ARREST FARMERS' BANK MANAGER

Released After Three Hours' Detention on \$20,000 Bail

FOR THE SIGNING OF FALSE RETURNS

Warrant Charges That Assets Were Exaggerated and Liabilities Concealed Month by Month Since Beginning of the Year-Amount Involved May Total \$100,000 -Mr. Travers Denies Charges and President Munro Expresses Confidence in Him.

The main topic at the moment is not the Bank Act, but the facts of the suspension of the Farmers' Bank. These must be ascertained. tabulated, and then the consequences that follow.

The first important revelation is that the bank soaned over half a illion dollars, or more than a fourth of its entire funds, to the Keeley Mine, apparently on the notes of the company only; and that W. R. Travers, vice-president and manager of the bank, was the secretary of the mining company.

Next comes the arrest, yesterday evening, of Mr. Travers on the arge of making false returns in his sworn monthly statement to the finance minister as to the bank's affairs.

The third topic turns on the redemption of the bank notes issued to the public by the bank. So far these are being accepted by other banks, and so far are good for the face amount. These notes, as the law is read, are a charge on the "bank circulation redemption fund," which is read, are a charge on the "bank circulation redemption fund," which consists of a five per cent. Impost taken by the government from every bank on its average monthly circulation. This money is deposited with the government, which allows three per cent. Interest on the amount. This fund now exceeds over four millions and a half of dollars. The note issue of the Farmers' Bank is not supposed to exceed \$450,000. At least, it is so set out in the monthly returns to the finance department at Ottawa. It was stated yesterday that perhaps this amount had been exceeded by amounts issued in emergencies by the branches of the institution. But as far as could be learned yesterday no call has yet been made on the "bank circulation redemption fund." Indeed, it was said that the curator would in the first instance retire these notes with any available cash assets or equivalents that he found in the bank treasury. And it was further believed that the statement published as coming from a banker, that there was to be "no more rescue work," meant that the "redemption fund" would not be touched, for a while at least anyway, or, in fact, until an effort had been made to realize on the assets of the bank.

A fourth point of some interest is whether there are any notes of shareholders in the bank that had been discounted by the bank so as to allow such shareholders to pay up their shares and have them appear in the monthly return as fully paid up.

A fifth point of investigation touches the transactions of the bank with an insurance company or others in Syracuse, N.Y., whereby a very considerable amount of the bank's funds are supposed to have been more or less involved. There is believed to have been some kind of a subscription to stock of the bank in this transaction.

A sixth matter to be ascertained is the transactions of the bank with its customers generally.

Terrific Early Morning Explosion Results in Heavy Loss of Life - Fire Prevents the Work of Rescue - Four Hundred Other Lives Are in

BOLTON, England, Dec. 21 .- More than 300 colliers lost their lives to-day in an explosion in the Little Hulton Colliery of the Hulton Colliery Company, which is located a little distance outside this city.

The explosion occurred early in the morning, soon after the miners had entered the pit to begin work. Its force was terrific, and later investigashowed that the lower passage had been blocked. Heroic efforts were made by rescue parties all day long, but a flerce fire, which followed the explosion prevented the rescuers from trating beyond 400 yards into the

workings.

At half past nine o'clock to-night all the rescuers were called out of the mine and a conference was held, at which Government Inspector Gerrard, the engineers and the mine manager were present. Inspector Gerrard issued a report after making a descent into the pit, in which he declares that it is impossible that any of the miners are still alive. He adds that nothing can be done except to bring up twenty bodies found lying near the shaft.

Funeral Service at Shaft Mouth.

This report was communicated to the anxious crowds around the pit mouth, after which the Bishop of Manchester conducted a touching service in the open air, when the crowd dispersed.

MECHANICAL POWER FOR THE

One of the interesting features of the land show in Chicago last month was mechanical power for the farm. This took the form not only of the tractors themselves, but was supplemented by a daily illustrated lecture on the economic advantages of plowing and doing other farm work by means of engines instead of horses. The lecture was not a recital of the joy to be derived from a "seeing of the wheels go 'round," but a consideration of mechanical power strictly eration of mechanical power strictly as a business proposition. There was a time when the farmer was not classed as a business man. To-day he is not only more a producer than the manu-facturer, but his range of products is such that the volume of his sales com-pares favorably with those of many country merchants. In his crop pro-duction and delivery for shipment he has come to the point where he can tree power-driven machinery to quite an extent, and we may reasonably anticipate in the next ten years a large demand for traction power by farmers, especially those operating several hundred acres. We will come to this thru the use of automobiles, which formers are now business by formers are now buying by thougands. ne of the records cited are in-

eresting. For instance, on the big Dakota farms where the plowing, seedl'arota farms where the plowing, seeding, harvesting, threshing and hauling, all are accomplished with engines, the cost is reduced \$2.10 per acre. A large part of this money comes out of the pockets of the merchants and manufacturers. 



