Chicago Will Raise \$10,000,000 for Expenses.

Washington, March 8.—The Chicago committee, which is in Washington to consult with the sub-committee of the House Committee on the World's Fair, were promptly on hand at an early hour, and discussed with the sub-committee for two hours the details of the bill, going over about four sections of it. The Chicago committee pledged the members of the Fair Committee that Chicago would raise \$10,000,000 with which to erect all the necessary buildings and pay the expenses of the Fair, and will only ask the United States Government to make the necessary appropriation to erect its own buildings and take care of its own exhibits. The committees hope to finish it by Monday.

LOOTING IN THE NORTHWEST. The charge made in the House of Comons by Mr. Lister against General Middleton and two officers of the Dominion Government is serious enough to form the subject of discussion and inquiry by Parliament, and having been made in the straightforward way it was, we are surprised that the Government should have offered the opposition they did to the naming of a perfectly right in protecting the reputation of its officers, and it ought not lightly to permit of attacks being made upon them; but Mr. Lister's charge was direct and positive, and was backed by statements of so strong a character as to make the refusal of a committee a very serious matter both to the parties concerned and to the Government itself. Yet the grounds on which the refusal was made were of the most unsubstantial character, and had they been held to the end the conclusion would have been inevitable that a crime had gone unredressed through the determined desire of the Government to shield its friends from a well-deserved punishment. 


