THE GOOSEBERRY GRUB.—The following destroyer of this pest is recommended by an English gooseberry grower:—When our gooseberry bushes have been attacked by the caterpillar, we have freed them from those terrible pests by using the following mixture, viz: Three parts of powdered quicklime to one of hen manure thoroughly mixed, and applied early in the morning in the centre of the bush where the branches start from. We use about a teaspoonful to each, which falls down the stem and dresses the roots. The mixture should be applied on a quiet day; it not only destroys the caterpillar, but nourishes the bush.
