If a member of one crest gives information against a member of another crest, all the latter will set out after him and take his life. Each Indian has also a hunting ground of his own and if another trespasses upon it he will shoot him upon sight. These circumstances all militated against loquaciousness on the part of the Indians encountered although on one or two occasions information was volun-teered. It was generally unreliable, however, and was the cause of many futile searches. On one occasion the posse learned that

On one occasion the posse learned that Simon had gone to the headwaters of the Naas river, and the constables immedi-ately set off for the place. They found no trace of their man, however, but an-other Indian reported that his cache had been robbed and that three cances and been taken from his nunting ground.
