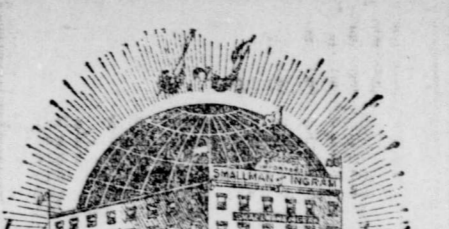

**The Canadian Roads Have Plenty of Freighting to Do.**

**Large Shipments of Cattle Via Montreal - New Rules Recommended in Re Shipment of Grain from Canada Via United States Ports.**

A large amount of stock is moving on the G. T. R. Fifteen cars of stock were shipped to Montreal port on Saturday morning.

Ten new box cars have just been added to the C. P. R.'s rolling stock at Toronto junction.

Mr. Frank Watson, G. T. R. district freight agent at Sarnia, was presented the other day with a traveling bag and silver watch set by the railway employees. He is soon to be married.

Some 15 or 20 men will be added to the large staff of employees already busily employed in the C. P. R. car shops at Toronto at once. This time ago a number of men were laid off, but the pressure of work became so great that it was soon found necessary to re-engage them. This has been the busiest season in these shops for some years.

Since the season opened there have been over one hundred train loads of cattle transhipped from the west, for export via Montreal. The one hundred and second train left Toronto on the way east of Fort William, estimated 20 cars to a train and 20 head of cattle to a car, which is a good rate estimate, from a railway point of view.

There have been, together with the regular train, about 100 in round numbers shipped from Montreal during the season.

The decline in passenger business during the past week has enabled the Grand Trunk to make several changes in the traffic department with a view to economizing. On the run from Toronto to Sarnia, the Toronto engines will make the through journey instead of being changed at Stratford, as heretofore. The passenger work between Goderich and Stratford will be performed by three engines instead of four. These changes will make three or four more engines available for freight traffic.

New rules governing the shipment of grain from Canada exported via the G. T. R. to New York, Philadelphia or Baltimore, to the G. T. R. have been recommended by the managers of the Joint Traffic Association, and Toronto will be inspected and graded in Canada before passing the frontier, and the cars will be turned over to the trunk lines with duplicate certificates of the grades from the Canadian Government inspectors, attached to weigh bills.

A decidedly fast run was made on the M. C. R. on Thursday night, when No. 5 express went from St. Thomas to Windsor 111 miles, in 192 minutes. The train was late when Engineer Joseph Worden pulled out of the yards here, and four slow-ups meant about 7 or 8 minutes more. The train rolled into the Windsor depot, Tidgeway, 43 miles from St. Thomas, in 192 minutes. The train was composed of four sleepers and a parlor car, each weighing 40 tons, or a total of 200 tons.

**KING'S DAUGHTERS.**  
Proposed Changes in the Constitution - Officers Nominated.

Ottawa, Oct. 11.—The King's Daughters resumed their session today. The postponed revision of the constitution was taken up, Mrs. Davis moving several amendments—the first regarding the spiritual life of the order, the second on membership. Her remarks on the unity of the whole order won much applause.

On the amendment that all enrolled members are hereby constituted members of the Canadian branch, Mrs. Davis said no members were wanted who could not pay 25 cents for membership.
