DELEGATION GOES TO BATHURST

Members of Board of Trade Discuss Freight Matter With Bathurst Board.

A delegation of B. B. T. A. B. v. A meeting of the Council of the Campbellton Board of Trade was held Saturday afternoon when a communication was read from the Board of the Maritime Division of the Manufacturers Association, re the proposed application for increased freight rates on all railways in Canada.

A number of shippers and others interested discussed this matter in all points and it was thought advisable that a strong delegation be sent to Bathurst to meet the Board and a traffic expert from the Manufacturers Association who was in stop off there Tuesday.

The afternoon meeting was taken up with submitting information in reference to traffic matters. It was shown that under the terms of Confederation it was explicitly set forth that the Maritime provinces must not be discriminated against in the matter of freight rates and it was decided to set this forth strongly.
At the evening meeting there were addresses by various Campbellton and Bathurst gentlemen and a strong resolution in reference to the proposed freight increase was passed.
Campbellton members were asked to bring the matter up at once and pass a similar resolution.

CHECK RAISERS NEATLY CAUGHT

Bathurst Man Endeavored to Pass Check for Large Amount.

Last Thursday evening Joseph Legacy accompanied by Peter Bertin both of Bathurst went into Messrs. Rosenhek Bros. store to purchase some goods. After making some purchases he tendered a check issued by Town Treasurer for \$200.00. The lady clerk informed him that she had not sufficient funds on hand to make change and called Mr. S. Rosenhek. Upon examining the tendered price of paper Mr. Rosenhek at once noticed that it was perforated not good for over \$10. With rare presence of mind he led the purchaser to believe he was going into his office for change and then telephoned Treasurer Lingley who at once put Chief Adams on to the game with the result that Legacy was promptly arrested. Bertin was caught at the Opera House by Chief Adams and Officer Smith and from information gained from the two prisoners they next visited Andersonville and there arrested Frank Legacy of Bathurst.

The check which was raised was originally given for \$7.65 and as above stated was raised to \$200.00.

Friday morning the prisoners appeared before Judge Matheson for preliminary examination and were sent up for trial at the next setting of the County Court which will be held next Tuesday. They were taken to the Dalhousie jail Saturday.

C. N. R. EMPLOYEES GO TO JAIL

Nine Guilty of Stealing From Cars Sentenced to Six Months Each.

Fredericton, N. B. March 12.—Nine of the employees of the Canadian national railways who had pleaded guilty to the theft of liquor from a car loaded with Kentucky Rye whiskey at Napadogan on the Transcontinental division, were sentenced by Police Magistrate Limerick in the police court here this afternoon to serve six months each in the York County jail. Another prisoner whose wife is in a delicate condition at Moncton was admitted here for one week at the end of which time he is to return and be given a similar sentence. The other of eleven prisoners, who were arrested pleaded not guilty and was sent up for trial at the York County Court next week. Chief H. J. Page of the C. N. R. investigation department has been here from Toronto in charge of the case.

NO STEAMER FOR GASPE COAST

Department of Trade and Commerce Says No Subsidy This Year.

The following is the text of a question put in the House March 11th by Hon. Charles Macleod, M. P. for Bonaventure and the reply thereto by the Hon. Sir Geo. E. Foster, Acting Premier—

Hon. Mr. MACLEOD (Bonaventure):

1. Does the Government intend to offer a subsidy this year for a steamship service between Campbellton, N. B., and Gaspe, Que.?
2. Since when has this service been discontinued?
3. Have any requests been received for the revival of the service this year?
4. Does the Government contemplate the subsidizing of a steamer service this year between Montreal and Quebec and Gaspe and Campbellton at all last year between Montreal and Quebec and Gaspe and Campbellton and Gaspe?

LAND OWNERS BLAMED FOR FOOD CRISIS IN EGYPT

Wheat and Other Cereals Actually Have Been Ploughed Up When Approaching Maturity in Order to Sow Cotton.

London, March 8.—The food crisis in Egypt is due mainly to land owners, including the land owning peasantry, increasing the area planted in cotton so as to take advantage of the soaring prices of cotton, according to the Daily Mail's Cairo correspondent.

"Wheat and other cereals actually have been ploughed up when approaching maturity in order to sow cotton," the correspondent continues, "and the cotton area is now nearly 25 per cent greater than before the war. Normally Egypt practically feeds herself but in view of the present shortage of cereals there is greater danger of the famished people being driven to rioting. The situation is bad in the towns, but it is worse in the country. It is at its worst in Upper Egypt where the difficulties of importation are greater.

"Gambling in cotton seed has been disastrously widespread among all classes. Mendacity and theft are rife. Nationalist agitators are persuading the peasants that their plight is due to the British. The outlook is difficult."

LUDENDORFF ATTENDS MEETING OF NEW CABINET

London, March 16.—The new government at Berlin held a cabinet council last night, which was attended by General Ludendorff, according to a despatch to the Exchange Telegraph from the German capital by way of Amsterdam.

DUTCH TORPEDO BOAT TO GUARD EX-CROWN PRINCE

The Hague, March 16.—A Dutch torpedo boat has arrived in the harbor of Oosterland, Wieringen Island, to guard the former German Crown Prince, according to the Nieuwe Rotterdamse Courant.

