## KINGSTON, JAMAICA, HARD HIT BY QUAKE; FIRE FOLLOWS AND DOES GREAT DAMAGE

### Thirty British Soldiers Reported Killed by the Collapse of a Military Hospital.

### THE DOCK AND WAREHOUSE SECTION WIPED OUT houses within a radius of 10 miles were

Sir James Ferguson Reported Missing-Canadians and Englishmen the earthquake and completed the work Attending Agricultural Conference Escape Uninjured—The Colonial Bank Burned-Relief for Stricken City.

While detailed news of the Kingston earthquake is received but slowly, owing to interruption of the land lines in Jamaica, it is now known that the extent of the loss of life and damage done was not so great as at first reported. An official report to the British colonial office by Governor Sweetenham states that 40 soldiers were killed, and mentions one officer, Major Headyman, as having been seriously injured. No officer was killed. The number of injured in the hospitals was placed at 300. The governor also reported that the fire was decreasing.

Some anxiety is caused by the destruction of the Myrtle Bank Hotel, in which a number of foreign visitors were stopping. No word has been received, however, that any of the occupants of the hotel were killed. Inhabitants of the city have sought shelter in camps, and no house between Kingston and Bull Bay, eight miles distant, is considered safe for occupancy.

Already relief measures are under way and several steamship lines announced today that relief supplies will be carried free of charge to the

There is doubt as to the fate of Sir James Ferguson, a former member of the British cabinet, who is reported missing.

New York, Jan. 16 .- Few additional details of the earthquake disaster of Monday at Kingston reached this city during the night. The brief messages that came from Holland Bay, the cable station on the Island of Jamaica, located 40 miles from Kingston, brought reports that the disaster was not so great as had been at first feared. Only a part of the town was ruined by the earthquake shocks, and the loss of life is placed at 30, while 300 persons are

The fire, which had started after the tremor, is said to have been brought under control late on Monday night. The panic in Kingston was apparently short lived, as it was stated that the work of rescuing and caring for the injured was under way. Many persons, however, fled from the city, and took refuge in the surrounding country, fearing a recurrence of the shocks.

An official dispatch received in the colonial office in London today confirms the reports that the destruction wrought by earthquake and fire was not as widespread as first reported. This dispatch stated that while the total number of killed and wounded had not yet been definitely ascertained, it was apparently not large. The greatest number of casualties occurred in the camp hospital, where 30 colored soldiers were killed.

#### FIRST REPORTS EXAGGERATED.

London, Jan. 16 .- The destruction wrought by the earthquake at Kingston, Jamaica, and the subsequent conflagration, according to an official telegram received this morning at the colonial office, was by no means so widespread as indicated in the first reports.

Although the total number of killed and wounded has not yet been ascertained, it is apparently not very large, and only a small portion of the city, including, however, wharves and warehouses, suffered from the fire that fol-

#### GOVERNOR TELLS STORY.

The telegram, which was sent by Governor Sweetenham, is undated, but is presumed to have been sent on Monday. The text follows:

"Severe earthquake shock this afternoon between 3 and 4 o'clock caused considerable damage to houses at Kingston. It was followed by a fire which continues, though it is confined to about one-sixteenth part of the town, containing wharves and warehouses. The camp hospital was destroyed, and 30 men were killed. There were no officers among them. Major Headyman was seriously injured. The town hospital is crowded with some 300 injured persons. The fire is now decreasing. The Myrtle Bank Hotel was destroyed, and the cable office. The conference delegates and the members of Sir Alfred Jones' expedition are believed to be uninjured, and are now at Port Langston. In the harbor numbers of people were killed or wounded, but the figures have not yet been ascertained. Slighter shocks continue."

### WHARVES AND WAREHOUSES BURNED.

London, Jan. 16.-The steamship and cable companies here have received belated messages dated Monday via Holland Bay. A dispatch to the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, says:

"Kingston wrecked and most of the wharves and warehouses burned, but our main wharf, sheds, coal and cargo safe. Offices wrecked. Constantine, superintendent of the company, and Capt. Young, commander of the Areno,

The Areno is a small steamer belonging to the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, and it is presumed that the superintendent and the captain were killed in the wreck of the company's office.

