-The great conl strike at Cardiff, Wales, is but a memory. At a recent mecting the strikers confirmed the action of their committee in agrecing to a resumption of work, the company having acceded to the demands of the strikers. The men resmmed work on Mionday last.
-Advices from Victoria, B.C., state that the British Columbia Jegislature, by a majority of one, has passed the Kettle River Railway bill. This bill was defcated by the Parliament of Canada on three oceasions. The promoters mere determined, however, and the read will now be constructed. It will bring Republic ore to the smelter at Giand Torks.
-The Premier and Colonial Treasurer of New Zenland, in delivering his Budget statement recently, announced a record balance, amounting to $E 605,000$. The revemue, he stated, nmounted to $£ 5,700,000$, and the expenditure to $£ 5,140-$ 000 , leaving a surplus of $\varepsilon 560,000$, exelusive of $£ 45,000$ from the previous year. All heads of revemes had exceeded the extimates: Customs by $£ 127.500$, vailways by \& $£ 46,000$, stamp by £61,200, and territorial revenue by £24,200. The estimated total revenue was $£ 5,249,000$ and the actual receipts were $£ 5,580,000$. The expenditure was estimated at $£ 5,203$, 006, and had amounted to $£ 5,140,000$. The railway receipts had exceeded the expenditure by $£ 12,000$. The expendifire on wnblic worles out of the loan fund amounted to nearle $£ 1,000,000$, leaving a balance of $£ 140,000$. There was also E 700,000 of the loan authorized last session yet availabie. Penny postage within and without the colony would be established on Tamuary 1 next. New. Zealand would he the first colons in Anstralasin to have universal pemy postage The concession would mobnhly resolt in a loss of eso,00n per anmum. The Minister of Railwars had already announced eoncessions in freights and nassenger tickets equal to ex 70,000 a year. The Treasurer therefore congratolater the colony on being able to introdnce such a mensure as penny postage with only a trifling net loss of reventue.
-The statement of revenue for port of Montreal, from opening of navigation to September 1 , shows a deficieney, as compared with '0n. due in part to the diversion of shipping through the requirements of the South African service. The amounts are as follows:

changed. We should like an analogous step to be taken by the City Council by their inviting suggestions from civil engineers, electriciens, and others as to the armingements desirable to be made in this city in the local street ear service. Due consideration would have to be given to the changes coming over the poulation, not only as to their localities but to their aeguisition of new tastes and handits.

It is manifest to observers that in several respects the people of: Montreal have molergone, and are still undergoing; alterations in their tastes and habits in regaril to the loeality of their habitations, and their desire to move about more freely, ecomomically and expeditionsly over the island on which they reside. Up to less than ten years ngo the the vast bulk of Montreaters only knew the hamlets between the eity limits and the river forming the island boundary ly seeng ramshackle busses coming in or going out, daily from and to those rural settlements. Such places as Outremont, Cote des Neiges, Cartierville, Sionlt an Recollet, Back River, Bout de l'Tsle, with many other places were as unkiown as Timbuctoo on China to ninely-five per cent. of the people of this city. Even citizens who had carriages did not explore the suburl)s, beyond a drive around the momentain. When the system col electric cars was first introdnced it was not forescen how it would develop into a railway service extending. over the whole island, as well as the eity. Fard the developments of recent years been anticipated, and if an engineer gifted with some proseience haid been'instructed te lay out a plan for a comprehensive electric service to mect the demands of the future, there would have heen. almost certainly, an electric ear service established monder. one management whose regular routes would have embraced roads leading to the prineipal settlements, as well
as to attractive spots in the suburbs along the picturesque river which "empties into the St. Lawrence at Bout de lisle. There was, unfortunately, no sign of foresight as to the coming demand for catended facilties of communication between the contre and outlying parts of the Island. This blindness has characterized railway building since its inception, the worst defects of which were shown in England, where railways were built apparently In avoid opportumities for traffic, like the old Midland, for instance, from Derby to Leeds, which left every town on its course several miles distant from the track.

