YOUNG KENT FARMER **COURTS DEATH BY SUICIDE**

Sad Case at Kent Bridge—Blew his Head Off With Shot Gun-Said to be the Result of Unrequited

A very startling story comes from f Kent Bridge. Herman Raymond Allison, a young farmer, 22 years of age,

This unfortunate young man is a son of John Allison, of Kent Bridge, one of the best known and most highly respected gentlemen in Kent county. Herman resided on the Lindsay road, about two miles from Kent Bridge on a farm adjoining his father's. He ended his life with a shotgun, holding the muzzle to his right temple with both hands and pulling the trigger with a string attached to his foot. The top of his head was ompletely blown off, tearing away the eyes and breaking his nose and both jaws. Death must have been in-

This unfortunate affair happened at about four o'clock yesterday afteroon and no reason can be assigned for the rash deed, although it is a mmon rumor that there is a girl munity. in the case. He appeared to be in the

He was found by Wesley Wells, a neighbor, lying in a ditch with the shot-gun across his breast. The gun he used is one which he had formerly used for shooting rats. IN JAIL

Landed Sedepring Mon After Patient Trailing.

Government Inspector of Detectives John W. Murray is in the city in onnection with the Johnston arson case at Springfield, which comes on at the court house this week. The spector was at Dutton yesterday looking into the case of the mysterious death of a child there, and in which an open verdict was rendered. For some weeks past Mr. Murray has been tracking a couple of chaps who were estensibly selling bed springs in the towns and villages of Western Ontario, and who gave their name as Barber. The detective says while they were selling bed aprings they were aimply "spatting" places which they would later on burglarize. They are alleged to have broken into Brown's hardware store at Thames ville, and stolen among other things ome razors, which they artempted to sell to Frank Osier, who was five years ago. convicted here in St. Thomas, of robbery committed at Rodney, and sent to penitentiary, from which he was released last from which he was released ask March on ticket-of-leave. After the robbery Osier got across the line and fought extradition to the ut-most, but was brought back by Mr. Murray, from whom he attempted to escape and a violent tussle took place. Finally assistance came and

escape and a violent tussic took place. Finally assistance came and Osier was taken in a patrol wagon to jail. Osier now runs a barber shop at Mount Brydges, and there it was the "Barbers" tried to sell him the razors.

FIRE FIGHTING AT PEKIN. Chinese Methods are Ancient and

Pekin, June 10.—Some of the papers received from Europe speak of the final and definite refusal of China to yield to the Russian demands respectyield to the Russian demands respecting Manchuria, stating, in the face of such refusals, that Russia considers it prudent to retreat. Those capable of efficient in the retreat. Those capable of efficient in the retreat of Pekin this afternoon, whereby for the second time in three years the Board of Revenue buildings were destroyed. The resources of Pekin were exhausted in vain confusion, and the roaring flames were combatted by hundreds of men carrying banners and blocking all movement. There was a hideous clangor of gongs and tomtoms as at a South Sea Island ceremony. For extinguishing the flames the authorities depended upon water carried in old kerosene tins, and bean oil baskets, and the use of appliances dating back to the time of Rufus. Assistance was also given by some handpower engines dating back to the time of Waterloo, which squirted unavailing jets of dirty water. The flames were prevented from spreading towards the French hospital by the exertions of the foreign legation guards. ing Manchuria, stating, in the face of

AID FOR G. T. PACIFIC Guarantee of Bonds for Quebec-Wi nipeg Section.

Ottawa; June 10 .- While the Govern ment cannot be said to have as yet reached any decision in the matter of aid to the Grand Trunk Pacific, the idea is gaining ground that the assistance to be rendered will take the form of a guarantee of bonds at 3 per cent. up to \$20,000 a mile on the Quebec-Winnipeg section. In return for this, Ministerial supporters say, the Government will probably take a first lien on the railway, and there will be a stipulation for control by the Governor in Council or by the proposed Railway Commission of the freight rates to be charged. Sir Rivers Wilson and Mr. C. M. Hays are said to have arranged a conference with the Government to-morrow, with the intention presumably of endeavoring to learn what the Ministerial policy will be. While these two railway magnates may be able to glean some light regarding the course of action likely to be recommended to Parliament by the Ministers, it is doubtful whether any public announcement will be made until the bill for the granting of a charter has passed its third reading. The final passage of the bill is, of course, certain, although it will not be until after some further skirmishing in Committee of the Whole and upon the motion for third reading. form of a guarantee of bonds at 3

WILL PRINT THE EVIDENCE. Talk of Another Adjournment of the

Toronto, June to. — The Legis-lature made good progress yester-day wish a number of Government bills, but, as the supplementary estimates, railway resolutions, pulp agreements and the Gamey report are agreements and the Gamey reposite all stall to be dealt with, the prospects for a completition of the session this week are not so bright as they were. The municipal amendment set, embodying all the amendments to the municipal act, agreed to in the Municipal Committee evoked a great deal of Committee, evoked a great deal of discussion, and met with much opposition on both sides of the House dur-

tion on both sides of the House during the evening session.

