## THE SITUATION IN MOROCCO SERIOUS

French Column Cut up, 64 Killed, 109 Wounded

### CAUGHT IN AMBUSH

Stranded Warship, Fired on by Natives and Sailors Captured by the Moors—Spanish Troops Begin a Combined Movement

(Canadian Press)  
London, June 14.—The situation in Morocco is generally thought to be critical. After the disquieting reports from the Spanish zone comes the news of fighting on the part of the French. The Chronicle's Paris correspondent telegraphed last night that a French force has been ambushed and seriously cut up in Morocco. The column under Colonel Mangin, which has been operating in the Tabla region, about 100 miles from Marrakesh, was surprised by a large force of the enemy near Kiga and before the column could extricate itself it suffered a loss of sixty-four dead and 109 wounded. Colonel Mangin had for some time established his headquarters at Madala. The latest news regarding the stranded warship General Concha, which was first spotted by natives, is that the gunboat Lauria rescued sixty-three of the crew, including thirteen wounded. Three are missing and nine have fallen to the hands of the Moors. The commander of the vessel fell dead on the bridge, shot through the eye. The crew Reina Regente bombarded a group of natives for two hours. Negotiations have begun for the surrender of the captured sailors. The Spanish have taken the offensive with the combined movement from Tetuan, Alcazar and Arila. Fighting has occurred at Alcazar. Reinforcements from Spain are being sent.

## "BRIDGIE" WEBBER GETS KNIFE THRUST

Gambler Stabbed in New York Street But Will Not Say Why or Tell Who Did It

New York, June 14.—"Bridgie" Webber, one of the four gamblers who testified against Police Lieutenant Becker and the gunman convicted of the murder of Herman Rosenthal, was stabbed in the shoulder early this morning, under circumstances which he seemed loathe to explain. He was in St. Vincent's Hospital today suffering some pain and weak from the loss of blood, but his wound will have no serious result. Although branded by some of his former associates as a "squealer," the "informant" closed up tight when detectives tried to pry from him at the hospital this morning the story of the attack upon him. At first Webber tried to even hide his own identity, and the fact that he had been wounded. The stabbing occurred in East Eighth street. Webber tried to walk away from the arm of a friend hiding the wound; but in Broadway he sank exhausted and admitted to a policeman that he had been stabbed. An ambulance carried him to the hospital. Detectives learned that Webber had been in a midnight engagement with Sam Paul. It appeared that Webber had been attacked shortly after concluding this engagement with Paul.

## CARSON CAMPAIGN IS TONING DOWN

No Talk Now of Disowning Allegiance to the King RATHER FLAT IN SCOTLAND

Only Glasgow Enthusiasm Is Among Orangemen — Tories Will Seek to Sur Over Collapse of the Charges in the Marconi Matter

London, June 14.—Sir Edward Carson's tour is producing no marked effect in this country. Meetings are well attended, but this obviously is due to the excellence of organization and not to anything new or spontaneous in popular feeling. It is significant that in Glasgow the only sign of anything resembling enthusiasm emanated from the Orangemen who, though numerous, form no index of Scottish opinion, as they practically are all immigrants from Belfast. The orientation in which Sir Edward Carson's campaign has been taken under the wing of the Orange lodges will not commend it to the electorate of Scotland, where there is a high standard of education and tolerance, nor are Scottish audiences enamored of the policy of opening ordinary political meetings with "O God Our Help is in the Lord," a proceeding which suggests that the party who use the Union Jack as an electioneering symbol are about to claim the religion of the nation as their private political property. The marked change in the tone of the oratory is not escaping notice. There is no talk now of inviting Germans over the same tongue-how touring the country to open parliament in Dublin. The halting tone which came so naturally in Ulster has been dropped, and compared with what we have had this is a pleasant change, but it does not wipe out the impression of the man who is being challenged on the walls of Derry under the inspiration of the same tongue-how touring the country with "homon citizenship" as their motto.

## SALARIES BEHIND; MINISTERS IN DEBT

Conditions Presented to Toronto Methodist Conference MOVE FOR WEEKLY OFFERINGS

Personal Canvass of Each Adherent Recommended — "Move Slowly" is Only Advice To Anglican Synod on Matter of Union

Toronto, June 14.—Salaries too small, salaries so much in arrears that ministers have to run into debt, antiquated methods of raising funds, obstinate finance boards blocking progress, are some of the conditions which the ministerial salaries committee of the Methodist church reported to the conference yesterday through the chairman, J. W. Flavell. To remedy these conditions they recommend that weekly offering envelopes be universal in adoption, that the stewardship of the church be promptly carried on each circuit be promptly with their payments, that finance committees be established and that personally canvass each adherent of the church, also that if the minister's salary be paid in full each month and necessary arrangements made for a bank credit if funds were not to hand. Toronto, June 14.—Only one reference was made to church unity in the report of the committee on the state of the church in the Anglican synod which was adopted without discussion. "It would seem to your committee," says the report, "that our Canadian churches would do well to exercise a wise self-control and to reach sympathetically and follow the great movement inaugurated in the American church for the consideration of faith and order and that in the meantime we can make our best contribution to the satisfactory solution of the problem by giving attention to the task of the church."