The clectric car system in Montreal was the heir of the horse cars routes, with all their shortcomings, and their managerial traditions, which were bised on the iden, that the proper policy of a piblic company is to alienate the good will of the public by treating their convenience and comfort; with sovereign contempt. Por some time the new system was handicapped by those who sympathized with the old traditions. Changes of mamagement and of organization after a time took place. A spirit of enterprise appenred where obdurate eonservatism had reigned. Those who cane into control of the street car service studied the neods of the public; sought to meet their eonveniences and comfort by more rapid transit, more regular service, and transfers. IThe eflect in developing traffic was to increase it to an nlmost embarrassing extent. The demand for travelling acenmmodation came more rapidly than it eould be met by enlarged motive power; additional cars; and new routes. The flood-tide of passenger waffe has not yet rencherl high water mark, for erery advance in accommodalion is at once met with a demand for more.

In strect car travelling, as in other things, "IThe appetite grows with what it feeds upon." An enomous

- tuaffe has been developed by the habit of taking car trips for pleasure and for frosh air; a class of business quite new and growing, which the eompany enters to with profit. In this wo have signs of a faste having become established amongst the great mass of our people, which is exactly the same as that indulged in by those who keep a carriage and horses for pleasure driving puposes. The clectric car is the people's baronele, or family carriage. Ti has done invaluable selvice to the henth of the community. During the heated term the cars every summer evening are filled with children, aven babes in arms, to whom the fresh, cool current of air gives an increased elamee of life.

Mamly out of this new taste there cane a demand for the extension of the ear service across the ishand to cool, athetive resorts on the hanks of the river. I'racks for electric ears were laid fo Cartierville through Outremont, to the Back River, and to Bont de litsle. The traffic on these three suburban lines during the summer is very henvy and even in winter there is local traffic enongh to pay working expenses. Needless to sely, the convenience to the residents along the line of these ronds, and at each teminus, is highly appreciated, as is the pleasure and the bemefit they afind to our eitizens who take trips over them for dresh air. We are confictent that, hat those who are now in eontrol of the ciby street ratway been at all aware how enormous would be the development of the mere pleasure traftic on their routes, and how this growing taste would lead to a demand tor suburban lines, they would have met the new conditions by building electric railways on the Ishand as a part of their city railway system. They, however, had a very heavy, and absorbing task on hand in converting the horse car service into an
electric car service. This transformation involved large outlays of capital, as well as an entire revolution in the management, the equipment, the staff, the plant, the rcutes, and the methods of the Street Railway Company. The efficient carrying out of these changes heavily taxed the abilities, energies and thoughts of the directors, engineers and managers. It was a gigantic undertaking which was accomplished with remarkable skill. While this work was going on there were other minds busily engraged in studying out a system of suburban electric lines. 'To fret over spilled milk is folly:

## . . . "What is without remedy Should be without regard."

Rut we may saty, as it hears on the present situation, that. it would have added greatly to the public convenience; would have cheapened the cost of running suburhan lines; would have enabled the service to have been rendered at much lower rates of fare; had the whole electric car lines on the island of Montreal been built and operated under one management. It is too obvious to need explanation or argument that passengers to Cartierville, Back River, Bout de l'Isle, would find it very much more agreeable to get aboard a car in the city and run to their destination and make the return trip, without having to malke connections with cars running on a disconnected, independent line of railway.

Without claiming any prophetic gift, but simply looking at the present conditions in the light of long experjence, and observation of analogous circumstances, we are satisfied that, ere long, the trip from all parts of this city to the fresh air resorts and villages in the suburbs will be continuons, without change of cars, or the necessity for paying two fares. How this will be arranged we do not pretend to foresee, but we advise all concerned to look the inevitable squarely in the face, and prepare for the change of system which the public convenience imperatively demanis. To fight over this matter would be insanity, there is really nothing to fight over, for the prizes certain to he won by the improvement we foreshadow, would be rich enough to gratify every interest affectect. The situation calls for negotiation, not a contest. Out of negotiation, if conducted under proper auspices, would come an arrangement which, while conserving, indeed promoting, every rested interest, would materially onlarge the facilitics of tho public in visiting all parts of the island of Montreal for husiness, or plensure, or health. It should not he overlooked that the chief vested and permanent interest involved in the dispme over suburban traffic, is the interest of the public, from whose pockets comes every cent of the revenne of the electric car railways. We have the highest anthority for stating, that a service could be kept, up direct from any part of the city to the suburban resorts for less than half the present double fares, and that the cheaper traffic would be highly profitable. We stand by what we have already said in regard to the difficulties of, and objections to two lines enmpeting within the city, as our strects are too narrow and already the citizens, so far as more city routes are concerned, are. now admirably accommodated. But, suburban traffic will have to he provided for more conven-- iently by some arrangement for through routes being esiahlished across the Island.