We strongly urged on the minister of finance the necessity of amending the Bank Act, so that independent inspection should be automatic, and so that directors should be responsible for the documents they signed. BRITISH OFFICERS FACE TRIAL AS BEIHG SPIES

German Prosecutor Says Testimony Will Show That Actions Indicated Plans for Sudden Invasion.

LEIPSIC, Germany, Dec. 21.—The trial of the British officers—Captain Trench of the Royal Marines and Lieu-tenant Brandon of the Royal Navy—

Trench of the Royal Marines and Lieutenant Brandon of the Royal Navy—who are charged by the German authorities with espionage upon the fortifications at Borkum, was begun in the imperial court to-day. The officers were defended by German attorneys. The British Government was represented by its consul at Hamburg. The defendants admitted that they were gathering military information at the time of their arrest.

The evidence shows that Trench and Brandon visited Kiel, Brunnobuttel, Cuxhaven, Heligoland, Westerland, Sylt, Amrun, Fehr, Nordernoy, Borkum, Wangeroog and Bremen, everywhere making sketches, marking in maps the positions of batteries, forts and searchlights, and keeping minute records in their notebooks of military details.

The president of the court broached the question of excluding the public, but the state's attorney replied that ne desired that the case should be tried publicly, only a secret session to be held when the military experts were testifying regarding Heligoland and Bremen.

The attorney added that the testi-

The attorney added that the testimony would show that the information gathered by the prisoners could only have significance for a power designing a sudden and unexpected attack on the German coasts.

Captain Taegert, a naval expert, said that British naval experts had formerly given the closest attention to Borkum, but since the latter was forti, fied their interest had waned and they were now studying Sylt, one of the north Frieslan Islands.

Notes in Captain Trench's memoran, dum book indicate that he was gathering material showing that Sylt was adapted for debarkation. Trench and Brandon admitted nearly all the points against them readily, but firmly refused to name the person their material was designed for. Tevis was mixed up in the People's Insurance Co. affair at Syracuse, N.Y., some time ago. It is hinted here that he has used the Canadian bank to finance some of his ventures. A Mr. Chapman, son of E. R. Chapman of New York, is said to be with him in the deals.

Tevis is included in the bank's list of shareholders as possessing 1120 shares fully paid up to the extent of \$112,000, being the largest shareholder.

Civility to Passengers

That the management of the Toronto Railway Company is fully seized of the importance of civility to passengers on the part of employes could be proved by reference to the frequent notices sent out to the men on this subject within the past few days. A further order was issued from the Head Office to this effect:-

"For some reason many complaints have recently been received at the Head Office regarding incivility to passengers on the part of Conductors and Motormen.

"The Company has never issued any rule or regulation having any connection with the passengers traveling upon the cars that cannot be carried out by the Conductor or Motorman in & courteous manner.

"The management frequently receives letters commenting upoff the courtesy and kindly acts of some of the men towards aged and infirm passengers and others that may require some little assistance in boarding or leaving the car; and would much rather receive letters of this nature than complaints stating that Conductors and Motormen were rude, or neglected to perform such little duties as these, that ordinary consideration and courtesy should prompt them to do.

"Will the Conductors and Motormen please bear in mind that the Company does not wish them to quarrel with the passengers on their cars? If there is a point of difference, say, as to the issuing of a transfer, or of a transfer being late, or that the proper fare is not being tendered, it is easier for the Conductor to perform his duty in a courteous way than to make himself objectionable to anyone in the car by unnecessary and uncalled for remarks. In the ease of Motormen there is still less reason for there being any reports received for incivility, as they are less in contact with the public; but notwithstanding this, reports would lead the management to believe that some Motormen seem to go out of their way to cause annoyance to passengers."






