**HALIFAX, N. S., July 24.**—A Halifax Society lady, at present the guest of a London official, writes a friend here that "J. de la Rive" was arrested some time ago in London and is now in confinement. He is a medical student and was arrested on information given by his sister. The authorities have kept the fact of the arrest with the greatest secrecy, but for what reason it is not known, unless it is to weave a strong chain of evidence. This information, through somewhat indirect means, is vouchered for by the writer in London who came into the possession of the fact accidentally.

**GOVEY, N. S., July 25.**—On Wednesday night a gang of tramps undertook to take possession of Lake Shore freight train at Govey. A furious fight resulted between the train men and the tramps. Brakenham Hook was shot and is expected to live. Conductor Rockwell was severely injured. The vagrants were finally repulsed and made their escape.

**KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 25.**—The women of Wyandotte county are contemplating the invasion of original rock houses and have asked for an opinion as to the legality of such action. They propose to organize into regular parties, which will relieve each other, so that one party will be in the occupancy of the rock houses all the time. The county attorney has said he does not consider the movement illegal.

**HALIFAX, N. S., July 24.**—Detective Power arrived from Woodstock, N. B., this morning, where he went to investigate the robbery of the Bank of Nova Scotia. The officer says Robert G. Sanders, the teller, confessed to having taken the money, \$4000, and had hidden it. He had made up the story that he was assaulted in the hope of deceiving the bank officials. The money was found in the place indicated by the detective. Sanders, however, felt sure that he was innocent.

**QUEBEC, July 24.**—The jurors in the inquest on the bodies of five victims in the late fire received the testimony of "death" was caused by suffocation through the burning of a house, which was set on fire by the prisoners on the 17th inst., and they said prisoners are guilty of murder in the first degree. Delamere and his wife were conducted to jail to await their trial at the first term of the criminal assizes.

**QUEBEC, July 25.**—A despatch from the scene of the wreck of the steamship Idaho says she is fast filling with water and cannot be saved. Assistance has been sent from Quebec, and already two schooners are on the scene, out it is feared they will be too late. The cargo, which is valued at \$650,000, consists of 50,000 bushels of grain, 40,000 boxes of cheese and a large number of head of cattle and sheep. The Idaho, which is a new vessel, having been launched last autumn, is valued at \$500,000.

**FREDERICTON, July 24.**—A very sad and fatal accident occurred at Wasset Station, Sunbury Co., this morning. Mr. George Grass, about 70 years of age, was working in his hay loft, and by either losing his footing or by some accident, he fell head first to the ground floor, a distance of 12 feet, and was instantly killed. Deceased was well known in Sunbury and adjoining counties, and his death, on top of the circumstances, will be heard with deep regret by many friends.

**SIXTY YEARS MARRIED.**—Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Whalen, of South Branch, Kent county, will, in a few days, celebrate the 60th anniversary of their marriage. They formerly lived in Queen's county, Ireland, and were among the earliest settlers in that part of Kent. Mr. Whalen is about 87 years of age, his wife two or three years his junior, but Mr. Whalen still works about the farm and his wife continues to do the work of the household. The wedding anniversary will be celebrated by a large gathering of sons and daughters and other relatives. —Moncton Transcript.

**NEW YORK, July 27.**—On July 21st Capt. Beazee Crowell of the Cromwell line died at his home No. 22, Fifth Avenue, Brooklyn, and three days later his body was reduced to ashes at the First poud cemetery. In accordance with his desire the ashes were consigned to the deep. The ceremony took place on the steamboat Taurus on Thursday, while coming from Long Branch, and at his widow's request who was present, when off Highland Light she was hoisted to flags were placed at half mast, Capt. Hobbie made a brief address and the ashes lowered into seven fathoms of water. The cover being removed so that the ashes might be washed out.

It is stated that British, American and other traders are selling alcoholic liquor to natives of Africa for four and five cents per quart. A large demand, active competition and absence of Customs Excise laws allow the distilled devil civilization to

be thus placed within the reach of every savage native of the Dark Continent. A coffee house regarding the traffic was sold by the powers interested, as no one of them could enforce a regulatory measure without the sanction and co-operation of the others, and a duty of about three cents a gallon agreed upon. The trade being highly profitable, the traders of no nation could be expected to voluntarily resign it. As a matter of course, the deadly consequences of the rivers of ruin, now and for a long time past, poured into Africa are making themselves felt, especially among the coast tribes. Missionaries denounce the traffic, but they are powerless to prevent it. —Moncton Star.