Owing to the conflict of powers and interests there is now $n$ deadlock which will have to be broken. sooner or later. The wretchedly defective service for reaching the wharves is a scandal to the city. To visitors it is a
subject for anger, ridicule and sarcasm, and to citizens one for shame and objurgation. There is urgent necessity for passenger and freight transportation facilities being provided for some four or five miles along the front of the city. The Street Railway Co. is not responsible for the miserably incouvenient, and wholly inadequate accommodation now provided for passengers reaching the wharves. We say "accommodation," but the accommodation is conspicuous by its absence. In this fenture the port of Moutreal is away behind the times. The situation seems to have arisen from a desire to keep the public from approaching the vessels, and to make access to the city from vessels as unpleasant, and as dangerous as possible. An official enquiry should be made to discover the most feasible plan of bringing the harbour, both for passsengers and freight, into closer and more facile truch with the sources from which both classes of traffic are supplied. For the authorities of a national port to he nagging over such insignificant questions as have stood in the way regarding transportation facilities to and from the wharves, is evidence that, while talking much about Montreal being the great national port, they haye, not becrum to realize or conceive what equipments and accommodation must be proviled to render this city worthy the dignity to which it aspires; on the establishment of which its luture development depends.

## MUNICIPAL MATYIERS.

Compared with the past two or three years there is a marked improvement in the condition of the streets of the city this year. Ihe staff of the Roads Department, under the intelligent direction of the City Surveyor, Mr. st. George, are doing all that could be expected, with the limited means at their disposal, to overcome the results of the neglect of the streets in the past, and to put them into a tolerably presentable shape. That more might be done in this respect goes without saying. However, the improvement is marked and the citizens are gratelul tor even small attentions.
Atter patiently sulfering from the recklessuess of former administrations of the city's alfairs, there is a hopeful promise of a better state of things in the future. The full benefit of the reforms will be derived from the operations of the new charter, when the new linancial features will be given full force tor the first time next year. There will then be a larger revenue at the disposal of the Comncil and more money must be placed at the disposal of the Roads Department for cleaning and maintaining the road ways, as well as providing sidewalks that will be safe to pass over both by day and night,which is not now the case.
'Io get the full benefit of this it will be necessary to have a thorough reconstruction of the Roads Committee. That Committee, from the very nature of the functions it was framed to perform, comes directly in contact with duties that touch the comforts and convenience of the citizens, more intimately than does the work of any other committee of the City Council. Above all others, it should be composed of Aldermen who are disinterested and capable of holding broad views with regard to the essential requirements of the city as a whole. No fairminded man can read the reports in the daily papers of the proceedings of the Roads Committee without coming to the conclusion that there is a total lack of patriotic civic intelligence in nearly the whole of that body. The prevailing, the controlling ideas seem to inspire a game
of sectional grab.... Who can get the most patronage for positions that will be a benefit to the invidiual members is the chief question. Some nembers of that Committee, as was the Chairman, were elected as reformers, who were expected to introduce a better condition of things, but so far they have most lamentably failed to fulfil ex.pectations, and their pre-election promises have been ig-nored-as in other quarters.

Interference with responsible officials is most reprehensible. On the face of it, it looks as if there was dead set made to force the City Surveyor out of otlice by making it too uncomfortable a position for a man of honour and abjility. There is no justification for this, Mrr. St. George is only human and no one will pretend that sometimes he may not have made mistakes, but taken all through it would be difficult to find a more capable and faithful officer to fill his place.

