## Distrust of House Scores Heavily

### Accuses Government of Lacking Class Against Class, Especially Selecting Jews as Victims—Pessimism at Palace.

St. Petersburg, July 20.—(5 p.m.)—At the Tauride Palace to-day a pessimistic feeling was prevalent, but the leaders generally did not believe that the government would dare to attempt a dissolution of parliament.

At the opening session of the lower house the question of the publication of the address to the country, which President Mourouzeff last night decided had not been carried owing to the lack of a quorum, was allowed to go over until Monday, when M. Mourouzeff will again occupy the chair.

Without debate the house then adopted a resolution on the subject of the Bialystok massacre, demanding the prosecution of the military and police officials involved, irrespective of rank.

The resolution, which constitutes a strongly worded indictment of the central government, which is held responsible for the secret propaganda, lenient class against class, says: "Realizing its powerlessness to suppress the revolutionary movement, the government attempts to break it up by inclining one portion of the population against the other, especially selecting the Jews as victims."

The resolution concludes with another expression of distrust of the ministry and a demand for its resignation.

The Bourne Gazette says that an extraordinary council is sitting this afternoon at Peterhof, with General Count Ignatieff, the noted reactionary, M. Pobedonosteff, former procurator-general of the holy synod, General Troopoff, commander of the palace, M. Stuchinsky, minister of agriculture, and others in attendance discussing the advisability of the immediate dissolution of parliament.

**Tragic Sequel.**  
A high-placed personage, in conversation with the Associated Press, today made no attempt to conceal the gravity of the situation. He said: "Everything may depend upon today's sitting of the lower house of parliament. If no quorum is taken to avoid a conflict with the government the sequel may be tragic."

Extreme nervousness and excitement prevailed in the classes, owing to fear that the action of the lower house of parliament in adopting early today the significant coup d'état against parliament, it is rumored that the step has been decided upon, and the Straits press is ordering the dissolution of parliament has already been signed.

**Calling in Guards.**  
The feeling of general alarm is increased by the fact that all night guard regiments have been marching into the city from the camp at Krasnoye-Selo. Moreover it is known that the colonels of the Semenovskiy Regiment of the Guard and of the Hussars of the Guard, the Colonel of the Semenovskiy Regiment, Probrajenskiy and Yaegerskiy guard regiments, and the Colonel of the Horse Artillery of the guard, are summoned to the headquarters of the commander of the St. Petersburg garrison, where they received instructions regarding the disposition of their troops in the case of certain eventualities. An attempt was made to reassure the public, when this fact leaked out, with the explanation that these were precautionary dispositions arranged in view of the threatening situation of the district, but the evidence seems conclusive that the government has deliberately prepared for the gravest emergency.

**Not Official.**  
So far as can be ascertained, however, no final decision has been taken at Peterhof. The ministry, which believes in the explanation of the coup, hoped to prolong the status quo, while the Court Camarilla insists that the sooner parliament is dissolved the better, and both sides unite in the necessity for preparations to meet the extra-constitutional step of the lower house.

The Misa and three other newspapers of this city were confiscated to-day. All the members of the editorial staff of the Misa were arrested. The police have forbidden the newspapers of this city to publish the text of the address of the lower house of parliament to the country, which the government has decided to regard as being beyond the province of parliament.

## STATE OWNED CABLE LINE TO PROMOTE INTERCOURSE

### Sir Sandford Fleming Urges Scheme at Dinner of London Eighty Club.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.)  
London, July 20.—Sir Sandford Fleming and Hon. N. A. Belcourt were tonight guests at the special dinner of the Eighty Club, summoned to hear an exposition of the plan of the empire cable intelligence service.

Sir Sandford urged greater intercourse between the mother country and the colonies as promoting the unity of the empire. This could be secured by a system of cables entirely state-owned, connecting all parts and affording the free distribution of news information, in addition to being self-sustaining by other business.

Mr. Belcourt and Hon. Collin Campbell spoke in support, pointing out the inadequacy of the present arrangements.

General discussion followed. Many prominent Liberals heartily endorse the underlying idea, which they had heard for the first time. Although recognizing the practical difficulties of working out details, they promised careful consideration. They emphasize the idea of wholesome imperialism being confined to any one part.

Hansard Greenwood, in moving a vote of thanks to the speaker, praised the work of Sir Sandford Fleming in behalf of the empire. He thought the difficulties and details could be overcome and affirmed that in the heart of the Liberal party there was warm sympathy with over-sea dominions.

**OFFER PRIZES TO FARMERS TO ENCOURAGE GOOD ROADS**  
Automobile Club of Canada Puts Up \$200—Glidden Tourists Leave Montreal.