#### SIR JAMES FERGUSON MISSING.

The message to the Royal Mall Company simply says that Sir James Ferguson, who represented the company at the agricultural conference, is missing, and adds that Governor Sweetenham had asked the local representatives of the company to sell provisions to those requiring them. Chairman Phillips of the company cabled the governor placing all the available provisions and stores of the company at his service for the relief of the sufferers from the earthquake and fire, and also cabled to the New York offices of the Royal Mail Company to send provisions to Kingston by the Atrato and other steamers with all possible speed. The company has not heard of any damage having been sustained by their vessels in Kingston harbor.

#### COLONIAL BANK BURNED.

Other cable dispatches from Kingston says that the offices of the West India Cable Company were wrecked, but that no fatalities occurred among the members of the staff. Mr. Codner, one of the clerks, was severely injured.

The Colonial Bank of Kingston was burned down. The vaults, with the books and cash are safe, and the members of the staff escaped uninjured. Cable communication has been restored to within eight miles of Kingston, connection having been made with the cable at a place called Bull Bay. The latest information received here from Kingston says that the fire was under control, and added that the number of West Indian soldiers killed in the camp hospital was 40, instead of 30, as previously reported.

#### MANY HOUSES DOWN.

London, Jan. 16.-The contradictory and scanty character of the news which thus far has reached London from Jamaica renders it difficult to estimate the real extent of the calamity caused by the earthquake, and subsequent conflagration. Messages received by various steamship and cable companies indicate that while the early reports of the destruction of Kingston and great loss of life were exaggerated, the disaster was still of a grave character. Ruin and desolation are said to stretch for miles outside the city of Kingston. The shocks were felt from 50 to 60 miles, and one dispatch from a temporary cable station at Bull Bay says that not a single house between there and Kingston is safe.

The colonial office has instructed the Government in Jamaica to take all the necessary steps to relieve the distress among the earthquake and fire sufferers, and the admiralty has ordered the cruiser Brilliant, now at Bermuda, and the cruiser Indefatigable, at Trinidad, to proceed to Jamaica and assist in the relief work. They are both vessels of 3,600 tons, and their comblined crews number 550 men which wil! enable them to land strong detachments for police and other duties in the devastated city. Toronto, Jan. 16.-The Kingston (West indies) earthquake was recorded on the Foronto Observatory seismograph at 3:50 p.m. on the 14th as a moderate disturbance, lasting an hour.

Ottawa, Jan. 16.-The earthquake at Kingston, Jamaica, was recorded at the observatory here on Monday afternoon. From the record of the seismograph it appears much less violent than the one at San Francisco. Besides, the earth movements subsided much sooner.

#### Death in Typhoon

Manila, Jan. 16.—The Islands of Leyte and Samar were swept by a typhoon on Jan. 10. One hundred lives were lost in Leyte. # Board to Get an Expert's Report on Water Situation

### Commission Also Decides to Cut Off Street Watering and Lawn Services Owing to the Scarcity of Supply.

"That the secretary of the water commission notify the city council at once that on account of the alarming probability of a shortage of water during the coming summer, the commission will be unable to contract with the council for the supply of water for street watering. The commission beg to point out that water may be available for this purpose from the electric power house, and other wells through the city, such as Labatt's, Leonard's, Gorman & Eckert's, Carling's, etc., as well as from the sulphur springs, and the river; but that these special supplies can be contracted and arranged for by the council, equally as well as by the commission."

The water commissioners last night adopted the above resolution, which proves the first practical demonstration of the water shortage for the new year. Darch. Commissioner Saunders, Mayor Judd, Superintendent Moore and Secretary Ellwood were at

#### The Pumping Situation.

The pumping statement showed that there is no question as to the water shortage, because though from 3,600,000 gallons to 3,850,000 gallons of water have been pumped every day since Christmas, the water in the reservoir has shown no appreciable increase. One day there would be 11 feet 6 inches of water in the reservoir. Another day 11 feet 4 inches, and so on. Thus, it is seen that the city is consuming the water in a very favorable month as fast as it can be pumped. Scarcely any water is going into the reservoir.
