After traversing some of the conten-tions of their colleagues, who advocat-ed alcohol, the signatories further say: "We strongly believe that alcohol is unnecessary as an article of consump-tion in the case of healthy men and women, and that its general use could be discontinued without detriment to the world's welfare. Further, believ-ing that alcohol is one of the most fruitful sources of poverty, disease and crime, we are pleased to add that its now sparingly employed as a remedy by a majority of medical men."
