





RT. HON. EDWARD WOOD.

ONE of the most coveted offices in the British Empire, that of Vice-roy of India, has been awarded to a commoner, the Rt. Hon. Edward Wood, commoner, the Rt. Hon. Edward Wood, Minister of Agriculture in the present cabinet, by the crown. As viceroy he will be regarded as royalty in India. The governor-general is the chief civil officer, but the viceroy is the King's personal representative and consequently treated as royalty.

He is the grandson of Sir Charles Wood, formerly Chancellor of the Exchequer, and the statesman who organized the government of India after the control exercised by the old East India Company passed to the crown, following the native insurrection in 1857.

Woods is 45 years old and was educated at Eton and Christ Church, Oxford. He was prominent in athletics while in both schools.

Press in a leader today urging the use of Maritime ports for grain carriage, says:

"R. C. Vaughan, of the Canadian National Railways, declared to the convention on Wednesday that the Canadian National Railway System would work itself out of its difficulties if a lot of dead dogs were not unloaded on it. It cannot by any stretch of the imagination be argued that putting in a low grain rate from Armstrong to the Maritime ports via the Transcontinental would be a dead dog. Grain has been hauled prolitably this way at a very low rate.

Mr. Vaughan further declared that the executives of the road of which he is a vice-president were all in favor of routing the greatest possible amount of Canadian freight through Canadian ports.

"If the directors are sincere in this they might well put a low through rate into force and allow circumstances to develop. There is still grain to be threshed in the West. There will be a big carryover in the terminals at the head of the lakes and in the interior elevators when navigation closes next month. Few seasons will be so favorable to testing out the Transcontinental as a grain route this winter.