## CZAR'S ACTION SEEMS TO HAVE MADE PEACE ASSURED

London, June 14.—The intervention of the Czar in the Serbo-Bulgarian controversy was so timely and authoritative that peace now seems to be practically assured. His offer to arbitrate between the allies could not have been declined by either without stultification and what is of more importance, without risking the loss of all that has been gained in the war with Turkey. The intimation that pacific intervention, if disregarded, would be followed by military measures brought the Bulgarians to their senses for they could expect no consideration from Russia if the Slav cause were imperilled by a resort to the arbitration of battle. A "criminal struggle" it would be, the Czar says, for all the resources of diplomacy would probably not avail to localize hostilities. This is the spectacle that has haunted every statesman who has labored to harmonize the differences between Bulgaria and Serbia since the allies signed the treaty of peace with Turkey. The controversy between the most powerful allies of the Balkan countries must be settled right or wrong unnumbered times over before it can be settled right by a war that would involve one or more of the powers. Arbitration by Russia contains the promise of a just solution.

## VETERAN OF PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA DEAD

Rev. C. A. Doudiet Was Fifty-Five Years in Ministry

Montreal, June 14.—The death of one of the oldest members of the Presbyterian church in Canada, Rev. Charles A. Doudiet, is recorded. He had served the pulpit for fifty-five years. Rev. Mr. Doudiet was born in Switzerland eighty-one years ago and came to Montreal at the age of fourteen. After studying at Point Aux Trembles Mission, he was apprenticed as a carpenter, and later learned the trade of upholstery. He attracted attention in church circles, and was advised to undertake the organization. The election of officers has been carried on by letter ballot and the list is now complete. Membership is limited to the officers of provincial fruit growers' associations and such other persons as may be named by the association on recommendation of the executive.

## NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FRUIT GROWERS

Two Nova Scotians Are Included Among Provisional Officers

Ottawa, June 14.—At the last dominion conference of fruit growers, a movement was started for the organization of a Canadian national fruit growers' association. A draft constitution and provisional laws were adopted and J. A. Radcliff, dominion dairy and cold storage commissioner, was requested to undertake the organization. The election of officers has been carried on by letter ballot and the list is now complete. Membership is limited to the officers of provincial fruit growers' associations and such other persons as may be named by the association on recommendation of the executive. The provisional officers are: President, Robert Thompson, St. Catharines, Ont.; vice-president, S. C. Parker, Berwick, N. S.; secretary-treasurer, P. W. Hodgetts, Toronto; members of committee, W. C. Rickard, Vernon, B. C., M. Winstry, Victoria, Manning K. Ellis, Port William, N. S. The fruit division will now turn the matter over to the officers-elect.

## DRASTIC LAW AGAINST THE TRUSTS IN RUSSIA

Commission Reports Measure Which Will Give Government Firm Control of Them

St. Petersburg, June 14.—Russia, which has trusts in the very worst form, has prepared a bill to give the government firm control to rigid state control, and providing for their dissolution, and for the criminal punishment of their promoters. The anti-trust bill, which is the work of a commission sitting under the presidency of the minister of trade and industry, defines "trusts" and covers such combinations made by verbal agreement with the aim of regulating production and prices. Henceforth all such trusts must be registered with the minister of commerce, and full particulars of their capitalization, duration of agreement, aims, &c. given. Already existing trusts (which number many thousands) must be registered within six months of the bill becoming law. The trusts from date of registration are subjected to government control and inspection; the government can open inquiries into their operations; and can demand to see their books, correspondence, and other material. The government is to enforce its control by different kinds of measures. Where the operations of a trust prove to conflict with existing commercial laws, it may apply to the court to dissolve the trust and criminally to prosecute the promoters. Where the special provisions of the anti-trust law as to registration, production of accounts, &c. are violated, it can prosecute and demand punishment up to imprisonment or a fine of \$5,000. Where inquiry shows the trust's operations to be injurious to or dangerous for the national interests, it may "justify" or that is, are unreasonably raised or depressed; the government can take administrative measures of a kind which will probably prove more effective than the prosecutions and legal dissolution which are the remedy in America. It can raise or lower against the trust's interest the railway freight rates, increase, reduce, or abolish altogether import duties, and if these measures do not meet the case, impose also by administrative order an export duty. These measures may be taken only after an inquiry has been held into the conditions of the industry concerned, half the members of the inquiry commission being appointed by the minister of commerce and industry and half elected by industries concerned. The bill is being much criticized by Russian manufacturers, nearly all of whom are in some trust, syndicate, or informal combine.

