The Solemn Initiation Ceremonies.

"Sir John Macdonald and Dr. Tupper are to initiated into the secrets of the Conservative Workingmen's Association to-morrow evening."—London Free Press, Monday.

In accordance with the above announcement, GRIP sent his invisible reporter to the lodge room of the Secret Order of Conservative Workingmen on Tuesday evening, thinking that a short account of the cere-mony of initiation might be acceptable to the Conservative Party and the country at large. We do not youch for the credibility of any portion the country at large.
