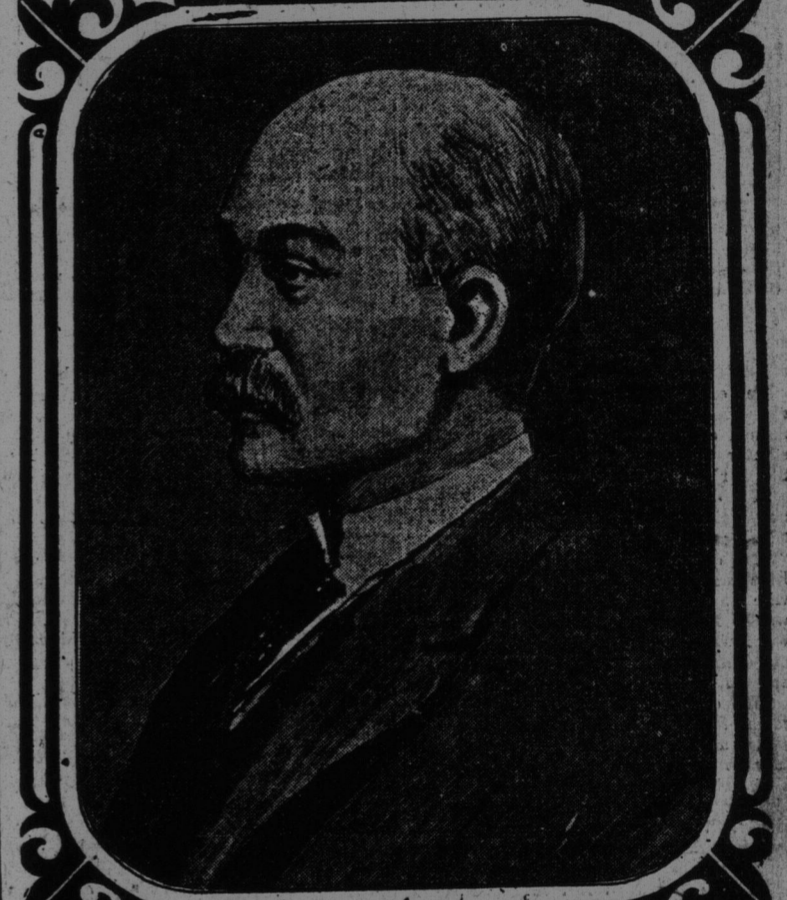
ST. JOHN DELEGATION SAW THE PREMIER AND HON. SYDNEY FISHER

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 19--(Special)--The St. John delegation waited on Mr. Fisher acting minister of public works, at 10 o'clock this morning in his office in the public works department. NEW YORK, Feb. 19--(Special)--The jury in the Thaw case, which opened this morning, Dr. Britton D. Evans, the defence attorney, was the first of the characters of the case to appear. When Mr. Jerome arrived, he passed close to the expert but did not speak. Thaw entered the courtroom when called, with his usual quick step and at once began an animated conversation with Dr. Evans. A decided surprise was sprung by the defence in recalling Mrs. Evelyn Thaw to the stand immediately after her court convening.

HIS LITTLE SONG WAS A GIVE AWAY

But for His Vocal Efforts Richard Joyce Might Have Passed Himself Off As a Victim of Heart Failure.

In the police court this morning Daniel Curran was fined \$4 for drunkenness. Richard Joyce, a youth of 22 years, was arrested for being drunk on Peppers' wharf yesterday by Sergeant Caples and was taken to the police station. When arrested yesterday Joyce immediately placed himself on the floor of the cell and holding on to his left side sobbed and begged the sergeant to get his friends and a doctor. Meantime the prisoner's eyes rolled heavenward and the sergeant, thinking that something might be wrong went into the cell to see if Joyce's heart was beating. The prisoner straightened out and to all appearance was dead. The sergeant, however, is found a new one on the force, and soon found that Joyce was holding his breath. SUDDEN DEATH OF SIR WM. HINGSTON

MONTREAL, Feb. 19 (Special)--By the death of Sir William Hingston, which occurred suddenly at 9 o'clock this morning, one of the most conspicuous figures is removed from the financial and medical circles of Montreal. At the time of his death Sir William was president of the City and District Savings Bank, probably the strongest institution of its kind in Canada. He was also one of the most prominent medical men in the Dominion. In 1886 Dr. Hingston was appointed to the senate following his defeat in St. Anne by James McShane, now harbor master. He was soon afterwards knighted for his distinguished medical services. In 1875 he married Margaret, daughter of Hon. D. A. MacDonald, then lieutenant-governor of Ontario. He was 78 years of age.