## BANKERS EAT PORK AND BEANS AT SHANTY LUNCH GIVEN BY LUMBERMEN

Ottawa, June 14.—The convention of the New York Bankers' Association was brought to a close last night. This afternoon the visiting bankers, their wives and daughters were entertained by Ottawa Valley lumbermen. The fare consisted of pea soup, pork and beans, Dutch oven bread, doughnuts, maple syrup and tea. The delegates attended a reception and dance last evening, and this morning left by special train for their homes.

## BREACH BETWEEN THE GOVERNMENT AND DUMA

St. Petersburg, June 14.—A complete breach has opened between the Russian government and the Duma. The members of the cabinet have resolved that neither the ministers nor the heads of the government should appear in this house pending the re-establishment of conditions under which representatives of the government shall be secure from insult by the members of the Duma. The immediate cause of this decision was a remark made by M. Markoff, a reactionary member of the house during the debates of the estimates. While the minister of finance was speaking M. Markoff cried out: "Stealing cannot be tolerated." He added an allusion saying that his remark applied not only to the minister of finance, but to all the officials of the various departments of state. The ministers and officials in the house rose from their seats and left the place in a body. Later at a meeting of the cabinet the minister of the interior spoke strongly in favor of the dissolution of the Duma but he was outvoted, most of the ministers arguing that the conflicts between the cabinet and the Duma, were personal rather than political. Many of the ministers expressed the opinion that the quarrel would prove only temporary.

## THREE HUNDRED DROWN

Bombay, India, June 14.—Floods cut the loss of 300 lives today in the Palitana district on the Peninsula of Kathiawar, to the north of Bombay on the Arabian Sea. The inundations were caused by heavy rains.

## SOME OF VALLEY RAILWAY CULVERTS CONDEMNED

Fredrickton, June 14.—\$ almost sold in the local market this morning at sixteen cents a pound. The # has been a very good run in the last week. Some of the concrete culverts on the Valley Railway between this city and Springhill have been condemned by the government engineer.

## MINISTER AWAY

Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways, E. P. Gutelius, general manager, and F. P. Brody, general superintendent of the I. C. R., and the other members of the party who arrived in St. John last evening left again this morning at nine o'clock. A special train was provided to take them to Moncton where they will join the Ocean Limited en route to Halifax.

## HALF MILLION FOR MONTREAL THIS YEAR IN LICENSE FEES

Montreal, June 14.—The revenue from the city license will this year amount to \$500,000. May is the beginning of the license year, and the income for Montreal at the age of fourteen. After one year's license year, the amount collected was \$150,047, but in May of the present year the total was \$202,772. Every year the license returns are larger. The revenue for 1912 was \$421,212, which was more by \$50,000 than was taken on for the year previous. The collections from January to June 10, 1912, were \$281,148 and this year for the same length of time the amount was \$298,941, making an increase of \$57,194.

## CONDENSED DESPACHES

Baltimore, June 14.—Losses aggregating \$280,000 were caused by a fire last night at Wagner's Point. It started in the plant of the Martin Wagner Packing Company, canners of oysters, fruit and vegetables, and communicated to the plants of the east Brooklyn Box Company, totally destroying all. Lisbon, Portugal, June 14.—A Portuguese aviator named Manio, was killed today through the collapse of his aeroplane when he was flying at a height of 1,000 feet. Sofia, Bulgaria, June 14.—It is understood that the European powers intend to make a collective demand for the demobilization of the Bulgarian army as soon as the cabinet has been reconstructed. This is expected today.

## STOP KILLING CALVES; CUT DOWN MEAT PRICE

Appeal to Congress for Law Will Be Made by Washington Men

Washington, June 14.—Convinced that the high prices of meats could be sharply and effectively reduced through the enactment of a law prohibiting the slaughtering of calves, the Chamber of Commerce announces its intention to appeal to congress for some such legislation. Eminent physicians throughout the country will be asked to testify about the unwholesomeness of veal as food, and their testimony will be submitted to congress when the crusade is launched.

## SOMETHING NEW IN THE LINE OF SWINDLING

Many Duped by Clever Sharps Who Offered Free Land

Berlin, June 14.—The "Berliner Tagblatt" reports from St. Petersburg a remarkable swindling affair. A group of sufficiently plausible sharps circulated notices that the authorities, desiring to establish a new town in the plains near Nakhitchevan, on the Don, were prepared to give anyone a free title to 1,000 square yards of land, on condition that the settlers fenced in their allotments immediately and undertook to commence building within a reasonable time. People rushed to spot, where they were received by the swindlers, who assisted them in staking out their plots, and sold them, at high prices, large quantities of material for fencing. The settlers put up tents and camped on the ground, while the swindlers not only made money by the sale of materials, but acted as land agents and proceeded to sell and resell plots of land in return for good commissions.

