

FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
NOTRE-DAME HOSPITAL
MONTREAL.

Year 1884-85.

Notre-Dame Hospital was established for the cure and relief of the sick, without distinction of race or creed. The nursing of the patients is entrusted to the reverend Grey Nuns, fourteen of whom reside continually in the Hospital. In addition to these, two ladies of the same community come to the Hospital every evening, to watch the sick during the night.

The Hospital has a catholic chaplain or almoner who provides the help and consolation of religion to all who stand in need of it.

* * *

The corporation of the Hospital is composed of Ordinary Members, Life Governors and Elected Governors.

The business of the corporation is under the supervision of a board called the *Board of Governors*.

The medical service is entirely under the control of a board called the *Medical Board*.

Finally, the management and direction of the corporation are entrusted to a board called the *Board of Management*.

* *

Any person having paid a yearly contribution of at least five dollars becomes an ordinary member of the corporation and continues to be so as long as he pays such annual contribution. He has the right to attend, take part in the deliberations and vote for the election of Governors at the annual general meeting of all the members of the corporation, which takes place on the first Wednesday of July.

Any person having paid the sum of one hundred dollars becomes a *Life Governor* as long as he pays a yearly contribution of ten dollars.

The Life Governors are *ipso facto* members of the Board of Governors.

The *Elected Governors* are appointed at the general yearly meeting of the corporation. In no case can their number exceed twelve.

In order to be eligible as a Governor, one must have paid a sum of at least twenty-five dollars and must pay a yearly contribution of at least five dollars. The elected Governors have the same rights and privileges as the life Governors.

* *

The *Board of Governors* is composed of all the Life Governors, and of not more than twelve Elected Governors.

This Board transacts the general business of the corporation and meets at least four times a year, on the last Wednesday of March, June, September and December.

The Officers of the Board of Governors are a President, two Vice-Presidents and a Secretary.

The Board of Governors must report at the annual general meeting of the corporation on the state of general business, in accordance with a statement made by the Board of management.

* *

The *Medical Board* meets once a month, its officers being a President and a Secretary. This Board has the absolute control over the whole medical department of the Hospital. It watches over the sanitary arrangements, suggests the purchasing of surgical instruments, appoints the attending physicians, the house surgeons and assistants, and the physicians in charge of the out-door department. It determines the hours for the attendance of physicians, the admission of patients and consultation at the out-door department.

The medical Board makes regulations for the diet of patients and the behaviour of medical students and nurses; it has the

right to visit and examine the pharmacy at any time and to suggest whatever it may deem advisable in the interest of the Hospital.

In the interest of science, the attending physicians and surgeons, or in their absence, the house-surgeons have the right of performing a *post-mortem* examination on all patients dying in the public wards of the Hospital.

* * *

As it has been previously stated, the management, control and regulation of the corporation of the Notre-Dame Hospital are entrusted to the *Board of Management*.

This Board is composed of a priest of the Seminary of St. Sulpice, appointed annually by the said Seminary; of not more than six members elected annually by the Medical Board (three at least of whom shall be members of the said medical board), and of not more than six members of the Board of Governors, annually elected by that body.

The Board of Management reports to the Board of Governors every third month, eight days at least before the quarterly meeting of the said board.

The officers of the Board of Management are a President, a Treasurer and a Secretary.

The Treasurer has charge of all the money, debentures and titles of property belonging to the corporation. He receives all the subscriptions, donations, legacies and all other sums paid to the institution.

Eight days before the July quarterly meeting of the Board of Governors, the Treasurer must give to the Secretary of the said Board a faithful and minute statement of all the sums received and paid by him during the year.

The Board of Management meets once a week, every Monday, (the first Monday of each month being excepted) at 8 P. M.

* * *

The Hospital is opened to all the needy sick, *without any distinction of race or creed*.

