Yesterday's returns from the British elections are rather meagre and on the whole seem to be more favorable to the government would meet members of the provincial ministry to arrange details. The provincial government does not know the requirements of the Department of Railways, but is anxious to learn them. The federal government desires to know what sort of a road the provincial government is willing to guarantee. Both desire the best road that it is possible to obtain with the resources available. Since early last year the provincial government has had a committee ready waiting for a conference on this question. Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Pugsley have been told this and refuse to appoint a meeting. If the Dominion government does not wish to operate the road on any terms it should be easy to say so. If it is willing to operate a road built to a certain standard it should be able to define the standard. If the case is that the standard is largely an engineering question to be determined by elaborate surveys, and by an agreement between the two governments a conference is necessary. It is hard to see why the New Brunswick Liberal members did not press Sir Wilfrid to proceed in one of these ways.

It certainly seems that the provincial ministry has fone as far as it can get in this direction. If it cannot get a positive or negative answer, it must be content with no answer, which is a substantial negative. Then it must not wait forever.

TARIFF REFORM.

TARIFF REFORM.

It is hard to see where Mr. Asquith finds evidence that tariff reform is not popular. England is conservative in such matters, and this is the first contest in which the tariff has been a direct party issue. Without doubt it has been the most popular feature of the opposition policy. Nothing else in the Conservative programme except Imperial defence awakened enthusiasm. The great industrial city of Birmingham, the centre of the tariff reform movement, sends a solid delegation of seven tariff reform members. Liverpool, which represents more than any other city the commercial element, elects seven tariff reformers out of nine. Returns from London are not complete, but it is certain that the Conservatives have made great gains there and the tariff question was the only issue on which the party made headway. Nottingham, Kidderminster, Leamington, Coventry, Wolverhampton, Walsali, Bristol,

Chester, Preston and Sheffield, are among the cities which seem to have accepted the dectrine of tariff preference. It is probable that half the members elected by English ridings will be tariff reformers. This is an astonishing and unprecedented progress for a tariff movement to make on the first appeal to the electors. The growth of the movement leading to the abolition of the corn laws was slow compared with this. If twenty years ago, or ten years ago, any person had predicted that a proposition to restore a customs tariff for the purpose of protection, would make such headway it the first contest, he would have found few believers Mr. Balfour said before the election that he hardly expected a tariff reform victory in the first contest But he may safely look for it in the second campaign