An effort has been made to place the blame for the irregulaxity in widening Notre Dame street east in the Hochelaga Ward, which has been the cause of so much litigation and expense, as well as ill-feeling, the end of which has not yet been reached. No doubt there was irregularity in that case that caunot be justified or supported. As a matter of fact, it resulted from the loose mamer in which the Roads Committee had done its business for - many years under the old regime. It appears to have been customary in those days for inportant matters to be ordered on individual authority without regard to legality or even being placed on recorl. The officials were compelled to carry out these individual orders, or pay the penalty. It is not to the credit of the Aldermen who gave these orders to place the blame on the shoulders of the officials, who were working under a bad system for which they were not responsible. There is this to be said about that particular widening. The obstruction of the main entrance into the city from the east was an insufferable inconvenience to the heavy traffic owing to the tiweks of the Strect Railway being on so marrow portion of the street. It is not possible to imagine, however, that any oue in the position of the City Surveyor would have taken possession of that land and widened the street, however much needed, unless he had a sufficient authority for what was regarded as an arbitrary act.

The cause of all the trouble was the neglect of the Roads Committee of that day to go through all the formalities and obtain authority from the City Council to ubtain the necessary land by arrangement or expropriations. The Notre Dame street widening is an improvement that was, and is, necessary. Jven should the former line be restared the annoyance to traffic will be so great that the city will be forced, by this circumstance, to do the work over again under the operation of the new expropriation law.

## THE PUBI,IC HEALITH.

The attention of the Provincial. Board of Health is now directed very prudently to the danger of plague said to have got a foothold in Glasgow, which may possibly be brought to this country by ships from that jort. " Attention to this risk is highly commondable, and no doubt the sieps that may be taken will be judicious and satisfactory without being an onerous interference with trade.
In this connection we desire to call the attention of the active and intelligent president of the Provincial Board of Health who has just returned from Paris, where he has
been attending the Simitary Convention, to the danger to the public: health, arising from the aceumblation of disense bredimg matter disedarged from the large eity sewer apmesitr He ('ustoms louse into the hambons, where it remains stagmab thore being no cument to cary it away. Shomblany uf the ships lionn alnomad bring over the germs of that dreal disense they could not find a better place in rhich to propagate than the spot in prestion, which is alremily a danger amd menase to the poblice healda; irrespectwe of ontside importations.
'The eity hath mothorifies appear to be mathing to take any notice ol this, or at all events their movement to probect the publie health is invisible. In such a cass Ho l'movinctal boad or Healla, in the fultiment al its cialies, is lomand to step in and it is mby reasomble to capeed that it will do its duly in the premises.

## MUNICIPAL DUCK PONDS ON MOUNTI ROYAJ.

We join in the protest against artificial "fakes"一save the word!--being constructed at the base of Mount Royal. The schenie is anomed to be, the excavation of tro areas at the rear of Fleteher's Field to the depth of from two to three feet wherein water will be run from the reservoir. These sheets of water would be each just large cnough for a skating rink in the winter, a purpose to which they would be devoted. What the use of these shallow ponds would be in the Summer and Fall we fail to see, and are not informed by the promoters: Tro call these "lakes" is too absurd, they would each be merely good sized duck ponds; juvenile baths; or, when frozen i, wer, rinks for hockey players, skaters, etc. As the water would be shallow and stagnaut, surrounded by bushes, it would be an ideal breeding place for mosquitoes. If a rushing, shallow stream of water could be diverted through a chanmel in that locality we should lie glad to see this done, it would be a very refreshing place on a sul-
try day. But, a lig pond of tepid water, motionless and stale, not over cleath. inevitahly charged with slimy vegetatbe growths, would become the receptacle of all the rubhish arablable for small boysto stity into the poob, not to mention, dead cats, dogs, and other unfortunates. As to the shallowness of the proposed ponds being an assurance of satety to children, it would be their danger. If the ponds were made 10 leet deep parents would keen their children at at safe distance, and youngsters would nut venture in to bathe. But a big pond from two to three teet deep would be an irresistible attraction to the sutall boy, and ginl, too, whom the water wonld be just deep enough to drown. As to such places being any attraction to visitors to Moment Royal, the notion must have been expressed as a joke, though it is too foolish to be even humorous. 'The promoter says, that montains and maks are constintly found together. Quite so, but mountains and duck ponds are not usually associated. Leave Mount hoyal alone, save to keep its roads in good comblition, ought to be the demand of our citizens. IThere we persons anonget is whese jdens, if carried ont would turn the noblest municipal park in the world into a suburban beer garden.