CROWN LANDS REPORT. Table with columns for Year 1906 and Year 1907, listing various land sales and revenues.

The increase of over \$7,000 from hunting licenses is a notable fact, showing that the big game of the province is an asset of increasing value.

During the year there has been increased activity in the lumber industry, owing largely to the demand for lumber of all kinds, and the steady condition of the market.

Reference is made in the report to several serious fires on crown lands last year, and the vast importance of measures for better protection of the forests.

Regarding game, the surveyor general expressed the view that all fire warden should also be fish and game wardens.

The paragraph relating to immigration speaks of the children from Middlesex Homes in England, and of the arrangements with the Salvation Army.

The paragraph relative to mines and minerals is as follows: "Considerable development work has been done in Gloucester and Kings counties, in boring and prospecting for iron ore, and though the undertaking has been somewhat expensive the results are not altogether unsatisfactory."

The department of agriculture at Ottawa has issued a Bulletin on the maple sugar and syrup industry, going fully into an explanation of the process of manufacture, with many fine illustrations.

The average annual maple sugar output of Canada approximates 17,804,825 pounds (census of 1901). The money value of that of 1901 is placed at \$1,780,482.

The royal commission has brought the telephone company in Toronto to terms, and an arrangement satisfactory to the girls employed has been offered and accepted.

The prohibition amendment met in the Nova Scotia Legislature the customary fate of such motions when made purely for political effect.