During the discussion on the explanation of the statute law amendment bill in committee, Mr. Gamey made his first speech to the House on a matter outside his bribery charges.

The Premier indicated that the precedence for to-day would be private business, pulp resolutions and supply. The public business could be finished by Thursday. If the Gamey evidence was printed it would probably take ten days or so to get it out, and the House would have to adjourn. would have to adjourn.

Mr. Whitney did not think it would

The Premier then said they would undertake to print the evidence, if the Opposition would consent to use the typewritten copies for the purposes of the debate.

This proposal seemed fairly satisfactory, and the matter dropped.

Enterprise June 10.—Train No. S. Bay of Quinte Railway, running from Tweed to Deseronto, was ditched here yesterday by running into a spread frog in a switch. Six horse cars were also disabed, killing five horses. The baggage car coaches did not leave the track and no one was injured.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 10. A BADLY-MANAGED CASE.

The Globe says that Mr. Gamey's defenders "are industriously becloud-ing public opinion with violent attacks on the judges and high-pitched denunciation of the Government for all other offences in the calendar of political wrong-doing." This, it says, is being done to save Gamey from punishment and from the inevitable consequences of his crime. What punishment do the Globe and the Government contemplate? Mr. Ross says he will not move to expel Mr. Gamey from the House, because they do not want to make a martyr of him. Mr. Ross, therefore, seems to come under his time of late to phrase making-the Globe's condemnation. "To try to In arguing for an increased dayy he shield him from the punishment which outraged public opinion visits on his kind would be to share with him in the outrage he has committed, and not all the cuttlefish resources of those who make the attempt will save either him or them from swift and certain public condemnation." The difficulty is this: That the

people are still in doubt as to what

really occurred between Gamey and the Government; and that the judgment does not clear up this doubt. Partly this is due to the stupidity of Mr. Stratton's colleagues. They did not act as if they were either confident of his innocence, or as if they were willing to face a fair and impartial investigation. When Gamey's charges were made, the Premier, on the spur of the moment, announced that they would be investigated by a committee of the House. The House adjourned, satisfied by this assurance. The next morning the Globe said that although such charges were usually investigated by the committee on Privileges and Elections, a royal commission and Elections, a royal commission might be preferable. The next day the Premier's condescended to give to the Legislature the information instead of W. J. Layman, Hilliard St. to the Legislature the information he had evidently given to the Globe already, and said that the case would be investigated by a royal commission of judges. Mr. Whitney and his friends opposed this, holding Mr. Ross to his first assurance of investigation by a committee of the Legislature. In forcing this policy against a united opposition, the Government made a great blunder, and one that tended to embitter party spirit. If Mr. Gamey is really the "moral monster" that his enemies make out; he would have failed just as signally be-fore a committee as before the com-mission, and the opposition would have had no cause of complaint. The second great blunder committed

by Mr. Ross and his colleagues was his failure to allow Mr. Gamey or the opposition to name one of the judges. If we are to rely implicity on the ability and integrity of Chancellor Boyd and Chief Justice Falconbridge, why not rely on the ability and integrity of all, and allow the accuser to choose one? Had this been done. and had this very judgment been delivered by a court nominated by both parties, the opposition and Mr. Gamey would have had little or no cause of

Instead of this, the Government caused it to be announced in the Globe, before the Legislature had discussed the matter, that the judges would be Chancellor Boyd and Chief Justice Falconbridge. They seemed almost eager to make an insolent display of their power, and of their utter disregard of the wishes of one half of the Legislature. Having used at the inevitable result. Then, drawing the white cloth round himself and the skeleton, he laid the latter's fingers over his own and began to play. There was no hesitation in the slow, measured flow of sound which he and the skeleton conjured up. As the music swelled in a louder strain I closed my eyes, for there was something weird in that picture of man and skeleton seated at the plano, with the shadows of evening deepening around them and the ever swelling and ever softening music filling the air with mystery. And I knew I was lis-tening to a composition which would live forever.