## TOMORROW FATHER'S DAY

Honor Head of Family by Wearing a Rose

Spokane, Wash., June 14.—Father's Day, an institution started in Spokane three years ago by Mrs. John Bruce Dodd, will be observed in many of the cities of the United States, and in some other countries. Fathers will be honored by the wearing of a rose, red for the living and white for the dead. Mrs. Dodd has been actively promoting plans for a world-wide observance of Father's Day, and she announces that many cities in the following countries will fall in line tomorrow: Germany, Sweden, Korea, Japan, Mexico, Hawaii, Canada, and India. Mrs. Dodd has a letter from Adeline Hershey, a visiting nurse in a Honolulu prison, telling of her efforts there. Miss Hershey offered a prize to the prisoner who would make a correct count of the number of times the word "father" appears in the Bible. Nine men gave the correct answer, which is 1,650. Many churches in Spokane will hold Father's Day services.

## SAID TO HAVE BEEN SWINDLED OUT OF A QUARTER MILLION

Rome, June 14.—The Marquis and Marchioness Casali del Drago, heads of one of the oldest families of the Roman aristocracy, have been swindled by a steward to the extent of \$250,000 during a long illness. Last year the marquis signed a document empowering a steward to transact certain pressing financial affairs, and the man seems instead to have begun gambling on the stock exchange, losing as much as \$70,000 a day. Suddenly he vanished, taking with him \$80,000 in cash from the family safe.

## BE VACCINATED BEFORE YOU GO ON YOUR VACATION, SAYS NEW YORK HEALTH OFFICER

New York, June 14.—Vaccination before vacation is the advice advanced officially by Health Commissioner Lederle in a public statement. Typhoid, he declares, is often centralized from infected food and water in the country, and the disease is brought back to the city, where it develops after a few weeks. For persons who cannot afford to pay, he says, vaccination against typhoid will be given free and he advises also that persons seeking recreation outside the city "pay more attention to their sanitary surroundings and less to the scenery."

## BOURASSA ENDORSES BORDEN'S FIRST STAND

Says Canada Ought Not to Provide Ships or Men Unless It Has a Direct Voice in Imperial Affairs—This is What Borden Said a Few Months Ago

Edmonton, June 14.—That Canada's national obligations should be maintained by the extent of her national privileges and liberties and that, as the sole control of the army and navy lay with the British parliament, England should bear the whole cost of imperial defence, formed the principles of the Nationalist party as defined by Henri Bourassa. Nationalist leader, at a public meeting here last evening. Canada and the other self-governing colonies, said Mr. Bourassa, had absolutely no control and no voice in the government of the empire. The people of the United Kingdom through their parliament were the sole and absolute masters of the empire. Did a question of external policy arise, Canada was not consulted, the decision lying solely with the British parliament. Matters of foreign relations were arranged by English diplomats and settled by the English parliament, none of the colonies being consulted. Going on to deal more particularly with the Borden naval policy and the Nationalist reasons for opposing it, Mr. Bourassa said that Canada's sea-borne trade was Britain's trade, and the United Kingdom was just as much interested in protecting it in time of war as was the dominion. Depending as she did, on the overseas dominions for the greater part of her food supply, Britain was much more vitally interested in purchasing Canadian foodstuffs in time of war than was Canada in selling them. Even with all its snared and dangers, full-fledged imperial partnership was considered by Mr. Bourassa to be preferable to the "low, unglorified, jingo-inspired alternative offered to the Canadian people by the present government." Despite its dangers, said Mr. Bourassa, the full imperial partnership was inspired by high ideals of national equality, while the policy of the Borden government would simply result in the subordination of the Canadian people. That policy meant that Canada accepted an imperial policy over which she was denied, by the British government, the slightest share of control.

## MARY GARDEN ILL IN PARIS; MAY BE SERIOUS

Paris, June 14.—Mary Garden has been lying in her apartment here since the middle of May, and fears are entertained that her illness is of a serious character. When her indisposition began it was announced that she was unable to sing Salome because she had the grip, but by the opera management it was stated that she was too ill to sing in the Jewels of the Madonna, in which she was scheduled to sing at the first performance here, and consequently the production has been postponed indefinitely.

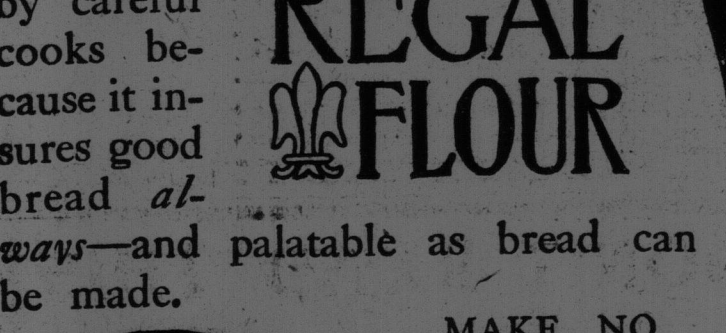

London, June 13—The judge of the central criminal court found it impossible to conclude today the trial for conspiracy of the suffragette leaders, Miss Harriet Kerr, Miss Agnes Lake, Miss Rachel Barrett, Mrs. Beatrice Saunders, Miss Annie Kenney, Miss Laura Lennox and Edwy Clayton, the analytical chemist who acted as their adviser.