REVOLUTION NOW IN GERMANY

Military Party in Charge of Government—Socialists Plan Counter Stroke

Civil war seems imminent in Germany as a result of the refusal of the Ebert government, now sitting at Stuttgart to carry on negotiations with the reactionary regime which seized power suddenly on last Saturday morning. Unconditional surrender of the men directing the new government is demanded by President Ebert, who announces he will continue to direct the affairs of the troubled country from Wurtemberg. The German national assembly will meet in Stuttgart tomorrow afternoon at four o'clock.

In Grip of Strike

Beirja is in the grip of a general strike, called by Socialists and Labor leaders as a counter stroke to the assumption of power by the government headed by Dr. Kapp who has issued a decree threatening all strike leaders and pickets with death if there is interference with vital public services. Extreme measures will be taken under the decree from four o'clock this afternoon, and it is possible the crisis of the new revolution will quickly follow.

Details of the situation throughout Germany are somewhat obscure, but there seems to be reason to believe the Ebert government is still holding control in the southern and western sections, while the Kapp regime is rather firmly entrenched in northeastern Prussia and in Silesia, where many towns and cities are reported to have declared their adherence to the new government.

Fighting is reported at various points throughout Germany, and it is said there was bloodshed in suburbs of Berlin yesterday, but it would seem that clashes so far reported have been between militia units and disorderly crowds. So far as is known, armed forces of the two governments have not come into collision.

IRKUTSK IN HANDS OF BOLSHEVIKI

Recent Seat of Kolchak Government Which Was Seized Last Month by Insurrectionary Troops Who Later Executed Leader, Now Held by Reds.

London, March 8.—Irkutsk, the recent seat of the Kolchak Government, which was seized last month by insurrectionary troops who later executed Admiral Kolveik, is now in the hands of Bolsheviki regulars, troops of the Red army having entered the town, it is announced in a wireless message from Howcos. Several members of the former Kolchak ministry and many active counter-revolutionists who were imprisoned in Irkutsk are being transferred to Omak, where they will be delivered to the judgment of a revolutionary tribunal, the despatch adds.

NEW CABINET TO BE FORMED IN RUMANIA

London, March 16.—Information received in Rumanian quarters in London is to the effect that King Ferdinand has accepted the resignation of acting Premier Kop and that he has commissioned General Averesco, minister of the interior, to form a new cabinet, says the London Times.



WOODSTOCK TOWN MANAGER

We copy the following from the Woodstock Standard which is clearly an attempt to mislead the public.

"THE TRUTH"
When the newspapers of Woodstock announced that the Town Management would be a good thing for our town, they tried to get their minds in the forward motion. Such does not seem to be the case with the Woodstock Standard. The paper, which has evidently been acting on the principles of efficient town management, has been going on to it in a way that is not to be tolerated. It is applying private business methods to public affairs. The other paper has taken up the defence of their present system.

We are well satisfied with the result of our change in civic control and having been closely in touch with the matters at the council board for many years should be in a position to know what is being done. We have nothing but admiration and kindly feeling for the people of Campbellton who so determinedly readjusted themselves after their disastrous fire, but we do wish to correct mis-leading statements which have been recently made in the Woodstock Standard referring to our annual operating costs. This statement would create the impression that the operating expense here per capita was \$27.00. The actual figures are as follows:

Fire warrant less discount	\$38,500.00
Income water and sewer rates	14,000.00
License, etc.	1,000.00
Total	\$53,500.00
Out of this \$53,500.00 the following fixed charges are covered:	
County	\$ 4,000.00
C. P. R. Gate	1,000.00
Grant County Hospital	500.00
Grant Public Library	1,200.00
Interest on Debenture Debt	11,500.00
School Grant to Board	1,200.00
Vocational Training Grant	3,700.00
Reducing Debenture Debt and Deposit Sinking Fund	2,900.00
Total	\$22,800.00

This leaves \$30,700.00 with which to carry on the maintenance and purchase supplies for the department, town hall, town tennis, streets, sidewalks, removal of snow, maintenance, equipment, renewal water and sewerage department, filtration of water, street lights, all salaries, assessments costs, printing, police department, poor maintenance and miscellaneous expenditure. During the past year, out of this sum, we also placed several hundred feet of concrete sidewalks and Tarvie road surface.

Our population is slightly over 4000 which means that the operations of the above department costs us less than \$8.00 per head. If any other town can do the above work any cheaper and give reasonable service, they are indeed to be congratulated. The results of our get-together policy are very evident these days in the new business enterprises which are now contemplating starting up in our town.

THE EXCHANGE PROBLEM.

One of the largest manufacturers of paper in the United States, has sent the following circular letter to all its customers throughout Canada:

"To our Canadian friends: We appreciate very much the loyalty of our customers in Canada who have continued to place with us their orders in spite of the adverse 'Exchange' conditions.

As concrete evidence of this appreciation we have decided to accept your cheques at par. They will be deposited in Canadian banks and we will from time to time use these funds for the purchase of Canadian bonds.

This action is an expression of sincere desire on our part to help Canada and yourselves, as well as to make possible the non-interruption of our cordial, pleasant relationship with you."

This is a lead which other manufacturers wishing to do business in Canada might follow.
