The testimony of Secretary Gage as to the condition of the treasury and its requirements has been given to the public. The available balance in the treasury on April 30 was \$179,832,472, but from this it is necessary to deduct the \$50,000,000 appropriated for the national defense. He estimated that when the deficiencies in the war and navy departments were met there would be an available balance of \$91,-000,000. The treasurer estimated that he must have \$50,000,000 for a working balance from day to day. He thought that, all told, the treasury could count upon available cash to the extent of \$70,000,000 above the \$100,000,000 gold reserve. The best estimates placed the extraordinary expenses of the war and navy departments at \$52,000,000 up to July 1 next, in addition to the \$50,000,-000 voted for national defense. thought that from \$40,000,000 to \$50,000,-000, in addition to the ordinary revenues, would have to be raised between now and July 1 to preserve the gold reserve intact. The secretary refused to furnish an estimate of expenses of the war after July 1, because he had no data from the war and navy departments, but he gave the committee what he called a "guess," placing the figure at \$25,000,-000 a month, in addition to the ordin-

SEIZURE OF THE FRENCH STEAMER A MISTAKE. Key West, Fla., May 7.-Commodore Watson has received orders from Washington instantly to release the French mail steamer Lafayette, and to send her to Havana under escort. The capture of the Frenchman by the gunboat Annapolis turns out to have been mistake, but no protest has been made by the representatives of the French Government in the United States. The officials here declare that this will close the affair. It appears that before the Lafayette sailed for Havana the French egation in Washington was instructed to communicate with the state department. This was done, and permission granted to the steamer to enter and discharge her passengers and cargo with the understanding that she would take on nothing there. Instructions for the fulfillment of this agreement were sent from Washington to Admiral Sampson's squadron, and it was only learned today, after the capture was made, that they were never delivered. This afternoon U. S. Commissioner Otto, U. S. District Attorney Stripling out to the Lafayette, examined her papers and cabled the state department for instructions. without delay in the form of an order to Commodore Watson.





Several letters were read by the secretary. One was from Thomas Beattle, M.P., and referred to the resolution favoring the laying of a Pacific cable from British Columbia to Australia. The government has it now under consideration, the letter stated. The minister of public works, Hon. Mr. Tarte, wrote explaining that the reason why the harbor at Port Stanley was not being dredged was that the dredge Ontario was being repaired. Another letter was received from the Montreal Board of Trade urging cooperation in an effort to secure insolvency legislation. A resolution indorsing the bill before parliament was solicited. Some of the members said it was understood the bill would not be reached this session, and the letter was referred to the council of the board to be discussed fully later.

An invitation for official representation of the London board at the Greater Britain Exhibition to be held in Earlscourt, London, England, from May to October, 1899, was referred to the coun-

City Clerk Kingston wrote asking the feeling of the board on the complaint made by the L. E. and D. R. R. Company against the G. T. R. for not switching the former's cars free of charge. Letters from Mr. G. J. Leggatt, secretary of the L. E. and D. R. R., sent to Mr. Kingston as secretary of the L. and P. S. R., were read. They stated that on April 1 last year the G. T. R. refused to perform any further switching free of charge for the L. E. and D. R. R., pursuant to the 99-year lease. Therefore the L. E. and D. R. R. looked to the L. and P. S. R. Company to have the terms of the lease enforced. Mr. Leggatt's letter stated that between April 1, 1897, and April 1, 1898, the G. T. R. switched 420 cars for the L. E. and D. R. R., for which they asked \$2 a car, and when the slip-docks are completed and the fer-ries running to Cleveland, the number of cars will be double that amount. Mr. T. H. Smallman said the city council and the London and Port Stanley board should take the necessary steps to have the Grand Trunk Railway Company carry out the terms of their lease, and expressed that as the opinion of the board in a motion, which was seconded by Mr. W. J. Saunby, and carried. RETAIL MERCHANTS WELCOME.