The further hearing were therefore adjourned until next Tuesday, June 17. The judge granted the defendants permission to attend tomorrow the funeral of Miss Emily Wilding Davison, the suffragette killed while interfering with the king's horse in the Derby, on condition that they behave in an orderly manner.

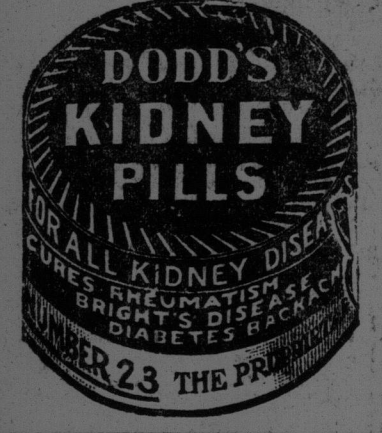

Fowl Attacked Babe to Get Away Piece of Bread

PARIS NEWS LETTER

Professor Speaks Against Vegetarianism—A Suggestion for the Army Regarding the Air Man—New Book Critical of the Government

(Times' Special Correspondence) Paris, June 13.—A child, two years old, was playing outside his parents' house at St. Brioux when a large Cochon China cock attempted to take a piece of bread from his hand.

The child and the cock struggled for the bread, and the cock attacked the child and hurt him so badly that he died during the night.

Professor Gaultier, of the Sorbonne, has attacked vegetarianism with vigor in a lecture on the value of food-stuffs. Vegetarianism in no way responds, he says, to the needs, the requirements, or the activities of European people. A rule of life it is anything but desirable. It reduces energy, weakens the will power, and lessens the capacity of quick decision.

As regards drinking, M. Gaultier considers wine a very suitable beverage. In moderation, he says, it is not at all dangerous. In vine-growing countries alcoholism is almost unknown. Wine which strengthens and cheers, replaces the alcoholic drink which stupefies.

The Airman and the Army General Hirschman, head of the military aviation department, has favorably received a suggestion made by the Aeronautical Association, which points out that out of the 200 or 300 civilian licensed aviators in France only about thirty-five who are regularly attached to big firms have continuing opportunities of flying. In the case of mobilization all but these would be fatally out of practice, and would be left without machines. However good a civilian aviator may be, he cannot perform military duties without some training, and a month's practice a year would suffice.

The association proposes that every licensed pilot should receive \$800 a year as soon as he passes the superior military test. A choice would be made from these aviators, and 200 could be formed into a militia bound to perform aviation service annually amounting to one month. In return for this they should receive an indemnity of about \$750 a year if the army supplied their machines, or \$2,000 if they used their own, which they would then be required to keep permanently ready for mobilization.

The idea is worth consideration by other countries besides France. Aviation practically begins on the army and navy, and it is useless for hundreds of thousands of men to be trained in keeping abreast of the improvements and qualifying to serve whenever called upon to do so.

The Governess English and German governesses in Paris play the chief part in "Les Anges Gardiens" (The Guardian Angels), the latest novel of Marcel Prevost, a well-known academician and writer on feminine topics. The book is, in fact, an urgent injunction to French families to banish from their households these strangers from abroad.

M. Prevost holds that foreign governesses faint the minds of children at their most impressionable age, mold them to the ideals and ways of another country, and are a perverting influence in the atmosphere of patriotism and French culture that should surround a child.

Against some of them M. Prevost brings even worse charges. He asserts that many of the foreign governesses that enter French families leave their own homes for reasons they are glad to conceal, or at least they are driven away by unhappiness in their own family circle. Some of them are represented in "Les Anges Gardiens" as frequently immoral.

"Cecile," says M. Prevost, "a girl of eighteen or twenty years of age, of a certain degree of culture and education, leaves her family in France to go to Paris to earn her living in Paris. It is abnormal. Yes, it is abnormal, because expatriation at that age is full of danger to her, and no decent family would be reconciled to it except in the last extremity. How many mothers or fathers who engage foreign governesses, distrust the trouble to verify her identity?"

METHODISTS WILL OPEN MISSION IN EAST ST. JOHN

Recommendations to Conference—Evangelistic Committee Appointed—Missionsary Work Shows Progress

Charlottetown, June 13.—At the afternoon session of the N. B. and P. E. I. Methodist conference book room matters were taken up. Rev. Dr. John, editor of the Wesleyan, appealed for more support to that paper, which had assisted in the canvass for increasing the endowment of a supernumerary fund of Mt. Allison. He desired to have the circulation increased to \$600.

Considerable discussion took place on the committee's report on the state of the work, submitted by Rev. H. C. Rice. The main features were as follows: That St. John city churches be authorized to organize a city mission board in accordance with the proposal of the St. John district; that it endorse the purchase of two lots of land at Courtney Bay, near the brickyard, the other near the centre of the proposed improvements.