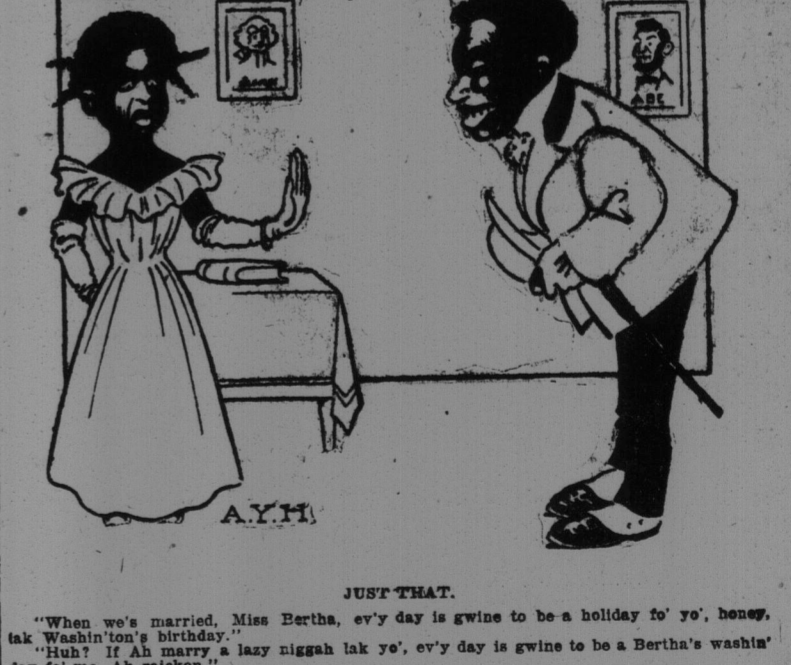

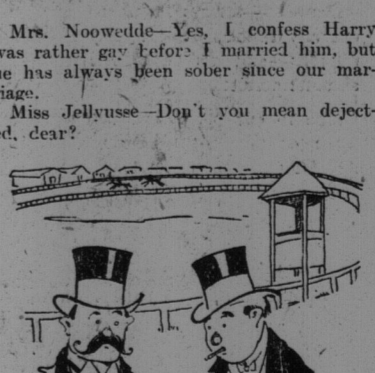

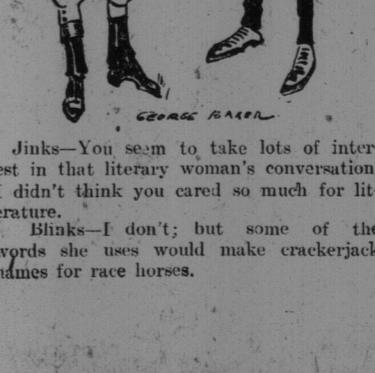

WILL GET AFTER THE RAILROAD COMPANIES FOR TORTURING CATTLE FOR FOOD OR WATER, IN VIOLATION OF UNITED STATES LAWS--THE JAPANESE IMMIGRATION QUESTION.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 14.—The department of agriculture is hot after the railroads for their violation of the new Cattle Transportation Act. It will be remembered that a law was passed during the administration of General Grant making it obligatory upon the railroads to feed, water and rest the cattle that they were hauling from the western states to Chicago, St. Louis, Buffalo and other eastern cities, every twenty-eight hours and to continue this rest in suitable protected pens for at least five hours. The humane societies of the country endeavored to enforce this law, which made it so embarrassing for the railroads and the men engaged in the cattle transportation, that last winter they came with a powerful lobby and in spite of the protests of the humane societies, forced through a bill extending the periods of cattle torture from twenty-eight to thirty-six hours. They would not have been able to get this bill through congress, however, had it not been for the approval of the secretary of agriculture. They showed a letter from Mr. Wilson in which he expressed the opinion that the thirty-six hour measure was necessary and humane. But the most interesting part of the story is that since the thirty-six hour bill has been passed, the detectives of the government have discovered at least five hundred instances in which railroads have retained the animals on the cars without rest, food or water not only for thirty-six hours but for an average of forty-five hours and in some instances have actually kept them for ninety-two hours. A number of the infractions of this thirty-six hour law have been certified by the agricultural department to the department of justice and it is understood that prosecutions and fines will be relentlessly enforced.

AN ADVANCE IN LUMBER

English Dealers Make Contracts Ten to Twenty per cent Higher Than Last Year. Ottawa, Feb. 18.—The price of lumber this year will see an increase, in Ottawa as elsewhere, in all lines. A conservative estimate places the increase at from ten to fifteen per cent, over the figures of last year, and this will mean a corresponding increase in the expense of building operations. The English dealers completed their purchases for the year last week. The contracts were mostly made in Ottawa, and the prices asked were well in excess of last year's figures. It is understood that a high as twenty per cent. more was paid by the English dealers for some lines of lumber.

THE SMALLPOX SITUATION

THE KNOCKER

There are two health departments in St. John. The board of health has been much criticised because of its alleged failure to look after the public health; and this may have been the determining cause of the inauguration of a health branch of the street department. Whatever the cause, the city is exceedingly fortunate in having a dual service. The board of health keeps a vigilant eye on the elusive and insidious microbe, and the street department takes care that the citizens get exercise. Exercise is healthful. The degree of ingenuity displayed by this health branch is certainly unique. It is well known that there are a number of citizens who gravitate between their homes, the Union Club, and Prince William street. They get so little exercise that they are constantly subjected to the ravages of indigestion. This lamentable fact did not escape the attention of the health branch of the street department. Hence we observe that in sending the sidewalk on Princess street hill this morning the sand was scattered on one side from the Union Club to Canterbury street, and on the other side from Canterbury street to Prince William. Thus, whether one of these indolent and obese persons wanted to walk or slide from Charlotte to Prince William street he was compelled to break the journey at Canterbury street, and walk over to the other side. The additional exercise helped his digestion, and the artifice of the health branch was responsible for the benefit.

A good deal has been said and written upon the present tax system in St. John and the newspapers have also noted the many young men of the city who have left their native haunts and who have sought fair fortune, perhaps in other parts of Canada, but more often in the republic to the south of us.

THE PYTHIAN CELEBRATION

Local Knights Will Entertain in York Assembly Rooms This Evening. An occasion of more than ordinary interest to members of the order of Knights of Pythias is the celebration of the fortieth anniversary of the order, which will be held in the York assembly rooms this evening.

The first part of the evening will be taken up with a musical and literary programme commencing at 8 o'clock. Included in this programme will be an overture by Harrison's orchestra, an address of welcome by the presiding officer, Adjutant Alfred Dodge of the First Regiment of the maritime provinces, solos by Mrs. R. THE KNOCKER

Has it ever occurred to the wise ones that there may be a connection of cause and effect between a tax levying system which bears heavily on young men who are not property owners and the fact that young men are leaving St. John, for other fields of endeavor. The contention may be raised that the prospect of better remuneration for their labor than they can get in St. John. Well, what does this inducement mean; wherein is its drawing power? It means nothing if not that the worker after paying the cost of house rent would be higher here than it is now. Is house rent so much cheaper in St. John than elsewhere? How does it compare with Portland, Me. or Halifax where the taxes are not as high and the standard of wages about the same? If anything the comparison will be found to St. John's disadvantage. But that is an aside. What it costs a man for his lodging his food and his clothes is very largely a matter of his own choice. What it costs him for taxes is something which he cannot control except by reducing his earning power. And the fact remains that \$13.40 is an outrageous tax for a man who earns \$12 a week.

THE KNOCKER

Perhaps the present tax system is a production to some of the aldermen now in city hall. If the taxes were lower perhaps a larger proportion of small wage earners would be able to pay them. There would be a larger proportion of men with votes and there would unquestionably be a smaller proportion of incompetent civic administrators.
