in some degree to cheapen transportation, the enlargement of he Canndian system of canals will undoubtedly prove the most effectual. Every year the St. Lawrence route secures an increased share of the western trade, the shorter distance from Chicago and other Teatern points to Europe via the Gulf as compared with that by New York, involving 360 miles of canal navigation, merning a valuable
saving in time and money, Having the shortegt water route from our own great, West and the Western States of the Union to Europe, and the most efticient system of ental mavigation, Gandians can aford to wateh with interest, unmixed with anxiety, the eflorts of our neighbours in New York' State to retain the western grain shipuing trade which is gradtally presing into the hunds of our people."

As to secmuing every yem an incensed share of the Western trade, and whether "Camadians com afford to wateh withinterest, thmixed with nuxiety, the eflorts of our neighours," we would refer our contemprony to the statisties in onr article of toh ult, " Importation of Cerenls in lists."

We bave been wellaware of their source, but it has always been out policy to rest on the merits of our work for patronage, and we chose not to recognize these statements, believing that sooner or later the public woud learn the facts and our traducers would meet with the condemmation their conduct metits. In keeping with this policy of detraction there appeared a few days ngo in a New York newspaper, The public, a garbled statement of the condition of our Company on the lst of January one year ago. The article from beginning to end is a tissue of misrepresentations by fallacious rensoning and gross perversion of the statement, rendered by the oflicers of the Company to the State; in fact, ignoring altogether the sworn statement of the ohicers of the Company, it attempts to make it appear that itse Company is defjeient a large sum. It would not be necessary to point this out to any intelligent rendey of the article, and any such one would ensily dirine the motive of the writer, that he was actunted by more han a desire to serve the public; but, as by some (easily suspected) means the fulse conclusions arrived at by the writer of the article were made the subject of an associnted press despatch, and the simple statement that a large deficiency existed in the aftitirs of the Company has appeared in some Canadian papers, I deem it advisable, to thitis reassure our patrons in Canadr that this article and the notices as appearing in Canadian papers, which have been so industrionsly circumated by a rival agency, convey an entirely wrong impression of the condition of our business. I hare the most satisfactory evidences that the allairs of the Company in the United States were never in so prosperous a condition; and as to its affairs in Canada I can speak with still more certainty. I have been in charge of Toronto Office for cight years, and of Montreal and Toronto Offices for two years, and never since my conucction has the business been so eficient in all its departments. noticed that this malious statement refers to noticed that this malicious statement refers to
the condition of the Company one year ago, and
if it were true our patrons would have notided some falling oll ere this. Instead, however, of this being the case, in no year since the inception of our Agency has more money been spent by us to perfect our work. We have added, at large expense, useful additions to our reference book, and we have reason to congratuhte ourselves, and we have reccived the congratulations of hundreds of our suberibers, on the degree of efliciency attained; and the seceret of thesennprincipled attacks is to be found in the fact that while others tave been losing, our gain in business has been large and well assured and notwithsianding these attacks-we feel satisfied that by a continuance of our business on the policy we have pursued, of asking patronage simply ou the merits of our work, we will continue to prosper, and will outlive our traducers, who for success appear to have relied for some years past chiefly on detraction of others.
Our ferty-tourth rolume will be issued at the ustan time in Jamury-the ratings will be found to have isen carefilly revised to the date of going to press (December 16th), and the Guzetteer matter which has been so g enerally apprecinted, as suphying a want felt by the trade, will be tound more complete than heretofore; and on the whole, as a faithful index to the athits of the business men of Oanada, we challenge comparison with any other similat work.

## MONTREAL GENERAI MARKETS. Montreal, Jan. 2nd, 1879.

There is as usual at this season but little novement among our wholesale friends, but we leam that a large amount of staples have entered into consumption during the last few days, and stocks in country stores will probably be pretty well reduced in the course of the present montl, if the heary snow storm sbould not block up the ronds. There is a better feeling among the trade as to the near fature, although many persons are deterred from expressing their views, fearing to commit themselves to an endorsement of the new poliey which is being hatched out. The rate of disconat in some banks has been advanced. The stock market is quiet, but there is a perceptible increase in demand for money. Uur table of the average prices of stocks for the year will appear next week. The most promising indication of better times is the improvenent in trade in the United States where the depression preceded that with us, and they are consequently fecling the change before us also.

Ashes.-Transactions mworthy of note. The sales of Pots and Pearls do not exceed 25 brls. We quote nominal $\$ 3.70$ to $\$ 3.80$ for Pots, and $\$ 5.50$ Pearls, old braud. The receipts for the year were 8423 brls. Pots and 1247 brls , Pearls;
deliveries, 9194 brls Pots and 1062 bris Peners; and the stock in store 31 st December, 1s78, was 1123 brls Pots and 235 brls Pearls. There were held orer in Notember and Decembra for 1879 Beand 162 bels Pots and 44 hels Pearls makiag the real stock [2S5 brls l'ots and 282 lorls Pearls.

Boors and Shons.-Nothing new can be reported for the present wels, very lithe is doing, and business must remain at a standstill until after the holidays. l'rospeets tor the spring trade are not considered very promising, and manufacturers will be likely to produce groods with caution until the orders are actually in hand.

Dux Goons,--Retnilers have heon quite busy during the week, but the leary snow storm which is again apon ha is likely to interfere with movements in the country roads, where the previous heary fill had begun to be packed town. Aifitirs in the cotton districts in England are not very promising. The $D_{a}$ ily Neros surs that" inistend of Christmas turning the tide of events or the revival of the cotomtrade at Bhackburn, the matkets have gradually dwinded, and his week there has been less emplojnent than ever. Six mills are at a standstill though bankenptoj, and others are definitely closed for three weeks. Those best versed in the cotton trade say that the prospects of improvenent are far from immellate." It is to be hoped, therefore, that dealess and others will not ron away with the iden that we are likely to see high puices, for just as soon as prices are adranced it menns a decrensed demand from abrond, and shippers will then have to satis'y themsel ves on the A merican markets, which at
present compare very favorably with current
prices. The present outlook is anything but hromble to higher priees, unless it be in the rery finest selections which; on account of starcity, mast bring full prices.