The committee endorsed the recommendation of the St. John district regarding the forming of a conference evangelistic committee; this district being impressed with the need of deepening the spiritual life of the church, and with a view to their improvement. This committee shall obtain full information respecting the employment of a conference evangelist, the best means to make the conference gatherings more spiritually profitable; the advisability of adopting the organization known as the League of Worshipping Children, which has been so successful in England; the best means to bring a more helpful ministry to the children of the congregation either by simplification of the reception service or otherwise; the best means to secure an increased interest in the sacramental service.

The evangelistic committee will consist of Revs. G. F. Dawson, H. E. Thomas, J. M. Rice, Dr. W. Harrison, Prof. W. G. Watson and James Myles, Charles Sampson, laymen.

The investigating committee on the action of the conference special committee re sustenance fund grants, as complained of by Zion church, St. John, reported that this special committee was not acting within its jurisdiction in deciding that grants from the sustenance fund should not be made to certain circuits after this year.

Apart from the question of jurisdiction the action itself conflicts with the constitution of the sustenance fund. The report was adopted.

The action of the stationing committee in constituting Ormoco a mission, was adopted by a two-thirds vote, after considerable discussion.

At tonight's meeting the Missionary Society was submitted by Rev. Geo. Steele explained what had been done by the church in St. John district and its present needs. Already Fortland church is looking for a site for development and

expansion in the North End, and the Marsh Bridge Mission is being enlarged. Mrs. Young, representative of the W. M. S., was then heard. She reviewed the progress and aims of the society. The circles and bands now number 5,017. The amount was \$19,000, an increase of \$1,200. The work in China and Japan must be extended, but Canada must not be overlooked, where there are 65 missionaries out of 84. The aim is to enlist all women in the church. This once done, the dance and whist club would cease to allure. A resolution of appreciation of the W. M. S. work was passed.

Rev. George Steele reported for the supernumerary special endowment fund. The work is not yet complete. The amount desired is \$20,000 and there is promised \$19,700, and collected \$18,000. Within the next few years the funds will be better off by \$20,000.

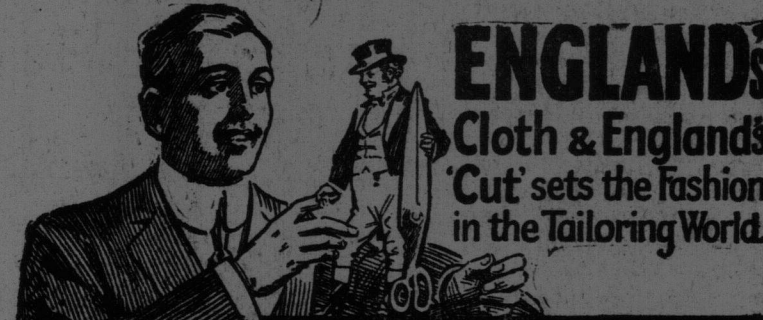

### THESE WANT WAR

#### Tradesmen Who Benefit When Nations Fight

Bootmakers, Clothingmen, Horse Dealers and Farmers, Beside Railway and Steamship Owners Not Unwilling to See Outbreak

(Pearson's Weekly.)

There is an ugly rumor abroad in Germany that agents employed by a great firm of gun manufacturers have been deliberately stirring up trouble between Germany and France.

The story goes that one of these agents bribed a newspaper editor to declare that the French army was enormously increasing its artillery. If this is true, it is plain that the object was to induce the German government also to order more guns.

Ask the average man in the street if he wants to see his country at war. Nine out of ten can find no terms strong enough to express their horror at such a suggestion. Even for the winning nation war means more taxes, increased prices for almost every necessary of life, and long drawn out anxiety for the fate of relatives and friends who are fighting their country's battles.

But the tenth man, if he tells the truth, which he probably will not do, would confess that he wouldn't mind a good war. Yes, he admits all you say about taxes and high prices, but he can easily put up with these when war is going to double his income.

The fact is that very few of us have any idea of the stirring up of people who would benefit by war. Of these the makers of guns and the manufacturers of armor plate are by no means the only ones.

Take horse-dealers, for instance. During the Boer war we sent 200,000 horses to the Cape. Their prices varied from £21 a head, paid for Argentine crocks, to £80 for sound British and Austrian horses. Put them at £40 a head, here was £8,000,000 sterling divided among horse breeders and dealers.

And as for the forage bill, well, that was more than twice as much, and the

cause in the aeroplane factories, and in the places where they make all sorts of electrical apparatus such as field cables, wireless machinery, searchlights, and the like.

Holders of South-Western Railway shares made money during our last big war. Tens of thousands of troops and mountains of stores were pouring down that line to Southampton for more than two years. All the transport trades get a tremendous filip from war.

Shipping companies charter their vessels for the transport of troops, sure that if anything happens to their craft they will be well recompensed, and their prosperity extends to seamen, stokers, and dock laborers. There will be no ships laid up in war-time unless, indeed, our navy is defeated and hostile cruisers swarm around our shores to prey upon our commerce.

Another huge industry which benefits by war is that of the coal-getter. Washings and transports alike are absolutely dependent on coal, and the big colliery owners can raise their prices all round, and be certain of fat government contracts.

