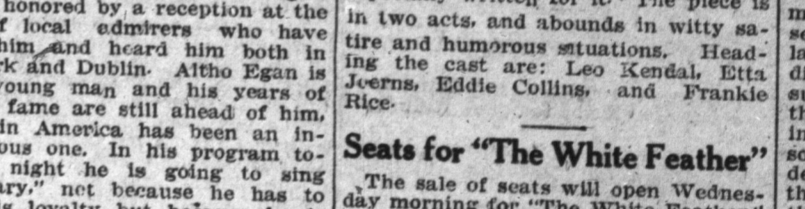
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Government Control. All Motor Plants in Scotland Have Been Taken Over.

Germany's Submarine Blockade

Notwithstanding the activities of the German submarines in the war zone the latter has delimited in British waters, they have done comparatively little damage. Up to the middle of last month the proportion of British ships entering and leaving the ports of the United Kingdom—an average of a hundred daily—that were chartered by submarines to those that escaped challenge was about one in 400...

As against this limited toll taken by the German submarines, several of these pests have been sunk—six certainly, and even more if the hints given in the letters of naval correspondents are to be taken. This represents a serious German loss not at all compensated by the damage to British shipping.

East Indian Emigration

In 1913 the government of India appointed Mr. McNeill, a member of the civil service, and Mr. Chinman Lal, a prominent business man of the United Provinces and an ex-member of the Khurja Municipality, to investigate the conditions of life of Indian immigrants in Trinidad, British Guiana and Jamaica. Their report was recently presented to the viceroy's council and confirms the conclusions arrived at by earlier enquiries and committees.

If there be any fear in the mind of the mayor or any of the controllers that they will be attacked on account of trying to handle the tax rate in a proper manner this year the idea should be dispelled. Everybody who knows the state of affairs is aware that exceptional conditions prevail, and that burdens heavier than usual have been laid upon the citizens. It is quite true that as much of these as legitimately can be shared with future taxpayers, who will share the advantages created by present expenditures, ought to be transferred to future account, but there should be no attempt to shove the payments of accounts that belong to the present generation on to the future.

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U.S. ARMY OFFICERS TO QUIT GERMANY

Position of American Observers With Kaiser's Armies Became Embarrassing. AFRAID OF FRICTION. Generals of William's Forces Strung to High Tension Over War.

WASHINGTON, April 4.—The five American army officers on duty as military observers with German armies have been ordered home, and their places will not be taken by other officials. The reason assigned by Secretary of War Garrison for the recall of order was that their mission had not been fulfilled. This explanation, it was announced, would be the war department's last word on the matter. It is known, however, that other reasons, largely of a personal character, were considered by army officials in determining to withdraw the observers.

The American officers, it is said, have found their position somewhat difficult because of the high tension to which at least a few of those with whom they must come in contact in Germany have been strung by months of warfare and press reports in Germany criticizing the attitude of the United States government towards the war. The effect has been to hamper the observers and open possibilities of personal friction that might become international and official here are understood to have determined to withdraw the officers rather than that any unpleasant incident should occur.

Glossop are making a poor showing, having only 17 points to their favor after also very much in danger of finishing but one, and there is little doubt but that they will be relegated to the second division.

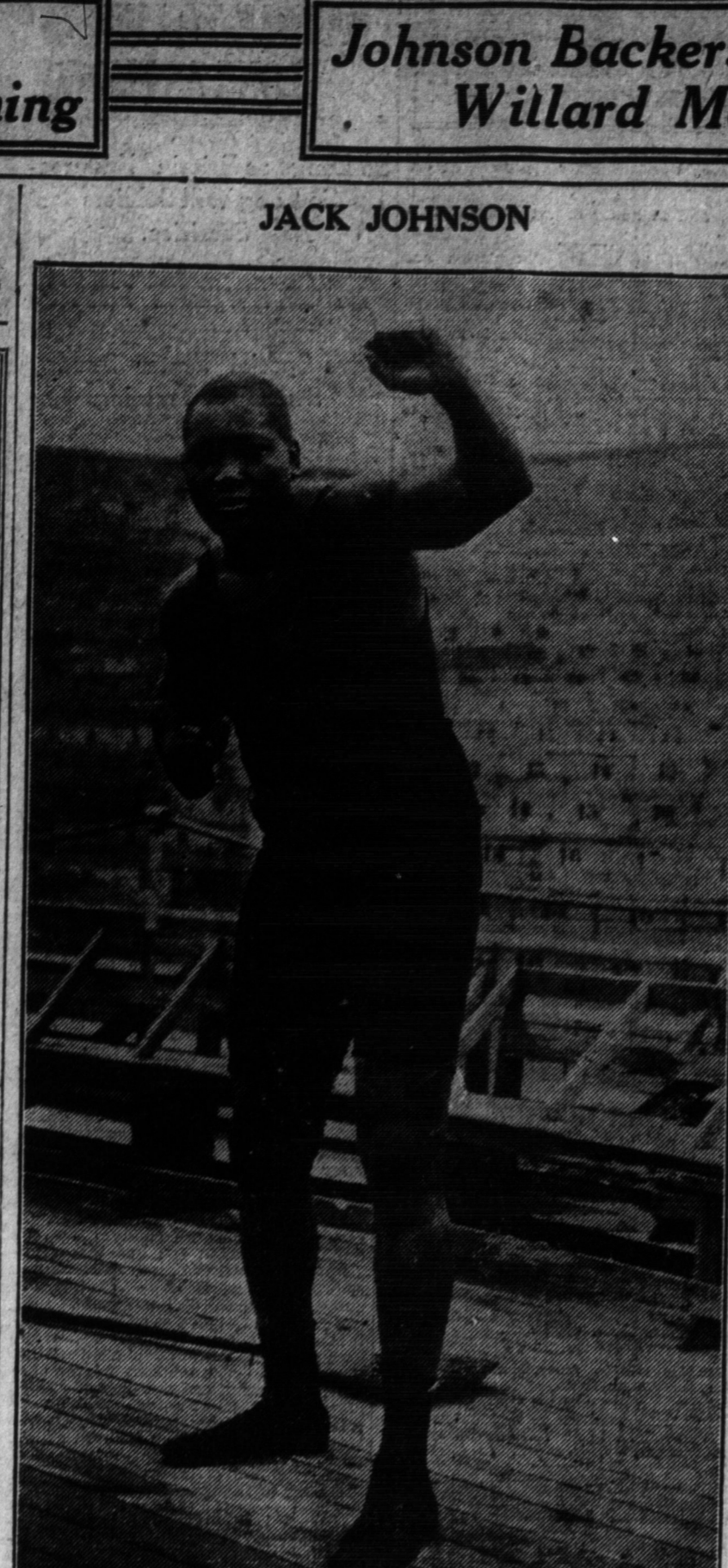

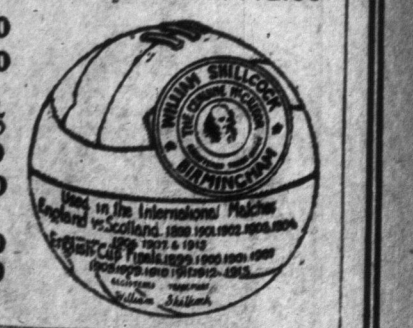