Montreal, July 20.—(Special.)—The Automobile Club of Canada has issued a circular to landowners, farmers and others, interested in property on the Island of Montreal. The club wants good roads, and is willing to put up a trifle of its hard earned wealth to stimulate the farmers in the matter.

In order that those owning property adjoining a highway on Montreal Island may sit up and take notice of the Automobile Club of Canada is offering prizes to the extent of \$200, divided into prizes of \$100, \$50 and \$25. These will be given to the farmers or other owners who keep their particular sections of highway in the best condition, and do most to improve the same between now and autumn. The drawing of the prizes will take place at the end of the season. Incorporated with the circular are a number of rules as to how a road should be constructed.

Some of the Glidden automobile tourists who left Montreal this morning on their way to Quebec had an interesting experience this morning at the Bout de l'Isle bridge. Their experience began on their approach to the structure, which stretch of sand makes very difficult of access. While trying to struggle thru this one of the machines, which were being towed, suddenly turned to the side and was driven with great force thru a fence and against an embankment. Strange to say, however, the machine was not much damaged, and the occupants were merely shaken up.

The New York Herald's correspondent with the tourists wires his paper from Montreal: "The stories that are told here tonight of the condition of the highways along the north bank of the St. Lawrence River are not conducive to the peace of mind of the tourists. Drawals from the trip at this point, to the all cup contestants say they will stick it out because of lack of funds. The condition of the St. Lawrence steamer Three Rivers has been chartered for the night at Three Rivers and will be anchored in the stream with the tourists aboard."

"Many protests were informally made by the tourists to-day at the adequate accommodations along the route and at the excessive rates charged. The rule seems to have been instead of a reduced rate for so large a party an increased rate all along the line."

**SICKEN EATING PORK.**  
Fifteen Men in Lumber Camp Become Violently Ill.

Brockville, July 20.—(Special.)—The lumber camp of Crate and Sparham at Franktown was thrown into excitement this week by fifteen of the choppers becoming violently ill almost simultaneously. By the time a physician was procured several had reached the stage of convulsions.

It was evident that the patients were suffering from poisoning. The cause could not be determined, except that the men sickened eating pork. They are now reported out of danger.



# HAYHURST IN THE FINAL IS THE ONLY CANADIAN

## In Second Stage of King's Prize is Only Twelve Points Behind the Highest.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.)  
Bisley Camp, July 20.—Staff-Sergeant Hayhurst of Hamilton is the only Canadian in final stage of the King's prize. He is twelve points behind the top score in the second stage of the King's prize.

The second stage of the King's prize, 20 shots at 600 yards, was shot in a strong wind blowing straight across the range. The Canadian scores out of a possible 100 were as follows: Staff-Sergeant Hayhurst, Hamilton, 84; Pte. J. Drysdale, Montreal, 83; Capt. E. Skedden, Hamilton, 78; Pte. W. A. Smith, Ottawa, 69; Major Dillon, Oshawa, 69.

Three hundred shot in the second stage, and of these, the first hundred will conclude the final and third stage to-morrow.

In the first stage of the King's prize Staff-Sergeant Kerr, 48th, Toronto, 54; Staff-Sergeant Mortimer, Ottawa, 53; Staff-Sergeant, Transport Sergeant, Stuart, 43rd, Ottawa, is 38th, winning 52.

In the Duke of Cambridge Nichols was 50th, winning 52.

In the Gregory match, 200 yards, seven shots, unassisted, Nichols was fifth, and won 12 1/2; Dillon, twenty-sixth, 11; Skedden, thirty-third, 11; Bayles, forty-second, 11; Drysdale, forty-fifth, 7 1/2; Mortimer, forty-seventh, 7 1/2.

In the Stewart Challenge Cup match, 500 yards, seven shots, unassisted, Nichols was ninth among 120; Bayles, thirty-first, 11; Higgins, thirty-eighth, 11.

In the Association Cup match Nichols scored 24 and 32.

In the King's prize, first stage, Mitchell, who had 302nd place, won 42; In the Wingrove match, 800 yards, Higgins scored 34. In the Association Cup, Nichols scored 24 and 33 at the two ranges. In the St. George's match Piper Leask, 157th, place, won 42, and Caven, 190th, 42.

World Office, Friday Evening, July 20. The Toronto stock market partook of none of the buoyancy of the American market to-day, rather preferring to act in concert with the foreign exchanges, which were depressed and heavy on Russian disturbances. British Consols lost over 1/4 point from yesterday in the London market. Local speculation continued about as light as ever, although with the exception of Sao Paulo the liquidation was not pressing. Twin City and Mackay recovered fractions, but elsewhere in the list there were no changes worth mentioning. Rio common was apparently firmer, but as no full lots were dealt in, quotations were withheld at the close, the advance was more fanciful than real. A weak feature of the market in the eyes of brokers is the absence of supporting bids in some securities, except when offerings are not in evidence. At the close it was felt that unless some improvement can be forthcoming under surrounding conditions a weakening in values was inevitable.

