FIFTEEN KILLED IN EXPLOSION

Thirty People Were Wounded and Whole Business Section of Jellico, Tenn. Wrecked by Explosion of Dynamite--Bodies of Dead Buried in Debris.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Sept. 21.—Fifteen persons are believed to have been killed, and probably thirty injured, and almost the entire business section of Jellico, Tenn., was wrecked by a terrific explosion of dynamite early today in a car in the yards of the Louisville and Nashville Railroad.

AUSTRALIA AND CANADA

Negotiations Between Them for Preferential Trade Arrangement are Now Going on.

OTTAWA, Sept. 21 (Special).—Premier Deakin, of Australia, says that communications from his government to the government of Canada on the subject of a preferential trade arrangement between the two countries remain unanswered. As a matter of fact the dominion government has taken more practical steps towards bringing this about than mere punctual exchange of communications.

FOR A LARGER NAVY BUENOS AIRES, Sept. 21.—According to the Nation, the government proposes to expend \$25,000,000 of the \$32,000,000 which it has asked for in purchasing three large iron clads, nine torpedo boat destroyers and torpedo boats.

REV. DR. ALLISON SPEAKS OUT ON MISSION QUESTION

MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 21.—(Special).—Further discussion of the report of the committee on missions occupies the whole of yesterday afternoon's session of the Methodist General Conference. The clauses of the report which came under consideration were those recommending that the work of the missionary society be divided into two departments, the home and the foreign, and that the general conference elect a secretary for each who would have charge of his own department.

SAILORS TELL TALES OF CRUEL TREATMENT ON STEAMER BOERIC

SYDNEY, N. S., Sept. 21.—(Special).—An inquiry has been received here from a firm of Glasgow solicitors with respect to the treatment accorded even of the sailors of the steamer Boeric that had been arrested at this port, for refusing duty on board ship.

One man, named Williamson, was for five days shackled round a station and could not be down for part of the time, with the sea beating in upon him. Another, named Haddock, was five days in the forepeak, handcuffed and shackled to a ladder. Another, named McKinnon, was placed in a bunk with absolutely no light, handcuffed and fastened so that he could not get up.

METHODIST CONFERENCE

Re-organization Proposals Disposed of This Morning--Elections Now On.

MONTREAL, Sept. 21.—(Special).—The general conference this morning disposed of the re-organization proposals in four departments. In mission work a compromise was adopted without discussion. The compromise provides for the election of two general secretaries and a division of the work into home and foreign departments.

THE C. P. R. WILL BUILD TRESTLE

In This Way They Hope to Run Rails on Union Street, West End.

Arrangements were being made by the C. P. R. this morning to build a trestle for the Union street crossing. The work will be done by the West, for the accommodation of their rails. A large quantity of piling was being hauled out of the water and placed near the scene of the work.

NEW JUDGE WILL COME FROM WEST

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 21.—(Special).—The minister of justice will be in the city to-morrow to attend a meeting of the cabinet. It will be necessary to appoint at once a judge for the supreme court in place of the late Judge Sedgewick. The court meets on October 2nd, and it is possible that Chief Justice Fitzpatrick may be able to sit on some of the cases. It is almost certain that the new judge will come from British Columbia.

MARSH BRIDGE NEEDS REPAIR

Mayor Sears Will Bring Subject to Attention of Board of Works This Afternoon.

A special meeting of the water and sewerage board was held this morning, at which the director and Engineer Hunter were present, and explained matters in connection with the installation of the new system. The mayor stated to the board that everything had been satisfactorily explained and the work would be done as had originally been decided by the council.

STRUCK HIS WIFE AS RESULT OF THE BLOW Mrs. T. B. Galbraith is in Precarious Condition, and Unless She Improves Her Husband will Find Himself in Trouble.

Citizens in north end were very much excited last night about six o'clock when they learned that Thomas B. Galbraith, residing at 19 Moore street, had assaulted his wife in such a way as might prove fatal.

The story as told is that Galbraith has been drinking for some time and as a result became dangerous. He is a powerfully built man and last night, about six o'clock, he became angry at his wife and hurled a sugar bowl at her from the table. The missile struck the unfortunate woman with great force, and she was knocked down. Dr. C. M. Pratt was hurriedly sent for and on arrival at the Galbraith home found that the poor woman had been seriously injured.

KING'S DAUGHTERS MEET IN ANNUAL CONVENTION

FREDERICTON, N. B., Sept. 21.—(Special).—The seventh convention of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island branch of the order of King's Daughters opened here this morning, with about fifty delegates in attendance.

MONTREAL STOCKS

MONTREAL, Sept. 21.—(Special).—There was a distinct undertone of weakness to the stock market today, although the declines were not very heavy in view of the absence of selling pressure to pronounced extent.

FUNERALS

The funeral of the late Mrs. Mary A. Stock was held this morning at 8.30 o'clock from the residence of Martin Burns, 280 Duke street. The body was taken to the church of St. John the Baptist, where requiem mass was celebrated by Rev. Fr. Chapman. Interment was made in the new Catholic cemetery.

RAISED TO PRIESTHOOD

Rev. J. W. B. Stewart, of Hampton, formerly curate of Trinity church, was ordained priest on Sunday last at Bangton by Bishop Worrell. The ordination took place in the Bishop's Chapel. Rev. Mr. Stewart was educated at Kings College and later at Belier's Divinity College, Connecticut.