The music ceased, and when I looked up the piano chair was empty, and on the floor lay Chopin's unconscious form, and beside him, smashed all to pieces, was the skeleton I prized so much. The great composer had swooned, but his march was found.

PIONEER DAYS.

Trials of Settlers at Guelph and in the County of Bruce—Down the Samgeen River in a Scow.

"Incidents of Pioneer Days at Guelph and in the County of Bruce—Lis the title of an interesting little volume by Mr. David Kennedy, sen. His father and mother having come from Scotland settled at Guelph in 1830, when he was two years of age. It had been surveyed only three years previously and had only a few log houses. After a short residence there his father selected a lot in the Paisley Block, near Guelph, and the homestead, which was called Craigmorriston, was his own home for 55 years. Among the incidents in connection with his father's settlement Mr. Kennedy menitions that the contractor for the house and each assistant were paid four shillings and a bottle of whiskey a day. While looking of, his father was struck by a falling tree, which broke his leg. They had to send all the way to Hamilton for Dr. MacKelcan, and owing to the delay the leg was crooked ever afterof Settlers at Guelph and in the

"Sometimes we were for weeks without bread and had to subsist on potatoes and turnips, and these were very often frozen during winter. were very often frozen during winter. were very often frozen during winter.

I can remember well seeing my mother putting the potatoes into cold water to draw the frost out of them before being cooked, and then we had neither meat, milk nor butter to

before being cooked, and then we had neither meat, milk nor butter to eat with thein.

"The labor of clearing the first acres of unbroken land was all performed by the settlers, when they subsisted entirely upon potatoes as a dist, baked and boiled time about, by way of change or variety, with sometimes a dish of greens made from cow tabbage or the tops of young turnips, added when in season. All this may seem strange when I tell you that the forests abounded with various kinds of game, and the creeks were full of speckled trout, yet it rarely happened that the settlers succeeded in capturing any deer. In 1851 he and his brother William decided to shift for themselves liam decided to shift for themselves in the valley of the Saugeen River, which they had heard was a remarkwhich they had heard was a remarkably rich mining country. After six days' traveling through unsurveyed forest with a wagon of supplies and a team of oxen, they reached the Saugeen above Walkerton. Here they built a scow made of deals sawn by themselves out of a green pine tree, with the intention of floating down the river to its mouth. Their hardships at this time were almost unendurable. It was the end of March. durable. It was the end of March durable. It was the end of March, and for two weeks they were compelled to remain there without shelter in inclement weather, with their feet and clothes wet all the time. Finally they started, and on the second day down the river reached the shanty of Mr. Simeon Orchard, founder of the Town of Paisley, and that night storned about these miles. der of the Town of Paisley, and that night stopped about three miles from the lake, near the present Village of Port Elgin. Not far from here they chose some land and built their shanty. Others following their example tried to float down the river but were not as successful. One party, in a scow, which consisted of four men, two women and five bolf.

four men, two women and five children, struck on a rock and partly sank. Their provisions were swept. off and they were compelled to stand in a couple of feet of key water for


in a couple of feet of icy water for over 24 hours before they were rescued and brought for shelter to a shanty. Among those who passed there in the following months were Mr. Vidal, now the Senator.

Their shanty was overrun by white mice, which gnawed their way into everything of wood. "My brother," writes Mr. Kennedy, "often caught them with his hands and killed them by the dozen while sitting at the table." The only place in which they could keep their provisions was table." The only place in which they could keep their provisions was an iron bake-kettle with close-fitting lids. They finally brought a cat from Sauthampton, but one day it upset a flatiron upon the kettle and smashed the cover, rendering it use-less, and their last condition was worse than the first. Another day he undertook to ferry across the riv-

he undertook to ferry across the river a man from Nova Scotia, who hesitated to trust himself upon the rait used for that purpose.

"He got down upon his knees on the raft," writes Mr. Kennedy, "and commenced to pray. I pushed the raft off into the stream and I noticed that it was sinking very much deeper in the water than usual, and I told him that I thought he would be better standing up, for he was getting wet, but he answered me by saying that he preferred to remain upon his knees, and he continued in this position, with his eyes closed, earnestly engaged in prayer, although his end of the raft was sunkabout a foot under the water, and though his end of the raft was sunk about a foot under the water, and when we reached dry land, although wet nearly up to his waist from kneeling, he thanked me, and said that he would never run the risk of crossing that river again, for rather than do so he would travel by land all the way to Goderich and get back home by that way."