The admission of patients is left entirely to the Medical Board. However no patient recognized as incurable or suffering from contagious disease or mental derangement, can be admitted. The same may be said of any woman in advanced pregnancy unless she has met with some accident endangering her life and necessitating immediate attendance.

Children under five years are not admitted, unless in certain cases requiring special treatment, and when the attending

physicians^t and surgeons deem it necessary. No patient is admitted whose ailments do not absolutely require his stay in the Hospital.

The Hospital has two out-door departments. A general out-door department under the control of the Medical Board and a department for the diseases of the eye and ear, under the direction of Dr. A. A. Foucher, surgeon oculist to the Hospital. The number of patients treated each year at the out-door departments is quite large.

The daily visit of the wards is made regularly at 11 A. M. by the attending physicians and surgeons. As will be seen further, the house surgeons make an additional visit morning and evening.

Besides the public wards where poor patients are admitted, there are in the Hospital private wards for each of the patients as have the means of paying. In these private wards, paying patients enjoy all the comfort desirable and may be treated by their own doctor or any physician of their choice. During the year 1883-84 the number of private wards has been increased to sixteen.

* * *

The house surgeon and his assistant reside in the hospital. They visit the wards at least twice a day, morning and evening. They examine all the patients suffering from serious or urgent diseases, and take charge of all cases brought in until the attending physicians arrive.

The house surgeon alone, or, in his absence, the assistant house surgeon has charge of the admission of patients.

If any urgent case is brought to the Hospital, the house surgeon must send for the attending physician or surgeon without delay. (Nearly all the physicians are connected by telephone with the Hospital.)

The house surgeon and his assistant must never be away from the Hospital when the attending physicians make their daily visit. If one of them is obliged to be absent at any other time, he must previously inform his colleague of the fact, so that one of them may be always present at the Hospital.

The house surgeon must enter or cause to be entered in books especially kept for that purpose, the names, age and sex of all the patients, the date of their admission and discharge, the treatment followed in each case, the state of the patient when discharged, the name of the disease he was laboring under and other peculiarities. He must also see that the prescriptions of the attending physicians and surgeons are carefully prepared, and if necessary, must attend personally the compounding of medicines.

The house surgeon and his assistant are not allowed to take charge of patients outside the Hospital nor even in the private wards of the Hospital. All their time and care must be devoted to the poor patients of the institution.

* * *

No medical student is allowed to attend the hospital unless he has previously taken his admission ticket.

Under no pretence whatever are medical students allowed to go into the wards in the absence of or without special permission from the attending physician.

During the daily visit, the medical students must follow the professor as it were *foot to foot*, that is to say, they must not examine nor talk to any other patient but to the one who is, at that moment, the subject of the clinical lecture.

Unless they are especially authorised to do so by the *chef de clinique*, students are forbidden to enter into conversation with patients.

* * *

In the course of the year 1884-85, the Hospital has purchased, from the estate Masson, for \$10,200, the property (heretofore occupied by B. Laporte) immediately next to the main building. This has enabled the Directors of the Hospital to give more accomodation for the dispensaries; new private and public wards have been opened, so that from 80 to 100 patients may now be accomodated at one time.

* * *

Seven new life governors have been elected during the year: Messrs R. B. Angus, Geo. Stephen, D. McIntyre, B. J. Coghlin, O. McGarvey, C. O. Beauchemin and Ed. Murphy. The Hospital has, through the death of Messrs C. S. Cherrier, Jas. Skelly and R. McCready, lost three of its most prominent benefactors. The Directors wish to offer here a particular token of gratitude to the memory of the late M. Jas. Skelly who has been one of the founders of the institution and whose generous charity was in many occasions, shown to the sick of the Notre-Dame Hospital.

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL BOARD FOR THE YEAR 1884-85.

On 30th of June, 1884, there remained in the Hospital (from the preceding year) 57 patients : 30 males and 27 females.

During the year ending June 30th, 1885, 1177 patients were admitted, 657 males and 520 females, making a total number of 1234 patients for the whole year.