CLEARING THE WRECKAGE

HONG KONG, Sept. 21.—Practically all the Beuchstein troops and 300 of the West Kent Regiment are cooperating today in clearing the wreckage of the recent typhoon. Prodigious efforts are being made in the recovery of decaying bodies, which are being carried off in caulked boats.

CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 21.—Four prominent college professors, one a member of the University of Toronto faculty, escaped from death almost by a miracle in Mexico last Wednesday, after one of the most daring and arduous expeditions ever attempted to gain the top of Mount Orizaba.

ICE SHORTAGE IN NEW YORK

Caused by the Non-Arrival of Coasting Vessels With New Supply of Ice Aboard.

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—The prophecy of President Wesley M. Oler, of the American Ice Co., made before the grand jury in its investigation a month ago that the city would suffer a shortage of ice supply before the new winter ice could reach here in January, was made good today.

IMPRESSED WITH WHEAT COUNTRY

Manufacturers' Excursion now Journeying Westward from Winnipeg.

MOOSEJAW, Sask., Sept. 21.—(Special).—The manufacturers' excursion has been a pleasant break in the journey westward. The Trunk Railway traffic expert, Joseph Regina, at one o'clock, a stop was made of three hours. Another swift run of an hour and a quarter brought the visitors to Moosejau, in many respects a close rival of Regina. The tourists were greatly impressed with the splendid wheat country through which the train traveled.

ONTARIO'S BIG CROP OF GRAIN

TORONTO, Sept. 21.—(Special).—It is estimated by Canadian Pacific and Grand Trunk Railway traffic experts, that there are between 107,000,000 and 108,000,000 bushels of grain grown in Ontario this year which will have to be taken to the end of December. Wheat, oats, corn, peas, and barley and beans are included in these figures. Of this amount a portion will only be taken to export in the form of flour, prepared cereals, and other manufactured foods.

CLAIMS DAMAGES FROM DR. BAXTER

Ott. O. Smith Sues for \$1,000 Damages for Injuries From Assault.

NO GROUND FOR PANIC.

The harbor master has gone to Boston to inspect a dredge, which the aldermen are not agreed that they want, even if it could be purchased at a low price.

INCORRECT STATEMENTS.

The Montreal Herald is much concerned over the situation at St. John, as will be seen on reading the article quoted in another column of the Times.

The cause of the Herald's mental disturbance is found in its announcement that "it is stated by the St. John Globe that a month more must elapse before the necessary dredging will be far enough advanced to permit the sinking of cribs for the new structure."

The Herald should have waited for the revised edition of the Globe's statement, which is that the dredging in question was practically completed when the first statement appeared, is now altogether completed, and it is hoped that the first crib will be placed tomorrow.

This port suffers from incorrect statements sent abroad. It is not long since the weekly journal, Canada, published in London, informed its readers on the authority of newspaper reports emanating from St. John, that the Empress steamers would probably not be able to find accommodation at this port next winter.

The unfortunate delays in connection with the west side works are bad enough, and there should be no exaggeration.

COMMANDER PEARY.

It is stated that news from Commander Peary is expected before October 1st, by those familiar with the plans of the daring navigator and Arctic explorer.

"We cannot believe that Commander Peary, with the knowledge he has of the far north, with the experience of his 12 years spent there, with his indomitable will and everlasting courage, and with the wonderful equipment of the Roosevelt, has gone astray in a country and in

waters and in ice with which he is familiar. Sometime, soon or late, we are morally certain to have news from Peary."

In the vote on the question of union with the Wesleyan street church last evening, taken in the Waterloo street church last evening, 43 favored and 37 opposed union.

Mr. Jerome was asked this week what he thought of the present strength of Mr. Hearst in New York state. His reply was characteristic: "I think precisely what I have always thought about it—that the strength of Hearst rests entirely on the cowardice of the men who assume to be Democratic leaders, but who do not and cannot lead the Democrats of this state."

The humor of the situation in which he finds himself in Cuba doubtless impresses itself upon Secretary Taft. If there were any guarantee that the undertakings of one insurgent leader would be carried out by all the others, it might be possible to restore peace by arbitration of the difference; but that's the rub.

It is gratifying to note from the report of the Associated Charities that the past summer was a favorable one for the laboring men of St. John. Like conditions should continue through the winter.

The friends of the editor of the New Glasgow Chronicle are believed to be just a little anxious about him. In the last issue of his paper he wrote: "Among those whom we met while here at the mission meeting was Miss Kennedy, Upper South River, whom we knew as a school teacher at Country Harbor Cross Roads."

The Toronto Globe referring to building operations in that city, says: "Over nine million dollars invested in buildings in Toronto since the beginning of the year is the city's record, and one considerably ahead of any previous year."

A Toronto paper says: "A bequest of \$10,000 to the University of Toronto, the interest therefrom to be utilized from time to time in assisting progressive young Canadian inventors, is contained in the will of Aeneas MacCharles of Sudbury, who died in Montreal last August."

Rev. Dr. McCoy, of the M. E. church of the south, addressing the Canadian Methodist General Conference, described professional evangelists as "peripatetic peddlars of a rag-time gospel."

When Commodore Stewart reads in a St. John paper that "there were some exciting racing at Chatham yesterday," restoratives may have to be applied. But when the Commodore recovers and settles down to his work a record may be broken.

EQUITY COURT

Judgment Given This Morning by Judge Barker in Several Important Suits.
