### MANGLED IN THE G. T. R. YARD

Brakeman R. E. Van Horne Pinched Between Two Cars-Died at the

Another terrible accident happened in the G. T. R. yard this morning, by which Brakeman R. E. Van Horne lost his life. Mr. Van Horne left the Western Hotel (his boarding place) at GOBBLING UP an early hour this morning, to go on his usual run, between here and Hamilton. While Conductor J. Rich was checking his train, the Hamilton way freight, Brakemen R. E. Van Horne and G. McDonald, were engaged in preparing things around the van. Mr. Van Horne was transferring some necessary articles from a van on the south side, which they had used yesterday. Three feet behind the way freight van were some stationary cars, and between these the unfortunate man was passing, when the cars, by some means, came together, possibly by the engine being put on, and Mr. Van Horne was pinned between the drawheads. His cry attracted the attention of his comrade, who ran to the roundhouse and telephoned for Dr. Drake. In the meanthe caboose, in which he was brought



Paris, Dec. 10.-Sir Edmund Monson's speech was animatedly discussed in the lobbies of the Chamber of Deputies yesterday, and an inclination was displayed to interpellate the foreign minister, M. Delcasse, on the subject.

The Courier du Soir says that the delegates of the national defense parliamentary group has already conferred with M. Delcasse regarding the

The Journal des Debats, in a long but moderate article crediting the ambassador with good intentions, says it believes that he aimed at maintaining good relations, as he has done court-eously throughout the crisis, but it does not admire his method. The writer of the article falls foul of the complaint regarding the "policy of pin-pricks," and says that whenever England encounters a rival interest she cries out that she feels a pin-prick and retaliates with the blow of stick. The paper makes light of the French educational scheme for Soudan, by which it believes Sir Edmund was specially arritated, and says that the ambassador ought to know better than to attach importance to that subject. It adds that the speech proves that the misunderstanding between the two nations has not been cleared, but nothing is easier than to come to an arrangement if England is willing. The recent speeches of British statesmen seem to show that they do not think the time has come for There is some reason for thinking that the writer of the foregoing is qualified to speak on behalf of M. Delcasse, the

foreign minister.

MISUNDERSTOOD. An explanation, evidently emanating from the British embassy here, has been published, declaring that the speech recently delivered by the British ambas-sador, Sir Edmund J. Monson, has been misunderstood, and repudiating any desire to interfere in the internal affairs or France or criticise her policy. Moreover, it is added, the whole attitude of the ambassador contradicts the supposition of malevoolent intention.

FRENCH SHORE QUESTION. Reliable reports have reached St. Johns, Nfld., to the effect that the British Government, during the coming session of parliament, will take vigorous action to bring about a speedy settlement of the French shore controversy. It is said that the leaders of both political parties in the House of Commons have agreed upon united action in upholding the case of Newfoundland, owing to the revelations of French aggression contained in the report of the royal commission recently in Newfoundland for the investigation of the whole subject.

MME. HENRY'S DENIAL. Mme. Henry, widow of Colonel committed suicide while under arrest in connection with the Dreyfus affair, has written a letter to the Siecle, declaring that the assertions that her husband lived far beyond his means are absolutely untrue. 



London, Dec. 8.-Admiral Noel, who has received the distinction of K.C.M.G. in recognition of his services during the recent critical period in Crete, is one of the youngest flag officers in the naval services. He joined the navy only forty years ago, when he was 13 years old; and he had risen to be a set-captain at the age of 36. For his services in command of the naval guard to Sir Garnet Woiseley at Cape Coast Castle in 1873, he received the Ashanti medal and Kumasi clasp. He offered to make her his wife, and promised to give up his own country. The parents objected, however, to their child, who had been brought up devout Catholic, being marrie Prussian Junker, who was a Protestant to boot. So the romance which threatened to lose a Bismarck for Prussia came to a sudden end. The heroine of the romance died many years ago as the well-to-do widow of an Austrian landed proprietor.

THE WORLD'S COSTLAEST NECK-LACE.

France has obtained little honor and less profit from her colonial ventures. Her ambition has been to achieve in the tropics what England has achieved in Australia, New Zealand, Canada, and her other tropical colonies - the founding of hardy dependencies, populated by a race mainly of the home stock, and bound to be the mother country by all the ties of affection and loyalty-dependencies which in the hour of need would prove a source of

strength to the nation. The failure of France is due rather to the fundamental difficulties of tropical colonization than to the evil effects of maladministration; for it is doubtful whether even any of England's tropical possessions, loyal as they undoubtedly are, would prove a source of strength in time of war Frenchmen have not emigrated to the French colonies, because to most white men the tropics offer little inducement as a home. The absence of all those conventions and luxuries which form so large a part of our daily life becomes unendurable as soon as the novelty of a strange land has worn off.

### EXTRADITION EXTRAORDINARY

A Confidence Man Who Is in Great Demand.

Washington, Dec. 10.-The department of state has a peculiar extradition case on its hands. Upon the request of the governor of New York the department applied to the British authorities for the arrest of a man named Hamilton, who is detained at Belleville, Ont. He has been going through New York State claiming to represent a number of large firms, and getting advance