In the general out-door department there were consultations, prescriptions, medicines, &c., given to 5609 patients, both catholics and protestants. Out of these were 2691 males and 2918 females.

In the out-door eye and ear department, 4696 patients were treated, including 2052 males, and 2644 females. Besides, 724 patients presented themselves at the surgical consultation and 156 at the medical consultation.

Thus the total number of patients treated at the hospital in both out-door and in-door departments was 10419.

REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE OF THE KERMESSE

1885

LADIES,

I hereby present to you an imperfect statement showing what has lately been accomplished in favor of the Notre Dame Hospital. According to the law of the Gospel, that the left hand should ever ignore what the right giveth, we should never publish our feats, our exploits for charity's sake, but rather leave to God to bestow the promised reward for a glass of water given in His name. If however we proclaim our charitable deeds, let it be an incentive to us and to those who follow in our footsteps to continue the work begun, and even to aspire to still greater results. Far from us all thought of self-applause, but rather let us give thanks to God who has been pleased to provide us with the means of relieving our poor and indigent brethren whose wants are so kindly administered to by those admirable nurses — the grey nuns of the General Hospital — founded in 1738, by the venerable Mother d'Youville of happy memory.

At the different meetings held in the Notre Dame Hospital during the month of December 1883, the committee of the Lady Patronesses, considering the enormous debt (\$32,000) which weighed so heavily on the Hospital, resolved to come to the relief of an institution whose benevolence reaches all classes, regardless of national or religious distinctions. With the approbation, therefore, of the Directors, it was decided to

open one of those grand bazaars, a "Kermesse," which would bring together all the nationalities under the standard of Christian charity, which would procure us sufficient means to reduce, at once, the debt on the property, and to increase the revenues of the Hospital. Having at the outset submitted our plans to His Lordship the Bishop of Montreal, permission was obtained to open this bazaar for the above mentioned purpose. The blessing He so kindly bestowed upon us was a happy omen of the success of our enterprise.

At the meetings held in March and April, 1884, the Lady Patronesses begged Mrs Thibaudeau to preside over the undertaking, and charged her, meanwhile, with the general organisation of the Kermesse. Mrs Thibaudeau displayed in the carrying out of our plans all her energy, her influence, as well as the resources of her mind and heart. She obtained from the City Council the right to hold the Kermesse under tents on the Place d'Armes. This site, formerly illustrated by the great military feats of Maisonneuve and other remarkable men, was destined shortly to become, at the voice of charity, the scene of a veritable tournament in which the different nationalities of our City would give proof of constant and enthusiastic courage and devotedness.

A number of ladies generously concurred in Mrs Thibaudeau's plans; all in facts were eager to proffer their services, each one accomplishing prodigies of charity in order to bring the fair to a favorable issue. The following shows the organization of the Kermesse with the names of the ladies who took an active part therein.

Having thus paid a grateful tribute to the Ladies who lent their earnest support for the success of the Kermesse, we owe it in justice to the Trustees of the Hospital to mention their hearty co-operation in the way of advice, suggestions, &c., &c. They spared neither trouble, nor ingenuity in the creation of the tents, which were indeed, truly superb, being in the form of a cross, measuring two hundred feet in length and width, and procuring every imaginable comfort. It is both a pleasure and a duty to make the names of these gentlemen known to the public: Hon. Senator Thibaudeau, Messrs. O. McGarvey, E. A. Genereux, R. J. Devins, G. Drolet and Dr. E. P. Lachapelle.

The plan being traced out; each one having her placed assigned, the *Ambulance* costume adopted, and the bazaar fixed for the 2nd of June, thus organized and directed by our indefatigable President, all went to work in good earnest. Along the whole line marvels of feminine skill were produced in the way of fancy work of every description. Large collections were taken up for supplying the dinner tables with refreshments, bonbons, flowers and cigars. The proprietors of the Bonsecours, St. Lawrence, St. Ann and St. Antoine markets are entitled to a grateful and special mention for our Kermesse and Christmas dinners, as well as for our winter provisions. To these kind friends we never extended our hand in vain ; they always provided us with the best of meats, fowl, fruits and vegetables. The influence obtained through one of them, who escorted our Ladies on their messages of charity, was of unbounded profit to us. In the name of the Hospital we extend them and their families our most cordial acknowledgements.