Mr. John Cameron stated that there was an impression among many that the board of trade had lost some of its ancient vigor and vim, and the idea also prevailed that the organization was run chiefly in the interest of the wholesale trade. He urged that the retail merchants be interested in the board and an effort be made to induce them to become members. There were hundreds of business men in the city interested in the work of the board, and it seemed absurd that the regular meetings should be attended by only half a dozen. Referring to the movement to form a retailers' association. he said that organization should in some way be affiliated with the board of trade. The retail trade was the bone and sinew of the commercial life of the community. He moved that the new officers place themselves in communication with the promoters of the retailers' association and an attempt be made to bring about affiliation.

Mr. D. W. Blackwell seconded the motion, and indorsed it heartily. He strongly wished to see a larger representation of retailers on the board.

Her Area, Population, Industry, Revenue and Military Strength.

Has a Large Army and No Mean an extraordinary expenditure of £9, are modernized. Her people are governated by the spirit of Quixotism that

Her People Illiterate-Country Well Fortified-The Spirit of Quixotism Still Pervading.

Spain's area and population, as they are at the present time, are interesting, in view of the fact that once her possessions were greater than those of any other European power. Her present area, including the Balearic and Canary Islands, each of which is considered a province, is 197,670 square miles. New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and all of the New England States combined have an area of 162,-065 square miles. Spain is therefore a trifle larger than these States. On the other hand, Texas has an area of 262,290 square miles, so that Texas is 74,620 square miles larger than Spain. The population of Spain is estimated to be 17,650,234, about the same as that of the New England and Middle States named.

Besides the Canary and Balearic Islands, Spain holds the colonies of Cuba, area 42,655 miles; population before the war, 1,631,687; Porto Rico, area 3,500 population 806,708. Total area and population in America, 45,-205 square miles and 2,438,395 persons respectively. Her possessions in Asia are: The Philippine Islands, area 114,-326 square miles, population 7,000,000; the Sulu Islands, area 950 square miles, population 75,000; the Caroline Islands and Palaos, area 560 miles, population 36,000; the Marianne Islands, area 420 square miles, population 10,172. Total area and population in Asia, 116,256 square miles, and 7,121,172 persons. Her possessions in Africa are Plo de Oro and Adrar, area 243,000 square miles, 6,000; Fernando Po, Annabon, Corisco, miles, and 136,000 persons. That, however, is practically all that it did. for no provision whatever was made for supporting these internationals when once they plunged into the campaign except the moral support of the federation. Grand Master Machinist James O'Connell, of the International Association of Machinists and Metal Workers, has issued an address in which he says: "Considering the gravity of the question involved, the vote cast by our organization on the advisability of demanding a working day of eight hours on May 1 next has been a source of worry and disappointment to your grand lodge officers. One would think an important question like this would have brought forth a referendum vote that would be phenomenal, for its thoroughness and closeness to our total membership. It didn't. Less than onequarter of our totality thought the question of sufficient importance to record a vote for or against it. This was disheartening, and after deep thought officers to the conclusion that where so much indifference was displayed, no solidarity of action could be counted upon should the demand be made. To atproportions without a majority of our organization behind the effort would be criminal. To make the attempt without counting the cost and the chances of success would only end in disaster both to the individuals involved and the organization. To attempt it without unanimity of opinion that the time and the organization were ripe would be betraying those that thought the time for action had arrived. ## Christianity Is Revolutionary.

Robust Force for the Bettering of the World.

Rev. Dr. Talmage Speaks of an Aspect of Religion Seldom Placed Before the World in Its True Colors.

Washington, May 4.-Rev. Dr. Talmage preached on Sunday from the text, Acts, xvii., 6, "These that have demolishing all his possessions. I have turned the world upside down are come hither also."

There is a wild, bellowing mob around the house of Jason in Thessalonica. What has the man done so greatly to offend the people? He has been entertaining Paul and his comrades. The mob surround the house and cry: "Bring out those turbulent preachers! They are interfering with our business! They are ruining our religion! They are actually turning the world upside down!"

