

GRAND PATRIARCH'S REPORT.

OFFICERS AND REPRESENTATIVES,-

At the close of another official year I welcome you to our Annual Council, in this magnificent structure erected for the purposes of Odd-Fellowship by the energetic brethren- of London. May the name of the Encampment, under whose tent we have gathered, be characteristic of the nature of our deliberations to-day. May no improper word or deed disturb our "Harmony," or mar our peace!

According to the requirements of my office, I now submit for your consideration a brief report of my work during the year.

DISPENSATIONS.

Since our last session dispensations have been granted for the following Subordinate Encampments, viz. :

Alpha Encampment, No. 26, Sarnia, Dec. 7, 1874; Seaforth Encampment, No. 27, Seaforth, Feb. 18, 1875; Huron Encampment, No. 28, Goderich, April 27, 1875.

I trust the action taken will meet with your approval, and that charters will be granted the patriarchs.

VISITATIONS.

As in the case of my predecessors, I have also endeavored to visit every Encampment in the jurisdiction during my incumbency, and I am happy to say that I have been able to accomplish the object of my desire. In the course of these visits I have been gratified to find the several Encampments in a very satisfactory and prosperous condition; and I am pleased to say that the work of each is well performed. I have, during these visitations, used every means to instruct the patriarchs; and have exemplified the work to the best of my knowledge and ability. Details of those vists have appeared in the pages of the CANADIAN JOURNAL OF ODD-FELLOWSHIP during the past months.

DECISIONS AND DISPENSATIONS.

Many questions of law and order have been submitted for decision, none of which have been of sufficient importance to

bring before the Grand Encampment, excepting one from Bro. Bingham, to the following effect :

"Is a Brother appealing to the Grand Encampment compelled to pay for copying papers, minutes of proceeding, etc., in connection with his case ?"

Answer—That there was no general law on the matter; but I considered it only justice to a Brother, for the Encampment from which he appeals, to grant him full copies without expense.

On several occasions permission has been asked to wear regalia at dedications, etc., which I have usually granted.

AMENDMENTS.

Finding that many questions are submitted in consequence of the amendments to the constitution which have been made from time to time, not being thoroughly known to the several Encampments, I would recommend that all such amendments be printed in the journal of proceedings for the present session? This will give all the Encampments a better knowledge of the constitution, and thus enable them to settle among themselves many questions which would otherwise be submitted to the G. P. for decision.

REPRESENTATION.

The rapid growth of the patriarchal branch of the Order is increasing the size of this Grand Body, and adding materially to the expenses of its annual sessions. I would suggest to you the advisability of considering whether the time has not come for an alteration of the basis of representation, by which the membership of the Grand Encampment might be reduced.

STATISTICS.

I refer you to the report of our Grand Scribe for the Statistics, from which you will learn that our advance during the past year has been of the most satisfactory nature—comparing favorably with the progress of the Order in other jurisdictions.

SYMPATHY.

While rejoicing, however, in the general prosperity of the Order, we should not be forgetful of the misfortnes which have befallen individual members. Especially may we call to mind the sufferings of a Brother resident in this city, who was once an efficient officer of this body—P.G. H. P., John Hunter, who has been laid on a bed of sickness for the past three years. It would only be appropriate for the Grand Encampment to give expression to its sympathy for our afflicted Brother.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion I have to return my thanks to the District Deputies for their attention to the Encampments placed in their charge, and to the Grand Officers, as well as many individual members, for assistance rendered me during my term of office.

And may the God of the Patriarchs endow you with wisdom to conduct your deliberations, and crown your labors with success.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE R. W. GRAND SCRIBE AND TREASURER.

To the Officers and Representatives of the R. W. Grand Encampment of Ontario, I. O. O.F.

PATRIARCHS :---

In accordance with custom I present for your perusal my annual Report, giving in detail our statistical progress and financial prospects.