Both rich and poor contributed freely to the formation of the Kermesse. In this great charity festival, the most perfect harmony prevailed. We regret that the limits of the present report do not allow us to give the names of all these generous donrers, both Catholics and Protestants. May God amply reward their charity, so often appealed to, which invariably met with a willing response. The Sisterhoods, among which the venerable Superiors of the Grey Nuns, of the Congregation of Notre-Dame, of the Hochelaga Convent, of the Sisters of Mercy, Sisters of Providence, of the Good Shepherd, and of the Sacred Heart, honored us with their delicate attention, and offered us liberal contributions. Even some of the communities of Quebec, particularly the Sisters of the Good Shepherd, and numerous friends residing in the above City, as also other parties in

Ottawa, Three Rivers, St. Hyacinthe and St. Johns, favored us with bountiful alms. The Sulpician Fathers and the Managers of the Pacific and Grand Trunk Railways were princely in their gifts. From afar we would mention a gracious letter accompanying Archbishop Taché's donation; magnificent paintings from the Sisters of Jesus and Mary, Oakland, California; and rich offerings forwarded to our President by her friends in New-York and England.

On the appointed day, June 2nd, one hundred and thirty-three Ladies were at their post, wearing the simple but elegant costume *d'ambulance*, which happy idea originated from our President. Two days previous, great activity had been displayed in gathering under the tents the various articles intended for the fair. Our tables were literally loaded, each one presenting the peculiar characteristic of its nationality. At the head of the Cross formed by our tents, stood Albion's daughter, shielding with her Gracious Majesty's proud standard her objects of luxury, both numerous and diversified. Facing the British Lion, America's fair representative sheltered her untold wealth under her starry banner in one of the arms of the cross. For the purpose of installing her marvelous lottery, France erected a palace on pillars exhibiting the tricolors of her Republic. Erin, with charity more ethereal, raised a castle of ice and ice cream to refresh the willing subjects of our New Empire. Her daughters ambitious to multiply their receipts, transformed themselves for the occasion into fortune-tellers, dwelling in a fairy's abode which was adorned with the traditional *crêmaillère*, the usual instruments of music, the wheel of fortune and the cards indispensable to unraveling the mysteries of the future. Their president, attired in the costume of the Gipsy Queen, bore herself proudly among the young maidens who surrounded her, promising good luck and happiness to the bountiful giver. The young and blooming *Canadienne* held her lottery tables at the foot of the cross, under the new colors of the Dominion, while garlands of maple leaves were entwined in every direction throughout the immense space reserved to French Canada.

The dining room, not the least interesting feature of the fair, occupied an entire arm of the cross. Through the draperies which hung at the entrance, could be seen tables laden with flowers and crystals, and with the most tempting and varied meats. Feats of valor were here accomplished under the unremitting exertions of our devoted Mrs Grenier. This department required special attention; as many as four hundred lunches were daily served, besides a sumptuous dinner in the evening. The celebrated Vatel would not have survived such success, had he not died of grief for failing to provide the roast at the twenty-fifth table of the King.

The fountain of the Place d'Armes, had become a real octagon kiosk full of flowers, refreshments, ice, fruits, creams bonbons and cigars, with a thousand charming and nameless trifles. The kiosk culminated in a high pyramid, adorned with graceful hangings shields and foliage beneath which were sheltered the fair vendors of so many rare and pretty objects. Around the tastefully decorated pillars, little news-girls were stationed, who sold the city papers for the profit of the Kermesse. We would here express our very grateful acknowledgments for this kind deed to the proprietors of *La Minerve*, *La Patrie*, *The Star*, *Le Monde* and *The Gazette*.

