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FIRST EDITION. JUDGE PALMER ACTS.

ANOTHER PHASE IN THE COTTON MILL CASE DEVELOPED TODAY.

An Injunction to Compel the Bank of Montreal to Refrain from Advancing Money to the Receiver of the Cotton Mills (Limited).

This morning His Honor Mr. Justice Palmer, judge in equity, in re Weldon et al vs Parks & Son (limited) et al, on application of Mr. L.A. Curry, who filed the affidavit of Mr. John H. Parks, granted an injunction restraining the Bank of Montreal or any one on its behalf from advancing money to the receiver of the cotton mills, under a special order of \$4000, and from doing so by obstructing or interfering with the receiver of Parks & Son (limited) in the discharge of his duties as such receiver.

His Honor took occasion to say that the disobedience to the order of the court appointing the receiver is as much a contempt of court as would be disobedience to this injunction order, but he acceded to this motion because that fact was not generally known. His Honor also said that on another occasion he would give his other reasons why he granted the injunction.

The following is the affidavit upon which the order was made—

1. That on the twenty-second day of August last past upon application of the plaintiffs, and with the consent of the defendant herein His Honor Mr. Justice Palmer, judge in equity did order that Hugh H. McLean, receiver in equity in a special order of the court, should enter into immediate and exclusive control and possession of the cotton factories then operated by the said defendant, William Parks & Son (limited) together with all the stock in trade both manufactured and unmanufactured and all other property of whatsoever description belonging to said company together with the debts due to said company and to hold, use and dispose of the same under the order and direction of this honorable court to be made from time to time herein and to have the necessary means or cash advanced to him for the purpose of carrying out the said order and the management of said cotton factories and other property of said company.

2. That under, by virtue and in pursuance of said appointment, orders and directions, said receiver did enter into possession of said property and did undertake and enter upon the discharge of the duties imposed upon him as such receiver.

3. That for the better preservation of the said property and in order to have the most possible benefit realized therefrom and in the best interest of the parties herein, His Honor the Judge in Equity directed said receiver to operate and manage the said cotton factories and in conformity with suggestions relative thereto made by the receiver and in the exercise of his duties as such receiver, to make such advances to the receiver of the cotton mills as he might deem necessary for the purpose of carrying out the said order and the management of said cotton factories and other property of said company.

4. That in pursuance of said order and directions, said receiver did make such advances to the receiver of the cotton mills as he might deem necessary for the purpose of carrying out the said order and the management of said cotton factories and other property of said company.

5. That on or about the twentieth day of April instant said Bank of Montreal gave a notice to the parties to whom the receiver had made and was making advances of said manufactured goods a copy of which said notice is hereto annexed marked "A" and did also give such notification to other banking institutions as was calculated to and did prevent them from making advances and discounts for said receiver and did otherwise disturb and interfere with said receiver in negotiating or dealing with said banks.

6. That said factories or cotton mills were run and operated by the receiver under the most careful and particular instructions and directions of His Honor the Judge in Equity and were and are being so run and operated with great profit and advantage.

10. That if the running and operating of said factories or mills close or be stopped, great loss and damage will ensue

SECOND EDITION. PAID THE WAGES OF SIN.

MARY MURPHY THE VICTIM OF A CRIMINAL OPERATION.

Dr. Henry M. Leach of Somerville, in whose family the late Mrs. Murphy was employed, in custody for the crime—has been found guilty of a criminal operation, but escaped conviction.

Mary Murphy of Somerville, a hard-working domestic, but 19 years of age, died in the home of her sister, Mrs. Mahoney, at No. 35 Meridian street, a victim of criminal malpractice.

At the Somerville police station on a copy of one of the pills of Dr. Henry M. Leach, who was arrested yesterday afternoon, charged with performing the operation which caused her death.

It all came about in this way. The girl obtained a situation in the family of Dr. Leach about 18 months ago to do general house-work. The doctor lived on the corner of Washington and Shawmut streets.

Mary had two brothers and two sisters living in Somerville, and was in the habit of visiting them at regular intervals. She had Thursday afternoon out and usually visited her sister, Mrs. Mahoney, on that day. Last Thursday she did not appear, and on Saturday one of her sisters called at the home of Dr. Leach. She was told by Mrs. Mahoney that her sister was dead.

On Sunday the other sister called, but was refused admittance. Early Sunday evening Dr. Leach drove down to Mrs. Mahoney's house and called to see her. He said that her sister was dead.

Medical Examiner Durell, who will be the most important witness in the case and whose information to the police brought about the arrest of Dr. Leach, said last evening to Herald reporter that he had seen the pills on Saturday afternoon about 6 o'clock. Dr. Leach called on him and requested that he come to his house to see the pills. He explained that the girl had been troubled with "La Grippe" and that he had given her the pills. Dr. Leach's house, he found that the girl was dead. Her body was warm, and the doctor had been examining her for about an hour after Dr. Durell returned home, a brother and a friend of the Murphy girl called at his house, and told some queer stories about Dr. Leach—the girl's mother, he said, had been told that she was dead, and that she was something wrong in the death, and that the doctor knew more than he had told about it.

Dr. Durell, in his capacity of medical examiner, made an autopsy and found that a humping operation had been performed, which set up peritonitis and soon caused death. Dr. Durell said that he was the most clumsy piece of work he had ever seen.

Chief Parkhurst, and Dr. Leach's arrest followed. The body was removed to the residence of Mrs. Mahoney, where it was kept until the funeral. Dr. Leach is now in the hospital, where he is in bad odor.

According to the records of section 15, in that district, he was arrested March 21, 1890, for performing a criminal operation at his office upon Mattie Moore, a girl 19 years of age, who died at No. 312 Main street, Charleston, S. C., the day of his arrest.

The case came to trial, but Dr. Leach was discharged by the court. He then moved to Somerville, but has never had any standing in the community and but little practice.

When arrested he was greatly surprised, and denied all knowledge of the affair.