Allow me in the first place, to diverge a little, and with nearly a thousand Odd Fellows, welcome you most heartily to the hospitality of London. The Forest City has always been a nursery of Odd Fellowship, and this beautiful and commodious temple to which you have been introduced by Harmony Encampment to-day, bears abundant testimony to the strength and progress of the order. Similar bonds have been added to the tie in different parts of the jurisdiction, holding us together more fignaly than the plastic mortar which binds this building in a solid mass.

We have now twenty-eight Encampments, with a total membership of 1.535, an increase of 343 over our report of the past year. It is true that we have not added many new tents, but those that we have are flourishing beyond our most sanguine expectations.

In accordance with your instructions, I had 250 copies of the Journal of Proceedings printed and distributed throughout the jurisdiction, and transmitted copies to sister Grand Encampments in different parts of the United States. In return I have received Journals from a number of State Grand bodies as well as the Journal of Proceedings from our own R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario.

ng mast out ne of out Enies nd STATE OF THE ORDER.—Three new Encampments have been organized during recess, by the Grand Patriarch, viz.: Alpha Encampment, No. 26, Sarnia, December 7th, 1874; Seaforth Encampment, No. 27, February 18th, 1875, and Huron Encampment, No. 28, Goderich, on April 27th, 1875. They are all working well, and give abundant proof of future usefulness. Each succeeding Return with one or two exceptions, exhibit a gratifying increase. Those that have not increased, report peace and harmonious working. Duplicate copies of new bylaws from Frontier Encampment, No. 2, Windsor, and Quinte Encampment, No. 19, Belleville, have been placed in my hands, and are herewith presented for ratification.

STATISTICS .- The returns from Subordinates do not come in as promptly in many cases as they should, and notwithstanding the particularity of the instructions given, some are carelessly made out, and the Committee on Returns will find many errors. Our statistics cannot be considered reliable, unless the Subordinates make their returns out intelligently and correctly. It is essential that the amount of relief given to Patriarchs should be stated, also number of weeks sickness for which benefits were The certificates from Representatives have only in a paid. few cases accompanied the Returns, so that any delay that is occasioned in the work of this Grand Encampment, may be attributed by Representatives to negligence of their own Scribes. The total revenue foots up \$6.394.79, an increase of \$1.327 68 over the previous year. 403 have been initiated, 32 admitted by card, 5 rejected, 6 reinstated, 37 suspended, while 4 have been expelled and 7 have died. The dues to this Right W. Grand body amount in sum total to \$705 21, an increase of \$151 21 over last year. The following is a detailed statement of the semi-annual Returns for the past year :----

GRAND ENCAMPMENT OF ONTARIO.

FINANCE-Our funds can not be said to be in a good condition, as we are unable to pay our debts, and mileage and per diem of so large a representation as we have this year, and unless the representation is reduced, extra assessment, or some other means must be resorted to, to place this Grand Encampment in a position to give justice to her subordinates. Weare unable after an existence of six years to pay back the loan of \$200 borrowed from the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario. or procure Charters for our subordinates, which will necessitate a considerable outlay, and which has now become, with twentyeight Encampments, an actual necessity. We began the year just closed with a depleted treasury, and the prospects for the coming year, without a change in our present legislation, will keep us in a position of bankruptcy. Our account has been paid in full to the R. W. Grand Lodge, U. S., besides Representative tax, and all incidental expenses, and we have a balance of cash in Treasury and supplies as annexed statement :

According to custom, your representatives to the R. W. Grand Lodge of the United States, held at Atlanta, Ga., beginning on Monday, September 21, 1874, and continuing for six days, have great pleasure in presenting you with the following report.

The session was well attended, and the reports of all the officers show a marked increase in our Order.

We find that the Grand Corresponding and Recording Secretary submits a table giving the returns for the past two years. This embraces Lodges and Encampments:

The Grand Secretary gives us some good suggestions, and we would recommend them to this Grand Encampment.