That fall occurred the wreck of a schooner laden with flour and other supplies required by the inhabitants of Southampton for the winter. "You may imagine the consterna-



The Algouquins occupied a considera-ble section of this country before they were asked to move on, and some of the verbal heirlooms they left us are: Chipmunk, hickory, hominy, menha-den, moccasin, moose, mugwump, mus-quash, pemmican, persimmon, papoose, pone, porgy, possum, powwow, rac-coon, samp, skunk, squash, squaw, succotash, Tammany, tautog, terrapin, toboggan, tomahawk, totem, wigwam and woodchuck.

The Throat and Tonsils. A simple gargle for a sore throat may be made by adding fifteen drops of refined carbolic acid to a quart of water. Remember to shake thorough ly before using-otherwise it will be useless—and gargle four or five times a day. In case of swollen tonsils a tea-spoonful of powdered tannin dissolved in a tumbler of water forms an excel-lent gargle, which should be used every two hours. A gargle of perman-ganate of potash, not too strong, is also excellent for use in cases of mild sore throat.

THIS SUMMER'S WORK.

Exploration and Investigation Under the Direction of the Bureau of Mines. Plans for the season's work of the Bureau of Mines have been matured, and are being put into opeartion. Prof. Coleman has already gone to the Sudbury niesel field, of which he is continuing the examination begun last year, his work this season being directed specially to the northern nickel range curving in a northwesterly direction from Lake Wahnapitae. It is expected that the result of the work will be to define the "ange and work will be to define the "ange and perhaps also determine its relations to the northern belt. He will also investigate the geology and mineralogy of the Hutton iron deposis and the extension of the iron formation to the northwest. He is being as-sisted by Mr. M T. Culbert. Prof. Miller, Provincial Geologist,

has in view, along with other work, an investigation into the limestone deposits of Ontario. The use of limestone, not only for lime and building purposes, but also for making cement, the refining of beet sugar, the manufacture of calcium carbide, sulphite pulp, etc., etc., are every year becoming more extended, and the deposits of limestone in the Province are not only numerous, but varied in quality, and it is believed that material suitable for all these and other uses can without difficulty be obtained in Ontario. Maris and clay for economic uses will also en-gage Mr. Miller's attention.

gage Mr. Miller's attention.

The great importance of the fuel question has led the Durcau of Mines to take a special interest in peat, lignite and other kinds of fuel found in Ontario. A bulletin has just been issued describing the most modern and improved methods of preparing peat for fuel, and also how to burn it to advantage. To determine definitely the question of how to burn it to advantage. To determine definitely the question of the existence in Northern Ontario of workable deposits of lignite, the occurrence of which in many places is already known, an expedition has been dispatched to the Hudson's Bay slope under charge of Mr. J. M. Bell, M.A., with Dr. W. A. Parks as assistant. The starting point of the party is Missanable on the C. P. R., and it is expected the party will remain in the field until about the 1st of October. They will visit the Missanable, Abitibi and other branches of the Moose River, and will also keep an eye open for iron ores, gypsum beds and other deposits of mineral known to occur in the Northeral known to occur in the North

ern regions.

The summer mining classes which have been a feature of the Bureau's work for soveral years, will this year be under the charge of Dr. W. L. Goodwin, Director of the School of Mining, Kingston, and Mr. J. G. McMillan, B.A.Sc., Fellow in Mining Engineering, School of Practical Science, Toronto. The following is the approximate program; Black Donald Graphite Mine, Brougham township, May 26; Olden Zinc Minc, Long Lake P.O., June 3; Belmont Gold Mine, Cordova P.O., June 11; Copper Cliff, June 20; Massey Copper Mine, Massey Station, June 29; Big Master Gold Mine, Gold Rock, July 9; Elizabeth Gold Mine, Port Arthur, July 20; Tip Top Copper Mine, July 28; Helen Iron Mine, Aug. 8; Rock Lake Copper Mine, Aug. 19. These classes were very successful last year, and have done not a lttle in providing working miners, prospectors and other with a rudimentary knowledge of work for several years, will this year working miners, prospectors and oth ers with a rudimentary knowledge of

mineralogy and chemistry.

