## HOPELESSNESS OF TASK HAD WEIRD FASCINATION

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DR. COOK as he appears in the Eskimo kayak or canoe.

Synopsis of First Instalment. In the first instalment of his thrilling story "The Conquest of the Pole," printed in The World of Wednesday, Dr. Frederick A. Cook told of the start from Gloucester on the "Bradley," of the voyage to the polar seas, and of the overhauling en route of the equipment needed for the dash to the Pole. In a graphic manner, the discoverer wrote a story of Eskimo life that never has been excelled for human interest. He told of the home life, the tragedy and comedy that mingle in the dreary existence of the dwellers in the Arctic, and of the child-like eagerness of the natives to trade their valuable furs and ivories for the simplest things of civilization. The yacht, her owner, John R. Bradley, the explorer and his party were pictured in their preliminary work for the final dash. Finally, after describing the various places visited in Greenland in search of guides and information as to conditions further north, Dr. Cook wrote of the trip across Inglefield Gulf, past Cape Auckland, and on toward Cape Robertson. Here the discoverer closed the first part of his narrative, with Etah and Annotook, the last points of call, looming in the icy distance.

### "THE CONQUEST OF THE POLE."

(By Dr. Fred. A. Cook.) SECOND INSTALMENT.

We awoke off Cape Robertson and went ashore before breakfast. The coast here rises suddenly to an altitude of two thousand feet and is crowned with an ice cap. It is picturesque enough. Large bays, blue glacial walls and prominent headlands offer a pleasing variety, out it is much like the coast of all Greenland. It had, however, the tremendous advantages of a southern exposure and rocks, providing a resting place for the little auk in millions. These little birds darted from the cliff to the sea. Rather rich, grassy verdure also offered an oasis for the Arctic hare, while the blue fox found life easy here, for he could fill his winter den with fat feathered creatures.

The Eskimo profits by the combination, and pitches his camp at the foot of the cliffs, for the chase on sea is nearly as good here as in other places, while land creatures literally tumble into his larder. As we approached the shore ten men, nine women, thirty-one children and one hundred and six dogs came out to meet us. I counted the children and dogs, for they are equally important in Eskimo economy. The latter are by far the most important to the average Caucasian in

Only small game had fallen to the Eskimo lot, but they were eager to venture out with us after big game. At last, Mr. Bradley had found a suitable retinue of native guides, and we were not long in arranging a compact. Free passage, the good graces of the cook and a knife each were their pay. The caribou hunt was not sufficiently novel to merit a return to Olrick's Bay, where intelligent effort is always rewarded, but it was hoped we might get a hunt at Kookaan, near the head of Robertson Bay.

SETTING SAIL FOR ETAH. This venture, however, failed, tho it gave us an interesting chase about dangerous waters in a violent gale. We returned to the igloo. paid off our guides, made presents to their women and children and set sail for Etah. Clearing weather after the storm afforded delightful yachting weather. A fairly strong off shore wind filled the big wings of canvas. The cool air was bracing, while the bright sun threw glittering beams from slant to slant. The seamen forward sang of the

During two days of stormy discomfort, several important meals had been willingly missed. But in the Arctic, food accounts must be squared as quickly as possible. Here were the joys of civilization, health and recreation in a new wilderness, all combined in the composite adventures of cruising on Arctic seas. . On the following morning, we passed Cape Alexander and entered Smith Sound. Half a gale

came from the sea as we entered Foulke Fjord.

The Town of Etah was composed of four tents, which for this season had been pitched beside a small stream just inside of the first projecting point on the north shores. Inside this point there was a sheltered water to land the Eskimo kayaks. It also made a good harbor for the yacht. It is possible in favorable seasons to push thru Smith Sound, over Kane Basin, into Kennedy Channel, but the experiment is always at the risk of the vessel.

There was no special reason for us to hazard life, therefore the yacht was here prepared for the return voyage. This was to consume several days, and we sought to occupy the time in exploration and



### THE GREATEST TRANSPORTA-TION CENTRE.

On the invitation of the New York State Commissioner of Agriculture, the public service commission of the first district sent to the state fair, now in progress at Syracuse, a set of charts and statistics showing the magnitude of the regulation problem in the fields of transportation, gas and electricity. Some of the facts disclosed by the exhibit are surprising and instructive and reveal how nearly connected public services are with the welfare and comfort of the individual citizen. With about five per cent, of the population of the whole country, it has 4.5 per cent, of the total mileage of single track street and electric railways, and carries 17.8 per cent. of the total passengers on such railways.

Greater London, with a population of 7,217,939, carried 871,171,495 passengers on its street and electric railways in 1907.' New York City, with a population of 4,278,526, carried 1,323,326,655 on its street and electric lines. Greater Paris, in 1906, with a population of 3.848.618, transported 634,113,121 passengers, and Greater Berlin, with a population of a little over 3,000,000, carried 502,359,692 passengers. In percentages. New York City transported 40 per cent., Greater London 26 per cent., Greater Paris 19 per cent., and Greater Berlin 15 per cent, of the total. The street and electric railways of New York City-carried nearly 18 per cent. of the fare passengers carried by all

not only the 'soul of wit'-it is the heart of wisdom. In attempting be brief, however, we should not fall to be sufficiently explicit. Between the two extremes lies the value of advertising force, strength and virtue. Location of Paramount Importance. "The location of the advertisement is of paramount importance. Next to reading matter is the space of most

value, altho the character of the reading matter that adjoins it should be seriously taken into consideration. It is not possible at all times to secure this desirable space; yet when it can be obtained, it should be, altho the expense is correspondingly increased.

"Certain character of publicity, how-ever, should, at all times and under all conditions, be placed in the classified columns appropriately designated. A small advertisement in the appropriate department is often of greater value than one of large proportions inappropriately placed.

The frequency of an advertising campaign is a matter requiring sound judgment. To keep it up constantly unceasingly involves an expenditure that becomes a heavy drain upon the exchequer. A wise course is to prepare a plan that will last a lengthy period of time, have the effect of con-stancy, and yet is minimized materially by intervals of suspension. Instead of advertising daily, alternate by omitting certain days at one period and reversing the procedure. For example. Place your publicity one week on Sun-day, Tuesday and Thursday, and the following week on Monday, Wednesday and Friday-using Saturday now and then as it seems to suit one's purpose. The constant or rather frequent publicity in comparative limited space is ofttimes preferable and more effective than occasional advertising in a or more conspicuous manner.

The Canadian Market for Portland Cement The demand for Portland Cement in Canada has increased remarkably during the last five years. In 1904 the total consumption of Portland Cement in the Dominion was 1,694,988 barrels, of which 784,630 barrels were imported. In 1908 the consumption, notwith-

standing the general industrial depression, was 3,134,338 barrels, and no less than 3,495,961 barrels were manufactured in Canada. Existing trade conditions indicate that the consumption during 1909 will largely exceed that of 1908. The increase is not abnormal, nor due to merely local causes. In the year 1888, it is estimated that less than 200,000 barrels of cement were manufactured on the North American continent; and the enormous growth of the business is shown by the fact that in 1908 approximately 55,000,000 barrels were there produced. The manufacture of Portland Cement commenced in Canada in 1888, but

until 1904 the importations into Canada of the foreign product exceeded the Canadian production.