Apparently, we have again cause to congratulate ourselves upon the prosperous aspect disclosed by the figures presented in the above table. Our numbers are rapidly gravitating towards half a million in , compliance, and our aggregate annual revenue in gross, approximates five millions of dollars. These are grand figures, but do they represent a solid and healthful condition? This is an important inquiry. We have no means from our present system, of ascertaining the amount of our net gain per annum in the general revenue, hence, until some plan is adopted to obtain light on this subject we shall ever be in a sea of doubt touching the pecuniary solidity of the Order. We should know with equal certainty the disbursements of the Subordinates as to their receipts; in fact, the knowledge of the latter in the absence of the former is comparatively valueless. It would appear that such information is an indispensable element of knowledge in reaching just conclusions as to the solvency and proper prosperity of the Subordinates. True it is, that as a general principle, our laws refer to these bodies exclusive control over their finances, within their legitimate application, but if the Grand Lodge may, which nobody doubts, inquire into and collect data, with a view to legislation on the subject of the proper relations between dues and hencits, it may, with equal propriety, make likk inquiries upon cognate subjects in contemplation of the general welfare. not at all improbable that out of the four and a half millions of gross annual aggregate revenue reported, fifty per cent. of the amount is consumed in disbursements, other than for relief. If thirty-three per cent. be added to this for relief, as returned, viz. : \$1,490,274.72, there remains but seventeen per cent. or \$726,725.82, as actual gain to the aggregate capital of the order. This would present a comparatively unstable system, looking to the inevitable increased responsibilities of the subordinates, as their membership advances in years.

This suggestion is made with deference. Ought not our statistic: 1 returns to be enlarged so as to supply light in this direction?

DECISIONS OF THE DEPUTY GRAND SIRE.

We give those bearing on the Encampment Branch.

Have the Representatives of a Grand Encampment a right to introduce in any subordinate Encampment a brother thom the C. P. of said Encampment does not know to be in good standing in the Order, without said brother giving any pass-word whatever?

Answer. Yes.

Can a Brother who holds an unexpired withdrawal cand from his Lodge be a competent petitioner for an Encampment ?

Answer. No.

Both of the above decisions were approved.

The following questions were also propounded to the Deputy : Grand Sire :

1. Is a Lodge or Encampment required to give the honors of the order to a Past Grand of Past Chief Patriarch deputised by the D. D. Grand Master or D. D. Grand Patriarch, to install the officers of such Lodge or Encampment when he appears for that purpose?

2. When a member is in arrears to an amount that, under the laws of his Lodge or Encampment disqualifies him from receiving benefits in case of his sickness, is he entitled to admission to his Lodge or Encampment and to the S. A. P. W.?

Is a member not entitled to the S. A. P. W. to be permitted in his Ledge or Encampment?

3. Is not every member who by the laws, is permitted to be in his Lodge or Encampment, entitled to vote and participate in any business that may come before the Lodge or Encampment?

Answered as follows:

1. A Past Grand who has been appointed by a D. D. G. M. to install the officers of a Lodge, is not entitled to the honors of the Order when he appears for that purpose.

2. A member is entitled to admission into his Lodge and the S. A. P. W., until he is dropped, suspended or expelled.

The Judiciary Committee report as follows:

The first answer seems to be a correct exposition of the law upon the subject. The second and third answers seem to your committee to require qualification, so as to conform to Section 1,538 Digest, which provides that "Whether a member of a Subordinate Lodge must have his account settled up to the last day of the past term to entitle him to receive the P. W. of the current term, and whether a brother thus in arrears has a right to sit in his own Lodge without the P. W., prior to suspension, are questions to be determined by the proper authorities, and according to the laws of the State jurisdictions in which they arise, not by this Grand Lodge.

The above report was adopted by the Grand Lodge.

STREET UNIFORMS.

"Resolved.—That the uniforms of the Patriarchal Branch of the Order, to be worn on public occasions, shall consist of the following:

1.-Chapeau.-A black chapeau with three plumes, two black with one royal purple running between the black, and over the centre of the chapeau ; gilt cross crooks on a black rosette, with a purple centre on left side of the chapeau.

2. -Fatigue Cap.-A black cloth fatigue cap of the present navy style, three inches high, a black leather strap one half inch wide in front, fastened by two round gilt buttons having three links, and crossed crooks embossed thereon ; a one and three-quarter inch tent-shaped gilt ornament in front ; around the lower edge a purple velvet band one inch wide with a small gilt cord on each edge of the band.

