Prof. Koch's Discovery.

Berlin, Nov. 8.—The discovery of Prof. Koch, of the Berlin University, of a method for the cure of consumption by inoculation with attenuated tubercular bacillus, is exciting the greatest interest. It seems probable that a motion will be introduced in the Prussian Diet looking to the establishment of a bacteriological institute, which will be under the direction of Prof. Koch. The private patients under Koch's care belong to the higher aristocracy, and have pledged their word of honor to keep silonee until he releases them from their obligation. From a private source information has come that a consumptive youth, the son of an official at the Hygienic Institute, of which Koch is president, has already been cured. In cases now under treatment a change for the better is observed after five or six injections of lymph, within a fortnight. In one case of long standing it took months to effect an improvement. Before six months all the patients will have passed through the period of observation, and then Prof. Koch will be ready to put the result before the world. He thinks four to eight weeks will be necessary to complete the cure, but slight cases may take less time.

The Cabinet Council And the Sentence of Death Must Be

The Doomed Man Notified by His Wife —He Still Protests that He Did Not Kill Benwell.

OTTAWA, Nov. 8 .- In the Birchall cas ts course, so that Birchall will be executed in Woodstock jail yard Nov. 14. The decision of the Cabinet was taken on Wednesday evening, but owing to the intervention of Thankagiving Day the approval of the Governor-General was not obtained till yesterday afternoon. The Department of Justice have notified the authorities at Woodstock of the decision. It is understood that the Cabinet was unanimous in its judgment, being convinced of Birchall's guilt.

IT WAS EXPECTED.

Woodstock, Nov. S.—The action of the Dominion Government in allowing the law to take its course in the Birchall case was anticipated by nearly every one here, including the prisoner. Mrs. Birchall and Mrs. West-Jones had some hope, however, and when the press dispatch containing the decision of the Cabinet was shown them they were inclined to doubt its accuracy. They did not expect that the decision would be known until Monday or Tuesday of next week. After the press dispatch was received Mrs. Birchall visited her husband in the jail, but did not tell him anything about it. Mr. MacMurchy shortly afterwards received a telegram from the Deputy Minister of Justice stating that it had been decided that the law would have to take its course, and that removed all doubts. Mrs. Birchall returned to the jail and performed the melancholy duty of removing the last hope that her husband may have cherished. Birchall has certainly always said that he did not believe the petition would do any good. Though he does not often show it, he is becoming fully alive to the awful position he is in, and suffers intense mental anguish.

A DEADLY DUEL

Growing Out of the Recent Election in

Crowing Out of the Recent Election in Rentucky.

Lexinoton, Ky., Oct. 8.—The election day duel in Estill county turns out to have been one of the most desperate encounters ever winessed in Kentucky. A man from Irvine, the county seat, yesterday told the story of the duel: The principles were Dr. Lilly on the one side and John Wilson, a school commissioner, on the other. Lilly was a republican and Wilson a Democrat. Lilly brought a negro to the polls to vote for him, but Wilson challenged the vote, which was sustained by the judges. This angered Lilly and hot words followed, which resulted in both men drewing revolvers. Lilly was the quickest, and had shot Wilson twice near the heart before the latter could get his weapon. Wilson then pulled his pistol out and fired two shots, one of which struck Lilly in the region of the heart.

About this time Wilson's brother interfered and succeeded in wresting Lilly's weapon from his hand. Nothing daunted, however, and almost in the throes of death, Lilly drew his knife and made several stabs at his enemy. Both fell to the ground, but the terrible duel was not over. With the last of shir fast ebbing strength Wilson raised up and fired the remaining chamber at Grain Lilly, brother of Doctor Lilly, who had appeared on the scene, inflicting a wound which caused his death.

Wilsen then crawled over to where his antagonist lay and buried the hammer of his pistol in Dr. Lilly's head. Lilly died in a few minutes, while Wilson lingered until next day. Three outsiders were also wounded, but were not seriously hurt. The Lilly boys are sons of Judge E. Clay Lilly, who has gained a national reputation for trying the mountain desperadoes of Kentucky.

A HOT TIME IN PICTOU, N. S.

The wages of the freight engineers and firemen in the employ of the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern Railroad Company have been increased 20 cents a day. The engineers are advanced from \$3.50 to \$3.70 and the firemen from \$1.65 to \$1.85.