The charge was true, for there is nothing that has such a tendency to turn the world upside down as glorious Christianity. The fact is that the world now is wrong side up, and it needs to be turned upside down in order that it may be right side up. Our religion has often been misrepresented as a principle of tears and mildness and fastidiousness, afraid of crossing people's prejudices, afraid of making somebody mad, with silken gloves lifting the people up from the church pew into glory, as though they were Bohemian glass, so very delicate that with one touch it may be demolished forever. Men speak of religion as though it were a refined imbecility, as though it were a spiritual chlore form that the people were to take until the sharp cutting of life were over. The Bible, so far from this, represents the religion of Christ as robust and brawny-ransacking and upsetting 10,-000 things that now seem to be settled on firm foundations.

The religion of the Bible will make a revolution in the family. Those things that are wrong in the family circle will be overthrown by it, while justice and harmony will take the place. The husband will be the head of the household only when he is fit to be. I know who spends all the money he makes in drink, as well as all the money that his wife makes, and sometimes sells the children's clothes for rum. Do you tell me that he is to be the head of that household? You say that the Bible says that the wife is to be the subject of the husband. I know it, but that is a husmakes a woman subordinate to a man unworthy of her. When Christianity give the dominacy to that one who is most worthy of it.

As religion comes in at the front door, mirth and laughter will not go out at the back door. It will not hopple the children's feet. It will steal from the little one neither ball nor bat, nor hoop nor kite. It will establish a family altar. Angels will hover over it. Ladders of light will reach down to it. The glory of heaven will stream upon it. There will be a hearty, joyful family altar in every domescircle. You will not have to go far to find Hannah rearing her Samuel for the temple or a grandmother Lois instructing her young Timothy in the knowledge of Christ, or a Mary and Martha and Lazarus gathered in fraternal and sisterly affection, or a table at which Jesus sits, as at that of Zaccheus, or a home in which Jesus dwells, as in the house of Simon the tanner. The religion of Jesus Christ, coming into the domestic circle, will overthrow all jealousies, all janglings. and peace and order and holiness will possession of the home.

Again, Christianity will produce a revolution in commercial circles. You say to some one about a merchant, "Is he honest?" "Oh, yes," the man says, "he is honest, grinds the faces of his clerks! He is honest, but he exaggerates the value of his goods. He is honest, but he loans money on bond and mortgage with the understanding that the mortgage can lie quiet for ten years, but as soon as he gets the mortgage he records it and begins a foreclosure suit, and the sheriff's writ comes down, and the day of sale arrives, and away goes the homestead and the creditor buys it in at half

With the casualties that are properly classified as due to grade-crossings are generally included accidents to down just so as to keep. It seems as trespassers—that is, to persons who attempt to cross or walk at grade upon the lines between the prescribed crossings. This class of accidents forms a large factor in the sum total of deaths and injuries, and great care is taken by the foreign companies to protect the public in this particular. Fully one-third of all the accidents to persons on the English roads belong to this class, and while it is generally regarded that these accidents are the result of carelessness on the part of those who take the risks of entering upon the lines, it is nevertheless noticeable that no reasonable precautions are neglected. In America, as a whole, scarcely any provision is made for pre-

venting this class of accidents. In the State of Massachusetts alone there are about half as many deaths from this cause as in the whole of Great Britain and Ireland; and during in that state have been of this class. By averaging the fatalities occurring in Great Britain and Germany, and comparing with the average for Massachusetts and Connecticut, the proportion is about as seven to one in favor of the foreign countries. Certain classes of accidents are now almost unknown in Germany. Accidents to pedestrians at road-crossings, or to passengers from crossing the tracks at stations, are hardly possible at the present time. Any one attempting to walk upon the track is sure to be of an employe.





Little Rock, Ark., May 7.-A special from Vanburen, Ark., says: Water-spouts and tornadoes have played havoc here and done hundreds of thousands of dollars damage. . Three houses were blown down at Suday, eight miles east of here, last night, and it is reported that Winslow, a summer resort on the top of the Boston Mountain, is entirely gone. Two bridges on the 'Frisco road, over Clear Creek, have been swept away, and the road abandoned. Their trains have run for two days around via Claremore, I. T., and then down the Kansas and Arkansas Valley road, but the latter had a two-mile washout and 300 yards landslide, and Vanburen is now entirely cut off, save by way of Little Rock. The Arkansas River is 25 miles wide in places, and is now four inches higher than it was in 1892, which was the highest on record.
