The leading grainmen here, however, assert that any damage which can arise from this sources will have little or no effect in causing a reduction of the yield. there is more or less rust, but no ap preciable harm has been felt in the

total yield. From nearly every marketing center come advices that the present condiion of the crop is almost ideal, and that a bumper crop is assured, always provided that early frosts are not experienced. In many cases the plant is exceedingly well grown, with the head well filled and the berry larger than usual. The rust has affected only the stalk and blade, and that only to a small extent.



#### Civic Jealousies.

The dispute between the city council and the Western Fair board as to the of the fair buildings is jealousies that occas crop up between different -jealousies in which no principle is

involved, which are usually over trifling matters, and which benefit nobody, while they sometimes result injuriously to the city. In this particular case it was little more than a tempest in a teapot. The city owns the fair buildings, but hands them to the fair board for the purposes of the fair. The city may be called the landlord, while the fair board is in the position of a tenant. The tenant wants some repairs, and asks the landlord to make them; and the landlord agrees to pay make the repairs-landlord or tenant? It is the right of the landlord to make any repr.rs for which he is going to pay. Jut it is no unusual thing for him to say to the tenant, "You get the work done, and I will pay for it.'

This was exactly the situation in

the case under consideration. The council passed a resolution to the effect that if the fair board shingled the building at a cost not to exceed \$1,200 the council would pay half. Any one would consider that resolution an authority to the board to go on and do the work up to the limit fixed. The board so thought, and promptly made a contract for less than the sum fixed. But as soon as the contract was let, the mayor discovered that it was an infringement of the rights of the council and raised such a disturbance that the board promptly canceled the contract, and left the matter in the hands of the council.
