



BOY ON TRIAL FOR KILLING HIS MOTHER

Defence Will Try to Prove That He Was Insane.







TORONTO GLOBE SAYS BUY LONDON ELECTRIC

A Talk On the Value of Corpetition in Certain Cases.

The Toronto Globe says editorially: A great deal of nonsense is being talked about the value of competition in relation to public services. Competition is not good; it is wasteful in the extreme, when applied to such naturally monopolistic services as the supply of water, gas, or electric light or power. It means the duplication of plants and the destruction of millions of dollars' worth of invested capital. There is no greater evidence of financial shortsightedness than to see two rival water or gas or lighting services occupying the same territory.

In the distribution of the hydrcelectric power from Niagara the great initial blunder was Sir James Whitney's refusal to give the municipalities power to purchase compulsorily the plants of the private companies in the territory to be served. The Premier prides himself on his British instincts. Compulsory purchase would have been the British way. Instead of this the whole electric power project was launched on a competitive basis. The money the people of Toronto should have saved in their light and power bills will largely go into the fight that must be waged between the company and the public power service.

SHIPPERS WILL APPEAL TO RAILWAY COMMISSION

Cartage Rates to Factories Outside City Are Cause of Dissatisfaction.

The manufacturers outside the city limits will make an appeal to the Domimon ranway commission to settle the question of cartage rates. The manufactures interested are just a few varus beyond the limits, and the cartage companies have raised their rates for carrying their goods.

Ivey & Dromgole, barristers, have been instructed to prepare the case for the commission, and the Empire Manufacturing Company, the Sherlock-Manning Organ Company, the Dominion Omice and Store Fitting Company, the London Gas Power Company, the Keenleyside Oil Company, and Hourd & Co.

They are located along the interswitching line, or close to it, but this fact does not improve the situation much so far as the companies are concerned.

The complaints against the increase in rates have been numerous. A communication was sent to the city council and Publicity Agent Carruthers endeavore to adjust matters. He got in touch with the railway officials and others interested in the matter, but so far has been unable to secure a reduction.

"We do not want to take the matter up with the railway commission much preferring to settle direct with the companies interested," said Mr. T. A. Stevens, of the Empire Company. 

George is a perpetual surprise to those who comprise the theatre-going public. They marvel much at seeing him each recurring year, not knowing the secret of his never seeming a day older and as skittish and lively as when they first saw

George does not want it circulated. but as a matter of fact he was a cabin boy on the ship that brought Ponce de Leon to America. Ponce hunted in vain for the Fountain of Youth down around Florida, but never found it. It seems that Mr. de Leon grew tired after weary weeks and months spent in drinking out of every spring, rill, creek, river, and lake he came to, and so one hot, dusty day when some of his soldiers brought word to him that they had found a new spring that looked much like the Fountain of Youth, he said peevishly:

"O, pshaw, I'm tired of drinking all this bilge water you fellows find around here. Let George do it."

This is Sarcastic.

And George did, thereby not only giving George a long existence, but coining a phrase that has since grown popular.