3.-Baldric.-A pointed Baldric of royal purple velvet, four inches wide, trimmed with yellow lace one-half inch wide, with a row of gilt braid oneeighth of an inch wide on each edge, with crossed crooks three inches in length, embroidered on front centre ; the Baldric to be worn from the right shoulder to the left hip, and, under the sword belt.

4. -Gauntlet Black gloves with cuffs made of royal purple velvet five and one-half inches wide, with crossed crooks three inches in length embroidered on the back of each cuff, gilt braid one-eighth of an inch wide around the edges; the cuffs to be either connected with the glove or detached.

5. -Belt. -The belt to be of purple velvet, one and three-quarter inches wide, with two stripes of gilt lace one-quarter of an inch wide at equal distances from the edges of the belt; two short metal link chains suspended from sliding straps on belt, with hook for fatigue cap.

6.—Sword.—The sword to be 36 inches in length, black grip, three-link crossbar, and tent on head of hilt of yellow metal, the scabbard to be of yellow metal embossed or engraved with appropriate emblems, with acorn shaped end. The sword to be hung by the chain attached to belt running to rings placed on the sides of the scabbard two and one-half inches below the top; the sword when worn to be in a perpendicular position.

7. -Coat. -The coat to be a plain black frock.

8.-Pants.-Plain black pantaloons, usual style.

9. - Officers. - The Chief Captain's uniform shall be as before described, except that the belt shall be of yellow velvet, with black edges ; and he shall wear on the left arm, midway between the shoulder and elbow, a gilt equilateral triangle, with sides three and one-half inches in length, on royal purple velvet, with crossed batons in the centre.

10.-The Subordinate Captain's uniform shall be the same as the Chief Captain's, except the centre device in the triangle, which shall consist of a single baton.

The uniform of elective officers of an Encampment and members of a 11.--Grand Encampment shall be that prescribed for the R. P. members, with the addition of a gilt fringe two inches in length around the outer edge of the Baldric, with jewels of office suspended by purple ribbon and gilt bar pins from the left breast and equilateral triangle on left arm, with emblem of rank embroidered in the centre.

12.—The uniform of the elective officers and past elective officers of a Grand Encampment shall be that prescribed for its members, except that of the three plumes to be worn on the chapeau, one shall be purple, one black and one yellow-the latter to be worn in the centre ; the gilt fringe on the Baldric shall be two and one-half inches wide; the belt shall be of plain gilt webbing one and three-quarter inches wide; the coat to be double breasted with two rows of buttons in front, and a double equilateral triangle on left arm with emblem of rank embroidered in the centre.

The following was adopted :

Resolved, That none but members of the Royal Purple Degree shall be permitted to wear the street uniform described in the report just adopted. в

MERGEMENT.

As one of the proposed changes of the Constitution (a very able protest from the Grand Encampment of Pennsylvania was submitted against "mergement,") it was resolved in the negative, by an almost unanimous vote-yeas 4; nays 99.

LODGE AND ENCAMPMENT RELIEF.

The following report from the Legislative Committee was

They are satisfied that in many cases the Lodges, Encampments and various adopted : General Relief Associations, have been called upon to incur very large expenses for which they can dbtain no ryturn. But as such sums are paid as charity, and not under any claim of right, they cannot see how a distant Lodge, in an other jurisdiction, can be made to pay such sums as may be expended by strangers without their knowledge.

Such action would repeal the benchicial law of every subordinate. It is not just to impose such a burden on the Lodges, and if it were, it would contradict the settled law of that body that leaves every question of pecuniary benefit to the State and subordinate jurisdictions.

We cannot too highly praise the liberality and benevolence of many Lodges and Encampments, and of those associations which have arisen in aid of the regu lar operations of the Order, to de the work of godlike charity ; but at the same time we do not see how much extra aid can be made part of our financial sys-We, therefore, submit no new legislation on the subject.