## LABOUR DAY.

The ammal holiday at the opening of the Fall sensom, or Autumn was this year the occasion on which the sum displayed his extreme powers this season. The temperafure over a large portion of Canada, was so tomit as to render locomotion, or any form or physical exercise, or even mental labour, intolerable. Yet in this eity over 5,000 men formed a processsion, mainly chal in back suits, top hats, and other items of the wiform nopoter for processional purposes, which must have mate the atleged holiday indecd, a Sabour Day. If this country, where muthing done or said, or inferred to make a distinction of elasses is resented, it seems ineonsistenit with this morbid sensitiveness for those who compose the ar-

tisan class, the representatives of skilled labuur, to delibcialuly appropriate one day in each year as a national Looliday which is especially consecrated to the maintenance of this class distinction. The entire population of Gandida is made up of tabourus, yet those who work the longest hours, at the most exhausting labours, are deciddelly nut those who processionize on Labour Day. Many inded could not altord the expense ineured by those who paraded the streets on Mllonday last. Une section of the procession in this city was at agreeable sight as it showed a large body of men very well clothed, each one having a new hat bought for the occasion. Some labourers dechared themselves by a placard to be "on strike." 'Iheir woll-to-do appearance did not excite much sympathy. We could not but look athead at what: will be the siluation next winter. How will those stand who were in the parade when the pinch comes? We hegrudge no holidays to any man, they have their economic uses and value. But the fuss nad feathers, the bands, the thags, ind paraphermalia of a street parade of a delss of our citizens on a national holichay, is in direct condlict; with the principles of those who make this show, and the cost of it might be spent to very much better advantage to themselves and their familics.

## GIVING ATD AND COMTPORIL TO THE ENENY.

Ithe above words specify a crime for which numbers of misguided, or uaturally base minded, men have been shot or hanged. Such punishment emineatly fitted the crime. When we consider that haman lives are at stake in all war movements, and that "giving aid to the enemy" is almost certain to prolong the slaughter and extend its range, we must realize how infamous is this crime. It
is nothing short of murder, the murder of some of the criminal's felluw comentrymen, as well as those with whom they are in conflict. The war in South Africa. in all probability would have been arerted, certainly its term would have been shortened, had not President Kiruger received "aid and conifort" from Mr. Henry: Labouchere, M.P., Mr. J. E. Ellis M.P., and Dr. Chark, M.P. Upon the heads of these three men rests the responsibility for he slaughter of hundreds of British troops, and of as many Boers. On 2nd and tith August, 1899, which was two montlis before the 11th October, when the Boer ultimatum expired ${ }_{n}$ Mr. Labouchere wrote letters giving inLwmation to President Kruger respecting the alleged policy or the Liberal party in England. The information sent to the Boer chieftain was eminenlty qualified and apparently intended to give "aid and comfort" to that arch-enemy of England. Mr." Labouchcre ridiculed the Colonial Secretary with whom Kruger was negotiating, and he suggested a course for Kruger to take which would, as he said, "give Joe another fall." The Joe thus sneered at and conspired against by a member of Parliament, was Her Majesty's Minister, the Honble. Joseph Chamberlain, M.P., Secretary for the Colouies! Mr. Kruger might well stiflen his back, and harden his heart like a Dutch Pharoah, when he was receiving such proofs of sympathy and assurances of help from members of the British Parliament. Mr. Labouchere led Mr. Kruger to believe that Lord Salisbury and Mr. Chamberlain were merely talking "vague bluster." He also gave him a pusitive assurance and pledge that the Liberal party would oppose war. This wis rank treason, it was far more definite and pronounced and wicked than the crimes of poor ignorant wretches who for a bribe have given "aid and comfort to the eneny" for which they were deservedly shot or hung.

But Dr. Clark, M.P., goes even deeper into crime. He actually adrised. Mr. Kruger before the war broke out, on 29th September, 1699, to "seize the passes," that is, he recommended the Boer President to make an armed raid into a British Colony and by force to scize the defensive positions held by the British troops and colonists! If Dr. Clark is tried for treason, as he wught to be, his letters to Mr. Kruger would be overwhelming proof of guilt. Compare the conduct of a momber of Parliament urging an enemy to scize the preses in a British possession to that of the rehels in Ireland, who, in this century, have suffered so heavily for their imprudent and seditious speeches. The Davitts, Duffys, O'Briens, and men of tirat stamp were at any mate insplred by love of comentry, but Labonchere, Clark and Ellis, who gave "aid and comfort" to Kruger, who encomraged him to go to war with England, were indeed acting directly against their country, were indeed acting as traitors.

