FORTY JAPANESE SAILORS KILLED BY AN EXPLOSION

Terrible Disaster on Board the Battleship Kishma During Target Practice.

Tokio, Sept. 17, noon.-Forty of the crew were killed and dozens injured on board the Japanese battleship Kishima by the explosion of a 12-inch shell within the shield, after target practice, near Kure, at 4 p.m., on September 9. The Kashima, under command of Capt. Koizumi, reached Kure at 6 p.m., where the wounded were placed in the hospital. The fatalities included lieutenant, two cadets, and one staff officer. The details regarding the effects of the explosion are small, but it is said the ship is badly damaged. 



FEATS OF DIVERS.

The recent endurance of a diver, Trapnell by name, for five and a half hours in 22 fathoms of water recalls some remarkable feats of other famous divers. James Hopper, an English diver, engaged in recovering copper from a ship sunk somewhere off the South Atlantic Coast, reached a depth of 204 feet. The pressure was, so exhausting, however, that, had he remained at that depth for more than 20 minutes at a time, the blood would have been flowing freely from ears and nose. The pay of a diver is from \$5 to \$10 a day for ordinary harbor and dock work, but in the case of special deep sea salvage the fees are a great deal more, with frequently a percentage of the value recovered. Alexander Lambert made about \$20,000 in his work on the Spanish mail steamer, Alfonso XII., which sank with \$500,000 of treasure off Port Cando. Lambert was one of the most courageous of divers. He once orept for a quarter of a mile through the flooded Severn tunnel to close a watertight door which had been left open by the panic-stricken workmen.-Boston Transcript.

RATIO NOT INCREASING

Dr. Carlos MacDonald, Alienist, Discusses Insanity.


London, Sept. 16 .- Dr. Carlo F. Mac-Donald, the alienist, talked today with correspondent in regard to recent statistics of the insane issued by the lunacy commissioners of England and Wales. Dr. MacDonald said:

"That there is a steady numerical increase in insanity both in the commissioners show that the increase of 237 per cent, whereas the estimated increase in the gen-Norton, 1; Bethlehem, 3; St. Paul, was only 77 per cent, an analysis of the report shows that the percentage of increase was only slight and with a lessening tendency.

"There are a number of factors generally overlooked which account in great part for the apparent increase in mental disease. Among these, one is the conception of insanity which is steadily widening deavored to conceal the existence of insane persons."

A cycle with only one wheel has been invented by Henry Tolcher, of Pretoria an employe of the Central South African Railways, who claims that the machine will cover between thirty and forty miles an hour on level ground.






