"I Believe Not."

Among the various inquiries that arose at a prayer-meeting lately was one like this, "Supposing a person to whom you are talking says he 'does not believe in the Bible,'-what are you going to do with him?" The talk had been about "bringing in the 'highwaymon,'" and various questions had been propounded of how to reply to doubts and inquiries from these replied that in this case there was no common ground between the parties, and there was simply nothing to do but leave the man to God's own

Now I never could "speak in meetin' " but I havo had a peculiar experience, and I will tell it, for the sake of just such people as ask questions like the above. A woman who had long been a scoptic, and whose mind was brilliant, was made to go through deep waters of trouble, largely brought on by her own williams. Sue was rebollious and unsoftened until she came under the influence of a saintly soul who bore heavy trials with screne faith.

The non-Christian woman was impressed; and her own troubles weighing her down almost to despair, she one day wrote to me, asking "what she must do to be saved," distinctly telling me she wanted no stereotyped answer about "believing on the Lord Jesus Christ," for she knew that formula; and what she wanted to know was simply how she could get help to bear her troubles, for she could not do it alone.

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

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

The following is an extract from a private letter published in the same paper, which will tell its own story. Docs it not stir our pity and arouse us up to more earnest endeaver:—
Two weeks ago we took a girl into our home with the hope of saving her from evil company and helping her to grow the company and helping her R-good-Christian woman. Sho is thirteen years old, a member of the church, but with no chance for Christian growth in her home. The family is wretchedly poor. The father is dead, the mother is sick with consumption. There are two younger children, and the old grandfather and grandmother in the house. The task of cleaning her up is no easy one, I assure you, and will take time. All Japanese women and girls oil their hair with a gummy kind of oil, to make it stiff and glossy. They have it dressed once in a week or so, then lie with the neck across a block at night to avoid rumpling it. The oil soils the neck and ears and clothes and makes a soft place for vermin, which all Japanese have. The girl, in view of coming to us, had tried ner best to clean her head and clothes. The day she came I examined her thoroughly, subjected her to the bath, 12 and thought she might do, but a week later was compelled to put her through a similar process. The one old, thin, many-pieced, ragged, dirty under-garmont she wore here I threw away from the first, and gave her new ones. All her clothes must go the same road. She begged to take them home for her little sister. With several washings her head promises better things, though it will take time to rid her entirely of the occupants. 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
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
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