Our immense cruciform tent disappeared under the most varied and the most artistic adornments, due to the generosity of our well-known artist, Mr. Beullac. The Bell Telephone Company's apparatus was on hand to enable the President, at any moment, to order supplies for the Kermesse; — even a safe had been provided for the circumstance. Our skilfull artist, Mr. Archambault, took photographic views of our tables, the profits of which were shared with the Hospital. A handsome sum was realized from the raffle of two young bears, whose dam had been slain by one of our Canadian hunters. Some canaries and parrots donated to our President by the officers of a ship lying at the wharf, were sold for a considerable amount.

On June 2nd, 1884, at 3, P. M., the Hon. Chief Justice Dorion, accompanied by a number of citizens, opened the Kermesse in the most glowing terms. Our lady President, in her usual graceful manner, did the honors of her odd dwelling. The tents with the wealth they contained, with their luxurious decorations, and the effect of the *Ambulance* costume, presented a fairy-like aspect. Familiar as we were with the arrangements, we could not refrain from admiring the ingenuity which had produced so original a combination. No wonder therefore, that our visitors were struck with admiration! The tables were inspected; the master-pieces extolled; a wish to taste of so many good things was expressed; — but the pleasures of the eye and the palate had to be paid for, hence money was freely spent. The appearance at the evening was that of an enchanted palace of the Arabian Nights. Electric light, due to the generosity of the Electric Company, like luminous spheres, invited the passers-by to enter and do a charitable deed for the love of God. During eight consecutive days we stormed the purses of our guests. A hearty response was made to every appeal. — People gave, — gave bountifully, — gave unceasingly. Night after night the same enthusiasm prevailed, so fully were our friends carried away by the success of this gigantic enterprise.

The orchestra regaled us during these festival days with the finest compositions of the great masters. The *Kermesse Journal*,

the offspring of M. Provencher's generosity, wittily related in every conceivable tongue and dialect the daily feats of this extraordinary assembly, and invited our City and Country friends to take part in a festival unique as it was beautiful.

However, the tableau of the Kermesse had its shades as well as its lights. On the second day a fearful storm broke over our city, and unfortunately our tents yielded to the fury of the elements. The French and Canadian sections sustained severe injury. At the first thunder-clap, while the rain was falling in torrents, every one fled for safety. Our President, however, stood at her post, retaining all her self-possession in the midst of a disaster which threatened our edifice with ruin. She gave orders to protect those parts most exposed to danger, thereby, reassuring the Ladies, and when the storm had abated, she attended to the necessary repairs, and requested the orchestra to pour forth its liveliest strains. The Ladies animated by her example readjusted the tables, and once more commenced the sales. Our guests rivalised with one another, in efforts to make us forget a misfortune, which had spread fear into the hearts of some, and caused the loss of a few hundred dollars.

At last the golden days of the Kermesse are waning; with one stroke of her magic wand our President realizes \$15,000. All comment is useless.—Gratitude flows from every heart. Thanks, a thousand thanks! Thanks for our poor! May God reward a hundred-fold all our kind benefactors.

These eventful days closed by an amateur concert under our tents. It was a favorable opportunity of conveying our gratitude, with a memento to our worthy and gracious President who had not spared neither health, nor trouble, nor money in the organization of this gigantesque entreprise.

Ladies, these happy days spent together under the same tent, under the guardianship of Christian charity, seated around the same table, sharing one another's joys and fatigues established the most cordial relations between the different nationalities, and endeared to us the person whose hand had so skillfully harmonized all conflicting elements. We gladly offered the hommage of our appreciation and esteem to the originator of this marvelous scheme in presenting her with a lasting memorial of those days spent in the service of the poor.

Such is a brief summary of the Kermesse, which required four months preparation, and a session of eight days which have now fallen into the domain of legend, so incredible do they appear.
