





A plan should be prepared on a scale of about 400 feet to the inch, showing all the sewers intercepted, the gully holes. man holes, area drained, and inclination of each sewer, etc. If on any street crossed by one of the new main sewers, it be found that the street gullies are not sufficient to arrest all the sand and street detritus, such old sewer should not be connected with the new sewer system until prop er changes had been made. If sand be permitted to enter the new sewers it will either form dams or settle along the inverts. These will soon become saturated with sewage and give off offensive odors. In the ponds of sew-age thus formed part of the solids will be deposited. 



Melodrama at the Grand - A Disappointed Audience.

"When London Sleeps" is the title of a theatrical offering at the Grand, whicr began a three nights' stay last evening. Those who expected something high-class, because of the prices charged, were greatly disappointed. The production is made of the usual stuff that parades under the name of melodrama-a fearful and wonderful plot, with impossible and absurd sitmerit, and vitiated by vulgarity. There were not many people floor-the show is aimed chiefly at the gods-and the refined portion of the audience would cheerfully have excused the shortening of the play if the second act had been cut out entirely. The scenic effects, on which a melodrama hiefly depends, are tame and tawdry. The company is also an ordinary one, but the piece does not call for any great talent. "When London Sleeps" is not of the type which pleases London theater-goers, and the management pay their patrons no compliment in recommending such performances.