War hurts some things, such, for instance, as the sale of champagne and paste, auto gas, and it reduces the profits of theatres and football clubs. Yet, as we have shown, there is a very large minority who actually look forward to a European scrap on a large scale.

### MILL STRIKE AND ARREST IN FIRE SETTING CASES THE CHIEF NORTH END TOPICS

The topic of chief interest about the North End today was the strike in the lumber-mills. Not a wheel turned in any of the plants this morning. Not only are the men themselves, numbering all told about 1,800 employees directly interested with the mill-owners, but the situation from a business point of view amongst dealers generally throughout the North End will be watched closely. The operators hold that they cannot afford to grant the increase demanded, namely 25 cents a day to the deal piers and raftsmen, which would make the rate \$2.65 or \$2.75 a day, and so informed the local union of raftsmen and deal piers last evening in Longshoremen's Hall, a committee was appointed to interview the operators. The mill owners affected by the strike are Stinson, Cutler & Co., in two mills; J. R. Warner, Charles Miller, F. E. Snyre & Co., Murray & Gregory, J. E. Moore, Miller Bros., Strait Shore, and Hilyard Bros.

#### Verdict of Murder

Before Coroner J. F. Hoban at Gagetown yesterday an inquest was begun into the death of Gabe Sabatis, an Indian, and it was found in the verdict of the jury that he had been killed by a blow from an edging in the hands of Charles Medley McIntyre, a negro. Evidence was given by G. McIntyre, Frank Hamilton, James Briggs and Frank Sabatis. They told of having seen McIntyre kill the Indian with a blow which he struck him from behind, hitting him upon the temple with an edging. McIntyre will be arraigned on Monday on a charge of murder. J. R. Dunn will represent the Crown and P. A. Guthrie the prisoner.

### WONDERS OF SALESROOMS

**Fortunes Picked up in Curios in London—Viola That Proved to be a Stradivarius**

(London Tit-Bits)  
Some of the most astonishing sales in the world are made in the West-end auction-rooms. Here curios and pictures that have been bought for a mere song are often sold at fabulous prices. Very spirited duels in bidding are also witnessed, and before the spectators realize what has happened the prize is knocked down by the auctioneer in response to an almost imperceptible nod of the head on the part of the highest bidder.

**Treasures in Disguise**  
Many valuable objects are often picked up in old country houses, their possessors being perfectly ready to part with them for a few shillings, little realizing the treasures they have lost. Once, in Italy, what looked like an old, broken-down fiddle was bought from a cottager for a few francs. This turned out to be a genuine Stradivarius, and at a famous sale was sold for nearly \$2,000.

In our old farm-houses every day are to be found splendid specimens of George IV. silver, valuable old clocks, and rare pieces of Chippendale furniture, their owners being perfectly unconscious of their value. When these find their way to our large auction-rooms they are sold for considerable sums, making, in many cases, the fortune of the lucky person or persons in the know.

Quite recently a pair of Linoges enamel salt-cellars, 4in. high, by Jean Le-moisin, which were bought for £300 in 1844 brought 2,400 guineas at Christie's. On the same occasion a jug of British stoneware dating from 1872 was sold for 1,500 guineas, though originally it had been sold for about 400 pounds.

Perhaps the most sensational increase in the price of a picture on record is to be found in the case of one of the drawings for the famous portrait by Gainsborough of the Duchess of Devonshire. This originally cost 15s. and was sold in May, 1905 for £1,050.

The finished portrait of Gainsborough's "Duchess of Devonshire" was originally bought for £65, but changed hands at Agnew's auction-rooms in 1876 for 10,000 guineas. All the world knows that it was stolen from their auction-rooms a few days later, but mysteriously restored in 1901.

The love-letters of Robert and Elizabeth Barrett Browning were sold for £2,500 the other day at Sotheby's. The letters were in two series. There were 284 from Robert Browning and 287 from Elizabeth Barrett, the sum realized by each letter working out at £11.18s. The bidding began at £200, and an exciting duel between two famous collectors followed. The whole incident was over in less than a minute, however, a mere shake of the head on the part of the second bidder signified that he was unwilling to go beyond the highest price named.


**Famous Men's Hair**


### VICTORIA WILL OFFER BONDS TO ITS OWN PEOPLE

**SAID HE WAS IN FINES AGAINST  
GIBBONS SHED JUST THREE PLAYERS  
BEFORE THE FIRE OF CAPITAL TEAM**

Police Say That Youth Arrested Also Admitted Setting McMillan Fire and Ringing in False Alarm

A youth giving his name as James Morash, appeared in the police court this morning to answer a charge of wandering about in Mill street last night and not being able to give a satisfactory account of setting fire to a barn owned by Mr. McMillan in Douglas avenue and ringing in a false alarm from Box 139 on the night of June 9.