But in view of the great importance of this work we cannot dismiss the tem. subject without recommending some action, they therefore submit the follow-

Resolved, That this Grand Lodge commends the great work of the General Relief Associations, instituted by members of this Order, to the fostering care of the several State grand jurisdictions, and hereby recommend such action as may induce each jurisdiction to make ample provision for compensating other jurisdictions for expenses paid and costs incurred in relief of brothers in distress, who claim the same under a visiting card, as brothers in good standing.

Moved by Rep. E. G. Chant, seconded by Jas. C. Cooper That the thanks of this Grand Encampment be tendered to Harmony Encampment, No. 3, and the different subordinate Lodges of the city, for the use of this beautiful hall during the present session. Carried.

Moved by Rep. E. G. Chant, seconded by G. Rep. W. Adams, that the Grand Scribe be authorized to have 300 copies of the Journal of proceedings printed and distributed in the usual way. Carried.

• Moved by Rep. Cl. T. Campbell, seconded by Rep. Thomas Henderson, That the Janitor be paid the sum of \$2, for services in the ante-room. Carried.

Business being concluded, the Grand Encampment was closed at 11:45, to meet again in St. Catharines on Tuesday preceding the first Wednesday in August, 1876, at nine o'clock, A. M.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

The following amendment was carried at the session held in Windsor, August 6th, 1872 :---

It was moved by Rep. W. S. Campbell, seconded by Rep. Thos. Henderson, and

Resolved —That Article 7, Section 1, of the Constitution of Subordinates be amended to read as follows:—No Patriarch shall be eligible for Chief Patriarch unless he shall have been elected to and discharged the duties of some other elective office. Nor shall any Patriarch be eligible to the other elective offices until he has been appointed to and discharged the duties of some appointed office, and all officers shall be eligible for re-election. All elections shall be by ballot, and a majority of the valid votes given shall be necessary to elect.

The following amendments were carried at the session held in Stratford, August 5th, 1873 :--

Patriarch Weir moved, seconded by Rep. Shaw, in accordance with notice of motion given at last session by M. E. Grand High Priest, J. Hunter, that all after the words "United States" be struck out of Article 2, Sec. 2 of the Constitution of Subordinates.

Rep. Blain, of Toronto, No. 8, moved in accordance with his notice of motion given at last session, that the words "good standing" in the third line of Sec. 6, Art. 8, of the Constitution of this Grand Encampment, be struck out, and that the words "on the roll of membership" be inserted instead. It was seconded by Rep. Campbell.

The following amendment was carried at the session held in Kingston, August 4th, 1874 :----

Rep. Thos. Woodyatt, of Brant Encampment, No. 4, moved in accordance with notice of motion given at last session, that Article I., Sec. 4, of the Constitution of this Grand Encampment, be amended by striking out "last regular session in June," and inserting instead, "first regular session in July." The motion was seconded by Rep. Blain, of Toronto Encampment, No. 8.

The following amendment was carried at the session held in London, August 3rd, 1875 :---

Moved by Patriarch Blain, seconded by Patriarch James Woodyatt, that Article 1st, Section 3, of this Constitution be amended so as to read, "Every Subordinate Encampment shall be entitled to one Representative, and every Encampment having more than 100 members shall be entitled to two Representatives, and more than 200 members to three Representatives."

SPECIAL NOTICE TO SCRIBES.

The certificates of the Past Chief Patriarchs and Representatives to Grand Encampments should be forwarded to the Grand Scribe immediately after the Installation of Officers.

Past Chief Patriarchs and Representatives should be furnished with a duplicate Certificate by the Scribe, in order to avoid any possible inconvenience arising out of the miscarriage of the original. Especially should this be the case when Past Chief Patriarchs represent themselves for admission to the Grand Encampment some time after they have passed the chairs.

The per Capita Tax is twenty five cents for each member upon the roll at the last stated meeting in the term.

Charge Books cannot be delivered except upon the special order of an Encampment, signed by the Chief Patriarch and Scribe, and attested by the Seal, and the old Charge Books must in all cases be returned to the Grand Scribe.

When old Charge Books cannot be returned by the hands of a Patriarch, they should be sealed up and sent by express.
