On the 15th, at 8 p.m., the Club formally demanded that General Skryznecki should be ordered to Warsaw. Hereupon they proceeded to the Castle, where the 200 National Guards scarcely offered any resistance. The seven prisoners of State were found, were murdered in their rooms, and the bodies thrown into the gutter, or hung up at the lamp-posts. The rioters then proceeded to the houses of several persons already acquired, and to the House of Correction, in which not only the agents of the late Policy, but also debtors and cheats, were confined; many of them were put to death, and their bodies were hung up without much ceremony. In this way thirty-five persons lost their lives during the first night. Among them were Generals Jankowski, Bukowski, Hargis, Salanski, and Bentkowski; the Russian Chamberlain Fustaine; a Russian lady of the name of Buzanov; the Councillor of State Hanekiewicz, who had been acquitted; Major Petrikowski, and several Police Agents. Lessel, the confessor, who had been acquitted, was saved with much difficulty by General Krukowicki.

The Halifax mail on Saturday put us in possession of London dates to the morning of the 8th September, brought by His Majesty's Ship Winchester, from Portsmouth.—The Reform Bill had at length passed the Committee, and was only awaiting its third reading to be sent to the Lords. Its ultimate fate will probably be speedily determined, as there is no reason to anticipate so prolonged a contest in the Upper House as has been maintained in the Commons.—The Winchester sailed a day too soon to bring accounts of the Coronation.

POLAND.—We hope and are inclined to the belief, that the statements in the English papers relative to this gallant but unhappy country, are greatly exaggerated. Some of the London editors indeed express strong doubts of the truth of the accounts, received as they had been through that prejudicial medium—the Prussian State Gazette. If happily they are correct, the fate of Poland is ere this sealed, and its liberties, its glories, and its hopes, again trampled into dust by the armed hordes of the Autocrat. It is too much to indulge the expectation that a People so inferior in force, distracted by internal dissensions, and reduced by treason and the sword, can long hold out against the overwhelming numbers and inexhaustible resources of Russia. But the well-trying courage of the Poles warrants the belief that their final success may not be achieved by an iron hand and blood-stained sceptre. It is to be feared that the vengeance of the subdued will scarcely be satisfied by the victims buried beneath the ruins of Warsaw.—Well would it be for the cause of humanity if England and France would unite their energies in behalf of Poland. There is surely far more in the history and the situation of this country, to awaken sympathy, than in the case of Belgium, and the success which has attended the interference of the Great Powers in the latter instance, shews what might be accomplished by prompt and well directed efforts in the former.

TRIAL OF THE AGITATORS.—We have in this day's paper given place to the account (from the Royal Gazette) of the trial and conviction of Hannovell, Wheelock, and Savage, for their late seditious disturbances at the Madawaska settlement.—We have also inserted the very able remarks of the Courier upon this trial; and to these as well as the clear exposition of the law delivered by the Learned Judge who tried the case, and pronounced the sentence of the Court, we earnestly beg to refer our readers. We offer no apology for having thus occupied so large a portion of our columns. Every inhabitant of New-Branswick feels, or ought to feel, a deep interest in these proceedings;—proceedings which concern the honor, no less than the security, of this and our sister Colonies, and the history of which will one day become a monument of historical importance.

QUEBEC, October 5.
The project of Colonial Representation in the British Parliament has been disposed of, for the present, with little prospect of future success. It is one of those theories which appear very fine, but cannot be reduced to practice. It was probably supported by some members merely as a means of defeating the Reform Bill; by others, on the supposition that it is practicable, and would be beneficial to the Colonies; and it is desired by them.

IN SO FAR AS THIS COLONY is concerned, and it contains a majority of the whole population of the British North American possessions, we do not think the project is desired. Lower Canada has never condescended to beg a seat in the House of Commons. It can have no apprehensions from a Reformed Parliament, in which it is to be presumed seats will never be bought nor sold. It has no interest as a component part of the Empire, which are likely to suffer in a Parliament where the interests of the United Kingdom, it must be supposed, will be considered and determined upon, by enlightened and patriotic representatives fairly chosen by the people.

AS TO ITS OWN PARTICULAR or local interests, it prefers taking care of them itself. If its inhabitants are truly represented in its own Legislative Assembly, and it must be their own fault if they are not, there is very little danger of those interests being sacrificed here, and almost a complete certainty that they will be respected elsewhere.—Nelson's Gazette.

Schr. Elizabeth from New-York.
We have just been favored with New-York papers to Friday last, brought by the above-mentioned vessel. The following is the only article we observe worthy of notice:—

New-York, Oct. 20.—Important Rumor from St. Petersburg. The Russian Daily Advertiser of yesterday furnishes the following paragraph. Our accounts by the way of London from St. Petersburg are of the 20th ult. This rumor is of the 20th from Constantinople.

We learn by the brig Cranstady, which arrived at Quantico on Saturday, that on the 20th of August, the day that vessel sailed from Constantinople, information was received from St. Petersburg, that the Russian government had notified the French Ambassador that his presence was no longer necessary, and that his papers were ready to be delivered to him. This information was derived from the Deputy of the American Consul at Constantinople, who conversed with the Consul, and was confirmed by the Captain of the Guard House at Constantinople, who signed the papers of the above named brig.