Policeman Rankine said: "After Policeman Totten and myself arrested the prisoner, Rankine, Totten asked the defendant if he knew who set the fire in McMillan's barn. The policeman asked him if it was not he who set the fire and the prisoner replied that it was. "I asked him if it was he who rang in the false alarm from Box 139 on the night of June 9 and he admitted that he did. He also said he was in Gibbons' shed between 6 and 7 last night and afterwards."

Policeman Totten corroborated the previous witness' testimony, and the case was adjourned until Monday morning at 11 o'clock.

The defendant admitted that he had said these things to the policeman.

Canley, Sullivan and Lynch Fined by Umpire - In Police Court Canley is Fined \$20 - Timely Words From Bench

Reports regarding the conduct of Fredericton players in yesterday's game between the Marathons and Fredericton on the St. John grounds have been submitted by Umpire McCann to D. B. Donald, secretary of the New Brunswick & Maine Baseball League, penalizing three Fredericton players as follows:

Captain Robert Canley, fined \$10 and suspended for language used and for assaulting the umpire, the length of the suspension to be determined by the president of the league.

Sullivan, first base, fined \$5 for discoloring the ball and \$5 for throwing dust in the umpire's face.

Flynn, pitcher, fined \$5 for discoloring the ball.

The same teams will meet again this afternoon at three o'clock on the Marston grounds. Farrell of Detroit will pitch for the locals and Hugh Pinkerton, who is due on the noon train, will be at second base instead of Nolan. Canley will not be with the visitors on account of his suspension.

Those lovers in this city, who are quite willing to support clean baseball will look forward to a game in which there should be no repetition of yesterday's exhibition. It will be the general desire of the fans, to see the penalties which have been imposed by the umpire strictly enforced instead of allowing them to stand as was the case last year. Unless the players are taught to respect the umpire and the spectators the effect of the rowdy tactics will be disastrous to the success of the league.

**Canley's Case in Police Court**

The news of the arrest of "Bob" Canley, the player-manager of the Fredericton base ball team, brought a great crowd of base ball players and enthusiasts to the police court, this morning to watch the proceedings before Magistrate Ritchie. The charge was assaulting Umpire Frank McCann during the course of the game on the Marston grounds. Through his counsel, F. A. Guthrie, of Fredericton, the defendant pleaded guilty.

Umpire McCann told the magistrate that since the affair he and the defendant had talked the matter over and he said that he did not wish to press the charge.

The magistrate said: "I have no sympathy with a man who will use his feet to another and I think it is a disgrace to the great game in which you men participate that one of you should be guilty of such a mean trick, and I trust that I will never again hear of such an occurrence as took place yesterday. If I were not so busy as I am, I would call for a preliminary examination and the case would go to the supreme court and if the defendant were found guilty he would be liable to two years in Dorechester."

However, on account of the complainant appearing here this morning, after considering the matter, I will not be so harsh as I first intended, but the decision I intend to hand out must not be taken as a precedent and if we have another case of this kind again I do not want the defendant to say that I did so and so in this case. I will therefore fine the defendant \$20 or two months in jail."

Mr. Guthrie asked the court if it would not be possible on account of the defendant's previous good record in the sixteen years he had been in the game, to allow the fine to stand over him, as he thought that this would prove as effective as if he were asked to pay the fine.

The magistrate, however, would not do this and the fine was paid.

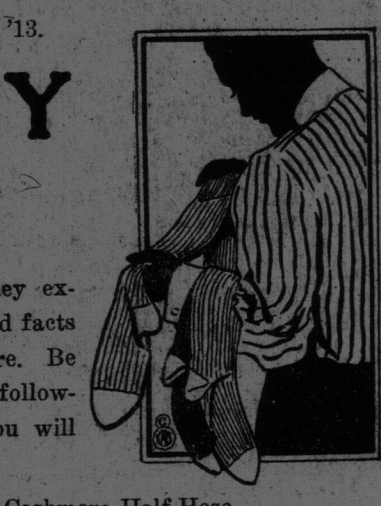

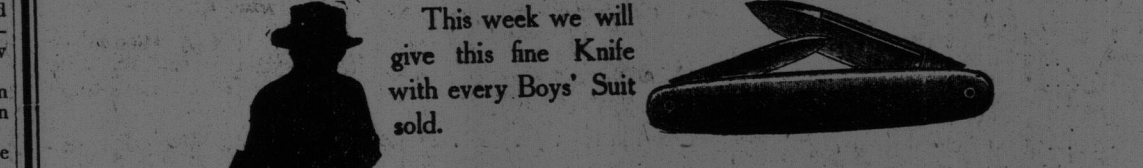

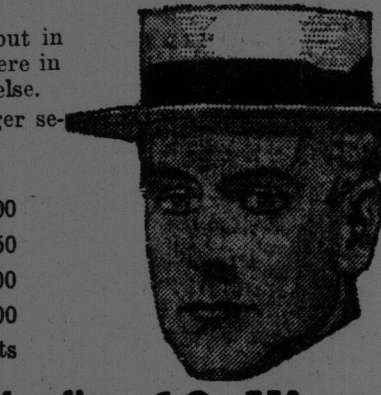
