THE LINOTYPE

All of the news matter in this issue was set on the Observer's new linotype. This is the first linotype ever installed north of Fredericton and for so small a town as Hartland it is a bold venture. The particular machine which the Observer has put in its the latest development of the invention. The linotype is acknowledged to be the most complicated and most nearly human of any machine that was ever devised. Continuous attempts at the invention of a machine for setting type had been made since 1825, and it was not until 1876 that Ottmar Mergenthaler, a German-American, took up the crude inventions that existed for type setting, rejected them, and determined upon a method of producing type-setmatter on an entirely new principle. He worked for eleven long years before his machine was considered of practical value. In 1887 the New York Sun tried the machine and pronounced it a success. Immediately there sprang up such a demand for linotypes that the capacity of the factories has been taxed from that adv to this.

TEACHERS CAMP

Rural Science Students at Sussex July 14th—August 11th

This year for the first time in the history of the Rural Science School the students will have an opportunity the students will have an opportunity of living under canvas.

Permission has been granted by the military authorities to use the camp grounds, one of the bungalows, and a certain number of bell tents. These will be filled with cots, two or three to each tent. The camp is but five minutes' walk from the argicultural building.

Living in camp is optional, and students must state clearly when making application whether they wish to live in camp or desire us to send list of bearding places.

of boarding places.

Boarding places are taxed to their rounest. Only a few houses will be able to provide rooms and board. Rates Arthur able to provide rooms and board, takes are much higher than in former years. Students should avail themselves of this opportunity of living together in camp, not only because it will reduce the cost of living very naterially but also because of the social life it

affords.

There will be no room rent; only cost of board and cooking. Examines will be divided according to the number actually in camp. Each student will have to provide his own blankets and pillow.

will have to provide his own blankets and pillow.

The management of the camp will be left largely in the hands of the students. Committees will be formed to see that certain necessary activities of the campers are carried into effect. There will be few rules but these must be strictly observed. A casperon will be chosen.

The dining room will be established in one of the bungalows near which all the tents will be set up. The camp will be supplied with light and water from the town or Sussex.

Many games will be indulged in, and everything is being done to make the students stay in Sussex most enjoyable. Only a limited number can be accommodated. A large number of applications have already been received.



VACCINATION OF EMPLOYEES

THE FOLLOWING IS PUBLISHED FOR THE INFORMATION OF THE PUBLIC, GENERALLY, AND ESPECIALLY OF THOSE DIRECTLY CONCERNED

Section 30 of The Public Health Act, 1918," being 8 George V.

Chapter 36, is hereby smended by adding after the last paragraph thereof the fellowing paragraph?