The demand for agricultural lands is causing the Department of Crown Lands to lay out some 40 townships in that part of the clay belt south-west of Lake Abitibi, just over the Height of Land. Advantage is being taken of this work to have the coun try examined for its mineralogical possibilities. A small party with a commetent reologist at the head will be placed in the field, and it is expected that much information will be acquired in this way which will be of value in intelligently opening up and attling the country.

Carp Not a Popular Food Fish.

As a food fish, carp will never be come popular, for no cook can give any taste to his flesh, even though he be stewed in red wine, after the German method. But he gives nour-ishment, and the poor of the cities consume many a hundredweight of carp in the winter time. The trou-ble is that where he lives there is no room for other fish. His is such an room for other fish. His is such an insatiable appetite that the others are left to starve. Lake Simcoe, once full of gamey black bass, is becoming more and more given up to the German interloper. A miller on one of the streams flowing into the lake stocked his pond with carp, believing that they would keep down the weeds, and would afford him a change from a meat diet. The plan the weeds, and would afford him a change from a meat diet. The plan worked well until a spring freshet came along and swept the whole teeming pondful down into Lake Simcoe. That was a few years ago, and already the many hundreds of acres of wild rice that used to feed the wild ducks and bass are becoming diminished. The care loves and the wild ducks and bass are becoming diminished. The carp loves nothing better than the tender rootlets of the rice, and he destroys hundreds of them in a week. The Fishery Commissioners have had many a complaint from earnest sportsmen, but it seems to be impossible to do anything to eradicate the pest.

Caught a Salt Water Salmon. Caught a Salt Water Salmon.

Some seven or eight years ago the Dominion Fisheries Department deposited a quantity of Atlantic salmon fry in some of the rivers running into Lakes Superior and Huron. About three years later, The Wiarton Echo is informed, a fine specimen was caught on the Saugeen River. With manly pride, the lucky angler sent his catch to the authorities at Ottawa for which he received a ten-dollar bill as a prize. In so far as The Echo is aware, this was the only one caught up to last week as The Echo is aware, this was the only one caught up to last week when an Indian succeeded in landing, at the power house near Southampton, another fine specimen. The strangest part is that this latest catch resembles the Pacific salmon more closely than it does the Atlantic species,



London, June 10. - A crowded Parliament almost breathless with excitement, was kept in a high state of dements of the situation. The Liberal Opposition was solidly arrayed in support of a free trade budget Gov-

support of a free trade budget Government, which had raised the protectionist issue as the election cry for the next general election. Behind the Liberals were their former home rule ailies, Mr. Redmond and the Nationalista, fantastically leagned together, net in a union of hearts, but in a union of pockets, to protect the Government which had carried, the Irish land bill to its second reading. The Unionist party, with an overwhelming majority, was rene assunder by factions and lends, and kept from defeating itself only by coalition with the opposite benches, and by the infining of the Speaker, whichs virtually gagged everybody and prevented with Michael Hicks, Beach and other wranglers, from saying what these whole House, except the Primer Minister, wanted to hear. The gag was worn so loosely that winged words flew out here and there with Homeric passion, and caused uproar among the factforia, not withstanding the Speaker's warning that everybody must stick to the budget.

Mr. Henry Chaplin, Conservative member for the Sleaford division of Lincolnshire, moved an amendment to the budget bill declaring that the removal of the tax on grain "involves a needless and injurious disturbance of trade, and a serious loss of evenue, without substantial relief for the consumer," and that if any taxes are removed it should be those levied on tea and other articles of general consumption. He varied his denunciation of the Prime Minister and the Chancellor of the Exchequer with the laudation of Mr. Chamberlain. Sir Michael Hicks-Beach and Mr. Ritchie in their turn poached on the

Michael Hicks-Beach and Mr. Ritchie in their turn poached on the Colonial Secretary's preserves, and condemned the policies which one considered would do more to disunite than unite the empire, and the other denounced as detrimental to the mother country and the colonies.

The absurdities of the situation, in which the Opposition benches were the stronghold of the defence, demoralized the Government, and the Ministerialists, conducting a noisy sham fight against their own leaders, imparted to an extraordinary session the aspects of a Gilbertian opera. Yet there was a tragic element. The smiling Prime Minister, who assumed a jocular air, was discredited by his lack, of strength, and represented and ridiculed by some of the staunchest of his own supporters, and Mr. Chamberlain, who returned a few months ago from South Africa, like a victorious pro-Consul, was taunted with being a renegging free trader and the destroyer of the Unionist party.