Head's weekly letter says: The stock market from its action the past week seems to have struck a speculative calm. The professional traders, so to speak, for the room trading contingent, whence arise 75 per cent. of the business, make little headway in their direction, according as the spirit moves them, they manipulate prices up and down, waiting for the big move to come, and then they sell or buy as the case may be. The inclination is to put prices lower, but the large following on the other side is a decided factor.



THE NEW PROCESS BUILDING THE MOST UNIQUE STRUCTURE

Believed to Be the Only Edifice of the Kind on This Continent and the Best Fair Building.

The new buildings on the exhibition grounds are getting along finely and the magnificent process and agricultural implements building is now so near completion that exhibits are already commencing to come in, the first being now on the floor ready to set in place. The structure would well repay a visit from anybody, for it is impossible to have a conception of its magnitude without an actual view. Its front extends and includes the old stove building on the main road right down to the administration offices, having taken in the old telephone and telegraph offices, old implement building and the press bureau, as well as quite a piece of land to the south. It is built almost entirely of brick and steel, and has a floor space of over 86,000 square feet. It is believed to be the most unique and the best building devoted to exhibition purposes on this continent. It has a more imposing front and possesses the additional virtue of showing the greatest possible variety of articles under the one roof. While the processes of manufacture will be the principal feature of the building, sections of it will be devoted to stoves, agricultural implements, miscellaneous manufactures and other exhibits for which space cannot be found in the special buildings.

The processes of manufacture will this year be on a scale of magnitude and interest that will completely dwarf anything that the exhibition has previously had. There will be some thirty processes in all, including carpet weaving, motor car building, motor boat building, and glass cutting, crystal bowls, epergnes, plates and dishes being made on the spot. Pure food manufacture of every description, including candies, cakes, loaves, biscuits, and all things appertaining to the bread and biscuit business and confectionery, will be demonstrated.

There will be a tobacco plantation and a factory showing the complete process of tobacco making, cigar and cigar making from the raw material to the completion. Textile weaving will be another process in which various kinds of fabrics, including curtains, bed quilts, cloths, etc., will be made. There will be a variety of medal working machinery that will turn out a quantity of articles daily and turn them out in a style of the best possible workmanship and design. Spring mattresses, wire beds, and wire goods in great variety will also be produced. There will be a complete demonstration of the manufacture of underwear, stockings, socks, and all manner of knitted goods. The printer's art will be illustrated by means of the very latest inventions. There will be automatic typesetting, lithographing, engraving and in fact a clear exposition of all the branches of the art. There will be men at work on developing machines and on printing machines. Graphophone records will be made while you wait, and there will be a most varied and numerous exhibit of the latest inventions and apparatus applied to mercantile uses. Especially interesting will be an exhibit of gasoline machines as applied to motor boats and from time to time other processes will be added, including, probably, complete machinery for canning and for packing. In consequence of the number of applications for space in the manufactures and liberal arts building over-flow arrangements have been made in the new process building and in an annex.

The six-for-a-dollar tickets have been printed and will be distributed to vendors and be on sale daily from ten to five at the offices from Thursday next, the 26th inst., to Friday, Aug. 24. Only a limited number will be issued. These tickets will admit to the grounds at any time and to the grand stand every afternoon, but to the grand stand in the evening only during the first week. They will be on sale at one hundred different points in the city, in Hamilton, in London, and in other places.

MEXICO FEARS REVOLUTION

Uprising, Expected in September, to Be Prepared for.

El Paso, Texas, July 20.-Rafael Ysabel, governor of Sonora, Mexico, passed thru El Paso to-day on route to Mexico City, to consult with President Diaz and prepare for the threatened uprising in that country, Sept. 19.

President Diaz is calling all his governors into conference. Considerable trouble is feared in Sonora, as Cananea is located in that state, and is said to be a revolutionary hotbed.

Guatemala Free. Guatemala City, Thursday, July 19.- (3 p.m.) Guatemala's territory is now free of invaders.

The peace delegates of Guatemala are Senors Malo, Juan Barros, minister for foreign affairs; Jose Pinto, chief justice of the supreme court; Manuel Cabral, associate justice of the supreme court, and Arturo Ubico, president of the national assembly.

B. M. A. CONVENTION.

Outline of Proceedings Which Will Be of World-wide Interest.

The seventy-fourth annual meeting of the British Medical Association will be held in Toronto, Aug. 25, under the presidency of Dr. Reeve, Dean of University of Toronto Faculty of Medicine.