This age is, howerer, so far gone in sentimentansm of the bread and butter, effeminate kind, that a padded lath has been substituted for the sword of justice. Tt is, howaver, poor consolation to those who have given their huslands, brothers or soms, as a sacrifice to the Eropire, and those brave soldiers who have heen injured for life hy Doer bulllets, to refleot, that while Bitish hlood was being prured out in defending Brilish intereste in South Afries, there were men in Engtand giving "aid and comfort to the chemy," without rmning risk of punishment for so infamons a crime! Tf Talonchere, Clark. and Elis ane not pumishorl for criminal association with the chief officer of a State with which England was at war it will he a great historic scanden. Tyuch law will spring up in England 'f the authorities ignore eriminals because they happen to be members of Papliament, or otherwise socially distinguished.

## THE HEA'I OF AUGUS'l.

A week ago to-day there came to an end the hottest month experienced in Chnada in living memory. The scientific gentlemen who issue the moteorological reports will, no doubt, publish figures showing that the whole population is under a delusion as to the heat of August. We can explain why their registrations of temperature differ from general experience so widely. Il arises from these officials being so cool as to affect their local atmosphere. The average temperature of August in this city, aecording to tables published, is 66 above zero, or 34 above frost, that is, in the shade. Day after day for certainly three-fourthe of the month the temperature between sun-rise and sum-set has ranged from "55 to 88 degrees. A private register kept in this city, at 6 a.m., 12 noon, and 6 p.m. daily throughout August, in a very open place, north aspect, shows the average day temperature to have heen 7s degrees. We had a dip of 32 degrees this month, in a few hours, when, as a breezo was howing, it seemed as though we had been plunged into mid-winter. The great moisture prevalent aggravated the discomfort. But, though our citizens have growled at the sun being so anxious to show its power when it "shines full perfection," the city has been full of visitors from the States who have actunally declared a heat which we regarded intolerable. to be mite an agrecable relicf from the torrid. roasting temperature nrevailing in Amorican cities. The effect, however, of an musmally hot August has been to emalle some erops to recover from the excessive soaking they got in Tuly. The three sumwer monthe of 1900 will be memoralile for their cecentririties and extremes. Though, the untimely cold and incessant rains of mid-summer did injuy in the North West, the harvest all round this year will be a good average.


## SECURING DEBTS BY LITE INSURANCE.

A plan of protecting debts by insuring the life of a debtor, has for some time been in operation in Sondon, Ding. A firm in the melropolis which does an immense trade on the instalment plan, has systematized this method. In every ense, unless other sceurity is offered, the buyer of goods to be paid for by weekly sums, has his life insured, upon the amount of which the creditor has a lien. The plan is especially atapted to the case of soldiers who are liable to be ordered on foreign serviee, or sailors who are called away on long voyages. An American paper speales of this plan having been adopted by an Iudiana merchant, who, having sustaned some heavy losses by the denth of customers, ndapted the scheme of insuring the lives of persons that deal with him for $\$ 1,-$ 000. He pays the premium until the debt is discharged, when the chstomer has the privilege of contimuing the insurance by assuming its cost. The amount paid by the merchant is a lien on the policy, and is deducted when the insuranco is paid. Shonld the enstomer die before the debt to the merchant is paid up, the balarice due, with interest and the amount of promiums paid, is dedueted, and the residue paid over to the beneficinry. The scheme has risks as woll as advantages. The purehaser may ignore demands for payment of the store debl, and the procedings to secure it may become compliented by the Hen on the assurance policy, the premium on which will lave also to be reeovered by suit. Before a storekeeper enters upon a scheme of this lind le ought to take legal advice.

