

New Amandments to Military Service Act in Force framed on the German people's

of Defaulters Easier

OTTAWA, Oct. 27. - Several orders-in-council having for their objest the improvement of the operation of the Military Service act given within three days, and every certificate as follows: employer who fails to comply with the requirements of this regulation shall be liable under summary con-

Another order-in-council provides that a registrar who has issued a certificate of exemption may revise or extend the same if in his opinion it is desirable that the person concerned should continue the work in which he is habitually engaged. Renewal or extension of exemptions by registratrars will be subpect to review by the central appeal judge upon application by chief public representative or other officer exercising like duties. Nothing in this new regulation affects the powers of any tribunal to detremine an application for removal for renewal or extension of an exemption which may be assigned to it by the registrar.

An amendment to section 106 of the Military Service act, with regard to employing or assisting deserters or defaulters, was passed on October 12, and sections 106 and 106A, as they now read, give few copholes to employers to claim that they employed men in default of the act through inadvertence or ignorance of the true status of the men employed.

The onus of verification of the status of employees is now placed squarely with the employer, and he must examine the papers carried. and satisfy himself that the papers are proper and that the employee are exempt from service. If he neglects to do this, and a man who is a deserter or defaulter is found his employ, the employer will to punishment.

BRITISH STATEMENT.

LONDON, Oct. 28. - "This morn ng our battlefront was extended orthwards as far as the Scheldt at Thiant. On the whole battle front between the Sambre canal and the Scheldt the enemy resistance was overcome and our advance continued. There was hard fighting at a number of points.

"On the right the Sixth Division ought its way to the edge of the Bois-L'Eveque and captured Ors. North of this point we are approaching the western outskirts of the Mormal forest and have captured Robertsart.

"On the right centre of our attack we have continued our advance to the region of Le Ques-

"We have taken the villages of Poix-du-Nord and Les Tuileries and progressed beyond them toward Englefontaine. The village of Ghissignies was taken after a sharp struggle, the enemy defending with determination the crossings of Ecaillon in the vicinity.

"Northwest of Ghissignies, we have secured the river crossings at Beaudignies, which is in our hands. Here, vigorous resistance was overin this locality captured a number of batteries, including guns of heavy calibre.

"On the left of our centre, the English captured Ruesnes and are a short distance from the Le Quesnov-Valenciennes railway, north of the village. There is heavy fighting on the high ground north of Bermerian village, which we hold, and in the region of Vendegies-sur-Ecaillon.

"Verehain and Montchaux were aptured by the Fourth Division fter hard fighting. On their left, after clearing the enemy from the ast bank of the river, we advanced the western outskirts of Maing in the face of heavy machine gun fire. In this sector the hostile resistance was particularly stubborn.

"Severe casualties were inflicted on the enemy in the course of these operations. Since yesterday morning we have captured more than 7,000 prisoners and more than 100



The paritioning should be well and tightly made, not only to exclude heat, but also to prevent odors from perleating the living room.