Thirteen scientific sections have been arranged and will meet daily in the university buildings at 9.30 a.m., viz.: Anatomy, Dermatology, Law, Surgery, Gynecology, Ophthalmology, Paediatrics, Pathology and Bacteriology, Physiology, Psychology, State Medicine, Surgery, and Therapeutics.

On Tuesday, at 2.30 p.m., an address of welcome will be accorded to members and the ceremony of introducing the distinguished guests and delegates will be followed. This will be immediately followed by the presidential address by Professor Reeve. At 4.30 p.m. in the university quadrangle a reception and garden party by the president and Mrs. Reeve. At 5.30 an address will be delivered by Dr. W. S. A. Griffith, London, England, while at 9.30 His Excellency the Governor-General will receive the members of the association.

On Wednesday, at 2.30 p.m., an address in medicine will be delivered by Sir James Barr, M.D., of Liverpool; and for the afternoon various garden parties have been arranged, while at 7.30 p.m. the president will preside at the annual dinner, when the most distinguished gathering is assured.

On Friday afternoon extensive entertainments are promised to members and their friends, while in the evening will be held a grand soiree. For Saturday, Aug. 25, several excursions are arranged—to Niagara Power Company's plant, thru the courtesy of Sir Henry M. Pellat; to Muskoka; and to Lambton, thru the courtesy of the president, Mr. Austin. The press tickets are of elaborate design. The meetings of those sections whose discussions are of a technical and scientific nature, will be private, with, however, certain information supplied to the daily papers.

MUST PAY TAX.

Insurance Company on Two Lines Liable for Double Tax.

Montreal, July 20.-The right of the City of Montreal to tax fire insurance companies, which also carry on other branches of insurance, for extra line of insurance so carried, is upheld by Recorder Weir in judgment to-day. The city sued the Insurance Company North America, for special tax of \$100 for marine insurance for 1904, when that company was carrying on that line of business, and the recorder has ordered the company to pay.

CITY HALL NEWS BUDGET POWER REPORT ASKED FOR

Government Wants Information—Yonge Street Bridge—Odds and Ends.

That inspection of the Metropolitan Railway, with a view to bringing on business-like negotiations between the city and the radial railway companies, is now billed to take place next Thursday.

The board of control yesterday ordered the purchase of a plot in Mount Pleasant Cemetery for the remains of the late Alexander Muir. The casket will be taken from the vault and interred to-day. The lot selected is near the rear of the cemetery, directly east of the main gateway.

The question of the extension of Harbour-street to Ossington-avenue was brought up again by the mayor, and it was agreed that the longer the matter was left the more expensive it would be. The assessment commissioner was asked to furnish a new report of the cost, having regard to present values.

The controllers will recommend that the works committee be allowed to purchase the asphalt plant for \$20,000 and yard space for \$5000, which will have to be paid for next year.

Controller Hubbard said there were holes big enough to bury a horse on Front-street. Roadways Engineer McPhail will be asked to fill them up with brogan asphalt taken from streets in course of repairs.

In regard to moving the sewers department from the basement to the upper part of the hall, Commissioner Harris was instructed to confer with the board of education about them giving up a large room in the basement, now used as a storage room. The feeling is that it would be better for the sewers office to remain with the other branches of the engineer's department downstairs.

What the City Will Want. The hydro-electric power commission has written to the city in reference to the city's application for electric power, stating that in order to make an intelligent estimate of the cost it is necessary to know what quantity of power is required and the form in which it is desired that it be delivered as to voltage, phase and frequency. The city engineer is to prepare the information asked for.

The controllers were pleased with "Flieg's Illustrated Toronto" and accepted the recommendation of the city clerk that 500 copies be purchased at \$18 per hundred, for distribution to visitors of the city. The board decided that the money should be paid from the appropriation to the new department of industries.

Notwithstanding repeated denials in official circles the name of Joseph E. Thompson of the city treasurer's department is shortly to be pushed forward as the right man to be commissioner of industries. The mayor has intimated that at an early date he will nominate Mr. Thompson.

Bridge Engineer Williams is preparing plans for the Leavelle-avenue subway, and soon the board of control will be asked to advertise for tenders. The plans are being pushed along to expedite the erection of the subway, and to this end Mr. Williams has had to cancel his vacation.

Acting City Engineer Fellows is preparing a report upon the question of constructing the railway extension into Ashbridge's Marsh. One proposal is that the railway be built and give running rights, and the other that the city undertake the work.

The contract for mains for the high level pumping station has been awarded to J. H. McKnight at \$44,720. Yonge Street Bridge. The government's decision in the Yonge-street bridge matter has been communicated by letter by Hon. Charles Hyman, minister of public works, to