## MISUSE OF "SHALL" AND "WILL."

The misuse of "shall" and "will" is not what a distinguished Inglish author declared, "an infallible sign of illiteracy," but, it is cvidence of carelessness, or, obstinate refusal to acquire a correct habit of using these auxiliary verbs. In a College Calendar before us there are too many blunders made in the use of "shall". and "will," as well as, in one page, a mixing of tenses which ought not to appear in any official document of a seat of learning. We read in a chapter on "Conduct of Examinations," the following sentence: "The plea of aceident or forgetfulness shall not be received." Surely even the writer must admit that the correct expression of this rule would be, "T he plea of accident or forgetfulness will not be received." Then we rend: "Oandidates shall write their answers," insteacl of "must write," etc., or, "will be required to write," etc. $\Lambda$ fter these and other regulations have been expressed in the future tense, in its mandatory form of "shall," we read: "Candidates are not permitted to leave their places," thas the future tense and present tense are mixed up in one paragraph. Such errors, ganchorics, and inelegancies ought to be cleared ont of a College Calendar before being given to the public.

The best course for the Allies to pursue now that they have captured Pekin would probably be to leave that city in the hands of some tolerably decent Chinese noble, and betake themselves with the rescued Legations back to the coast. The retreat would rescue the Allies from a most embarrassing position. The flight of the Court leaves them with no Government to negotiate with, and what are they to do if they remain in Pekin? They cannot make a treaty. They cannot set up a Pretender. They camot hope to govern China by themselves without a foree which they do not possess, and governing Pekin by itself is of no manner of servica to their interests. Tastly, they will resume very nearly their old position as regards trade, and postpone all the exceedingly difficult questions among themselves which, if the war is allowed to continue; are certain to arise, and which may lead to conflicts indefinitely more important and more dangerous than any Chinese War.
-The regular course after a war is to make a treaty, and the diplomatists of all the combries will be in a fume and fidget until the trenty has been mate. They will insist that, as the Empress-Dowagor, cannot be removed from power, she must be acknowledged, and either asked to return to Pekin, or, accompanied hy the diplomatists to her new capital, in the hope of persuading her to enter upon some endurable agreement. She must, at least, apologise for besieging the Legations, or all international etiquettes will be set at nought. They are, in fact, saying this already even though they are compelled to aban-
don the convenient fiction that the Empress was coerced by' a Revolutionary party in successful insurrection. In the second place, there is danger lest the Chinese should mistake a wise withdrawal for a withdrawal from fear, and, under that illusion, commence that gencral massacre of white men which has from the first been the socret dread of all who knew China: And, lastly, it is nearly certain that three of the strongest Powers concemed will not consent to simple and immedinte withdrawal. The Russian Government has a separate quarrel with China. The Tsar is very peaceful, but he rules a military Empire, and he can neither put up with the defiance he has received nor neglect a fair opportunity of obtaining territory essential to his permanent policy in the Far Enst. It is most unlikely, also, that the German Emperor will consent to retire meroly because the Legations have been saved. It is quite possible that he is acting on some secret agreement with the Tsar, whom he has this weok extolled in a manner umusual among Sovereigns as a mighty potentate whose hand reaches far into $\Lambda$ sia, and to whose initiative he attributes the appointment of Count von Waldersee, hut oven if he is acting alone, he is evidently intent upon some considernble enterprise as yet scarcely commenced. Nor is at all certain that. Jrpan will consent. - The policy of that fiery State, whons strength for land waifare has clearly heen underrated, is still obscure, but her people have great ambitions, and . mill be most unwilling to retire without fulfilling any one of them. Frunce may retire, indeed, it is said, has
alrealdy retired in order to wateh Thonking, where there are symptoms of restlessness. Anerica is inclined to retire also, but Phghant camot, without appearing to sanction ambitions which she hopes at least to kecp within moderale bounds.

We anticipate, therefore, Hat the Allied Army will remain in Pekin while dipomatists slowly pursue their tande, anil that a ilesultory and unsatisfactory war will he wageal for months in Northern Chinal. 'Ihis is side to be the oftieially expressed opinion of the American General, and flough we deeply regret it, we are foreed to acknowledge that it is in accerd with all the probabilities. Burope, in liact, is not agreed, and in order to maintain apparent harmony she is compelled to go on with an enterprise which to finay ol her statesmen will appear to have no sullicient olvjeet. That is to say, she is compelled to go on seeking a treaty which there are no apparent means of compelling the other party to conede. The transfer of the Chinese capital has altered all these conditions. II. the Court had remained at Pokin to be eaptured all would have been casy, but as it has gone to a western province 800 miles away, the means of compulsion do not exist. Unless, indeed-which is nemrly impossible-the German Pmperor entertains the infen of hunting the EmpressDowager aeross Chima, and so at hast extracting his treaty at the sword's point. 'That wonld he an enterprise of? magnitude, and would amply jusility the prediction attriInted to Comet von Waldersee, that he should be a long time in China; but it is not, we confess, one which we should consider prohable . Still, it that is set aside, how will the trealy which diphomatists consider indispensable ever be extractel?

