REBELS LOSE HEAVILY IN FIGHT IN **INDIA**

London, Nov. 16—(Canadian Press)—A Reuter cable from Delhi, India, says a company of the Gurkha rifles regiment holding the Pandikkad post, had a sharp engagement with 2,000 Moplah rebels, who attacked vigorously. Two-thirds of the rebels were killed while one British officer and three men were killed and thirty-four men wounded. One gun and some knives were captured

The record of other operations also discloses the use of artillery by the rebels. One hundred and four Moplahs with five guns were taken in an operation northeast of Calicut while in another conflict. New Black Fox Ranching fifty-six rebels were killed after severe fighting.
