Lady Stanley and the regal household have postponed their proposed departure this week for the New Brunswick fishing grounds owing to the illness of the Premier.

OTTAWA, June 3.—The most unsatisfactory development at yesterday's session of the Privileges and Election Committee in relation to the MetFreevy case was in connection with Martin P. Simultaneous Showers Water Haif the United States.

Serious Damage from Flectric Storms

CHICAGO, June 3.—Over half of the United States was simultaneously visited with rain last night, and the edge of the great spot of wet was made ragged with a cyclone. The condition of telegraph wires north, south, east and weat showed a state of affairs seldom if ever equaled. Soaking rains were in progress, accompanied with driving winds from here to New Orleans and stretching beyond St. Faul and Minneapolis in the north, and in the west for an indefinite distance.

Milwaukee reports severe electrical disturbances. Further northwest in the Dakotas many towns were cut off from telegraphic communication.

One of the most disastrous rain storms ever known in that section visited Darlington, Wis., last evening. The wind blew a hurricane, the rain came down in torrents and large hail stones fell. Considerable damage was done to crops and fruit.

At Watertown, N. Y., yesterday a cyclone demolished six barns, and six miles east of that place carried away two houses and three more barns. Horses were picked up bodily and sent sprawling, and wagons were dashed to pieces. Three people were killed at Hazel.





The Prohibition Debate De clared Off for a Time.

And the Budget May Possibly Brought Down on Friday.

OTTAWA, June 3.—The new member for Algoma took his place to-day in the House. Mr. Laurier asked the Minister of Justice if he was in a position to-day to lay on the table the papers in connection with the Washington negotiations, and Sir John Thompson replied that he expected to present a part of them during the afternoon. Sir John Thompson then referred to an agreement which had been come to with regard to the resumption of the debate on Mr. Jamieson's prohibition resolution, which, according to the order paper, would come up this evening. It had been arranged, he said, that this debate be suspended. It was an important subject, involving a change in the policy of the Government. The issue of the Premier's illness would result in new advisers of the Crown being

The issue of the Premier's illness would result in new advisers of the Crown being called upon, and therefore the debate of this question had better be suspended.

Dr. Landerkin, following up the exposure of the methods of the Department of Public Works in the manipulation of contracts, acquired from Sir Hector Langevin some information with regard to the work on the Beaverton dock.


