





Archbishop of Canterbury Decides That the Law Does Not Prohibit Lights and Incense

AS ACCOMPANIMENTS OF WORSHIP.

The Archbishops Urge Discontinuance, However, in the Interest of Peace in the Church.

London, July 31.—The Archbishop of Canbishops declare that, while far from saying the use of incense and the carrying of lights in procession are unsuitable or undesirable accompaniments of divine worship, they are obliged, in accordance with the prayer book, to come to the conclusion that these adjuncts are neither enjoined nor permitted by the law of the Church of England; therefore, the Archbishops add, though they may be used to sweeten a church or for purely lighting purposes, they urge all the clergy, for the sake of the peace of the church, to discontinue their use as part of the services.






