DUNGEON WITH RATS IN IT FRIGHTENS PRISONERS

Dr. Chambers Makes Defence of Jail Discipline Before Controllers.

SYSTEM IS CRITICIZED

Board Hears Statements for and Against, But Takes No Action.

Dr. Chambers, governor of the Toronto jail, appeared before the board of control yesterday morning, and in answer to certain criticisms which he held had been leveled against him, made his position clear, and by going into detail, placed facts before the board in regard to the conduct at the jail.

The governor maintained that he was not the architect nor the owner of the jail and its methods of punishment, and showed clearly that there are prisoners who can only be managed by some form of severe punishment, such as the cell known as the "dungeon." As to the assertion that this was the best possible place to be avoided, Mayor Church stated that there was no criticism of the governor personally, but of the system, but Dr. Chambers took it that he was the one against whom the remarks were made.

The Provincial Budget

Hon. T. W. McGarry introduced his budget yesterday as provincial treasurer in a speech which was admirably clear and comprehensive and pervaded with a confidence and buoyant tone well calculated to begot the necessary optimism which the people of the province need in such a time of stress and self-denial.

His appeal to the opposition to recognize the advantage of leaving the war funds open to be applied on any emergency that occurred was but a part of a general appeal for unity of sentiment in the legislature while the war was on.

With respect to the figures of the budget it was stated that the receipts had exceeded the receipts of any other year by over a million dollars.

Mr. McGarry turned to the new taxation rendered necessary by the demands of the war. He read a list of the contributions from other important sources, and showed that Ontario had done more than all the rest together.

The new taxes include an extra half million from the motor licenses. A cent a head on all who attend places of entertainment, picture shows, theatres, rinks or the like, is expected to give \$850,000.