With business much lighter it woks as though the market might go still lower, Cables are reported 5 s lower in all foreign markets. Dairy: olterings are lighter and prices are held better. Western dairy is bringing 1 re to 18 se for choicest with medium, $161 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ to $171 / \mathrm{c}$.
Cements, Erc.-Arrivals for week ending Sept. 4 were (iz.750 fire brieks, and 3,500 barrels Belgian cement. l'rade is guieter and contined to small lots at nominal figures.

Cheese:- The market continues to show considerable firmness and prices wre higher. The export demand is active for all oflerings. Finest Western brings 11 e to $111 / 4 \mathrm{c}$; earlier makes, 10 c to $101 / 4 \mathrm{c}$. The outlook is promis-

Eng and a steady market is Inoked for. Chemeals, Oils, Ero.-Local quotativus are unchanged. The inturveniug holiday broke into the week, which aiged by wh undesirible degree of heat has caused a quietness in trade. Vils are steady at last week's quotations. I'urpentine is again lower by 2 c , being now b0e per gallon. A Manchester, Eng., circular of 25th ult., says of chemicals: there is a little less activity in some brunches, but the general vuaume of trade cannot reasonably be called unsatisfiactory. The future is now becoming the matter of greut concturn, with the season at which next year's contracts are generally mada being close at hand, and with the high cost of many articles, the fuel question, the state of aftairs abroad, and the general trade outlook, the situation will be a perplesing one fiar both manulacturers and consumeris. In the heavy alkali branch, bleaching powder is more plentiful and pricus have eased further. Caustic soda continues in active demand, and is firm. Chlorates of potash and soda are steady, and the latter is somewhat scarce on spot. Exports of alkali and neaching powder show a further decrease during July, although for seren months ended July 31st last, as compared with the onrresponding period of 1800, they still show increases respectively of 11,086 tons or $: \pm 124,100$, and 1,711 tons or $\pm 41,505$. In the tap products department benzoles have improved in price, and are firm with a tair amount of business passing at higher rates. Solvent naphtha uso is irmor, consumers being very busy and talking laige quantities. Creosute is still in a weak condition, with plenty oftering and lew buyers. Crude carbolic is steady but has little enquiry; crystal carbolic is moving slowiy; liquid is easier. Sulphate of ammonia nas fiallen uring the month and is barcly steady. Acetates of lime are steauy, and rates of freight from America show some hardening tendency. Acetate of soda is much firmer for forward delivery. Ghocemes.-The firmness in sugars is funy maintained. In fact one Montreal retinery advanced its prices on gramulated sc per 100 lbs., early in the week, but the others did not follow and quotations ure unchanged. U.S. refiners are short of raw sugars and can ors are short of ree higher prices in the near future. A prominent firm reports: Receipts of raws for the week were much more than expected and larger than the meltings, hence there is no reduction in stocks, and 80,000 tons still remain for use during the next six weeks, plus what may be received from week to week. Only one refinery, the Mc Cahan, of Philadelphia, has thus far been obliged to close for lack of supplics. Others must follow if receipts do not keep up, but the American Su-
gar hefining Company, having the fulrest supplies, reaps advantage from the cosing of independents. Hew centrifugals and a few muscovadoes could be bought this weel The raising of prices would make no difterence, as there are no sugars for sale, hence the quotations remain nominally unchanged, for centrilugals as well as muscovadoes, of whicha in few more may come on the market soon, but only in driblets, for the next six weeks. In view of the abnormal condibisa of the raw sugar market, it is not surprising that relined is firm and in increased demand, with all brokers recommending purchases for fear of further advances, when raws reach the greatest scarcity and production is curtailed, as it must be belore new crop sugurs reach the market in quantity.