The matter of trainmen's salaries of the Michigan Central Railroad is probably settled. The officials have made a proposition to the men which will doubtless be accepted. Two conductors are authority for saying that it is a raise of \$10 per month for conductors, who heretofore received \$100, and \$5 for brakemen and baggagemen, whose wages were \$50 and \$60 respectively per month. The demand made by the men was for a raise of \$25 for conductors and \$10 for brakemen and baggagemen. It is believed the men would accept the proffered terms. The increase affects only the main line between Chicago and Buffalo.

When the Ball Company wishes to sell to the city, its owners produce figures to show that fabulous profits are to be made out of the investment. Why, then, should the companies be so exacting while they are sellers of light and not of lighting plant?

It seems to us that the Council is not warranted in acceding to the terms formulated by the companies. Unless a radical amendment of the terms can be obtained, the whole question should be left for the new Council to deal with.

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



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Fruit Culture on the Great Western Plains.

A grassy plain, stretching as far as the eye can see, unrelieved by tree or shrub, valley or mountain height, is not descriptive of Manitoba, however much we may bread and talk of the broad and boundless prairie, and to one who has thought of the country as being a smooth monotony, the variety and beauty of the landscape scenery is a pleasing revelation. It is quite true that the land is not by any means all hills and valleys, nor is it densely covered with trees and shrubs. From Winnipeg to Portage la Prairie, a distance of 66 miles west, or from Winnipeg past Morris, a distance for 60 miles south, and for miles in various other parts of the country you can gaze into the distance, and scarcely a tree or shrub and not the slightest elevation will intercept the view; the eye nees nothing save the level prairie and the blue sky above. But pest Portage, up the Manitoba and Northwestern Railway to Birtle, or on the main line west past Brandon, or, if it please you better, along the Manitoba and Southwestern Railway past Morden, mountains are seen in the distance, the prairie is rolling, often rising to abrupt heights and descending into deep ravines, many of which are threaded with trees and shrubs. This is specially true of the country along the Manitoba and Northwestern Railway.

Next to Winnipeg it is the largest and most prosperous town in the Province. Surrounded by a magnificent farming country and possessing exceptional railway facilities, it is sure in the near future to become a town of very considerable importance. Its citizens are enterprising, energetic and ambitious, so ambitious that they boast and apparently hope some day to rival Winnipeg. They claim, and with some truth, that Brandon possesses many natural advantages all important to the building up of a successful city which Winnipeg does not enjoy. On behalf of Winnipeg, however, let it be said, its citizens are not the least disturbed at their younger rival's prospects, and are confident that their city must ever increasingly be, as it now is, the metropolis of the Northwest.

On the opposite and northern bank of the Assiniboine, slightly to the east of the central part of the town, is situated the new Provincial Home for Incurables. possessing the additional advantage of a considerable portion of it being scrubby, thus giving them that variety of soil essential to successful experimenting applicable to the varied needs of the Province. In a country like Manitoba, subject as it certainly is in some years to drought and others to frost, it is a most important matter which grains best combine, the flargest yield, and of wheat, the flour producing qualities, with hardiness and early maturity, and on what kind of soil the respective crops can most profitably be grown. These and numberless other questions that might be suggested are all of vital importance to successful farming in this country, and are questions the solution of which no individual farmer can afford to attempt. Of the many departments, all of which are interesting, the one that specially attracted my attention was that of fruit culture. I will confess to a great fondness for fruit, and its scarcity in this country is more than noticeable. A fruit vendor would almost look aghast were you to ask for a peek of apples; they are always sold by the pound. Four good-sized apples will eastly make a pound, and at the present time you can purchase this extensive quantity of fruit for 10 cents. The merchants claim they can tell, without the least difficulty, whether a customer is an inhabitant or a new arrivel, and in no case perhaps more easily than should the customer wish to purchase fruit, as the following incident will show: While I was in Brandon a short time ago a gentleman walked into a fruit store and asked for 5 cents worth of peaches. The merchant made answer, "We do not divide them in this country." The man looked puzzled and said, "Beg your pardon, sir, what did you say?" Again the reply came, "We do not divide them in this country." The customer catching at least a faint glimmer of the merchant's meaning, stammered out: "Why, what do you mean?
