Our Local Government.

When the conservative government at Ottawa was appealing to the people in 1896, the present premier of our local government, Hon. George H. Murray, made this public statement:

'We have a government in power which has held office for nearly eighteen years, so long, indeed, that they have got it into their heads that they own the country. I believe in the sound doctrine that this country belongs to the people of this country, and that it is high time that this government was taught this fact.'

'Long holding of office has brought about its inevitable consequence—corruption and jobbery in every branch of the public service.'

To-day the government of which Mr. Murray is the Premier, is asking to be returned to power after twenty-eight years in office, and Mr. Murray should stick to his principles as stated in 1896. The policy of our local government, because of inexperience, has been wasteful and halting, and it has produced a systematic manipulation of the public revenues for partisan purposes, and the consequent neglect of vital public interests. This splendid province, with its wealth of utilities, has been allowed to lag behind other communities and other provinces in the race for commercial and industrial supremacy. When this government came into power the public debt of the province was comparatively nil, whereas, according to their own published accounts, the debt in 1909 has reached the almost incredible figure of \$1,000,457.59, with an annual interest account of \$96,047, and interest upon temporary loans amounting to \$15,872. And Attorney General MacLean has announced that several millions more are to be borrowed and expended upon roads.

Those who are familiar with the political history of this province will remember how the present leaders shouted while in opposition that a public debt was a terrible and crushing thing. These gentlemen have always preached one thing and practiced another. When once they are in power they with one accord enter upon a mad race of public debt and expenditure. Extravagance never fails to take the place of the promised retrenchment and reform.

In 1882, when these enterprising gentlemen came into power, there was no permanent debt, and they proclaimed on the platform and in the press their convictions that the administration of the provincial finances could, nevertheless, be greatly improved by them if they were given the chance. They were given the opportunity, and almost immediately they commenced to borrow money. The borrowing which was then begun has been continued at a fast and increasing pace ever since.

As a consequence, \$1,019 was taken from the revenue of the province in 1909, to pay interest to money lenders and to chartered banks. The results of the rule of this provincial government is to be found in the facts that our population is at a standstill, farm lands are depreciating, valuable crown lands are depleted, school sections are without schools and many others are manned by poorly paid teachers.

Large amounts of public money are improperly expended in maintaining an expensive and vicious patronage system. There is a constantly diminishing grant for municipalities and roads. Valuable natural water powers and coal lands are being alienated from public interests, and a crushing burden of debt and interest is saddled upon the people for all time to come.

The unprogressive, parasitic and wasteful record of our provincial government deserves the condemnation of the people of this province. Our province has great natural wealth in soil, sea, forests, climate, and in geographical position, and if our government could be divorced from the narrow partisan bigotry that has for years been its chief characteristic, we might have a future of prosperity. The future welfare of our province urgently demands a clean sweep of the government at Halifax.

The Canadian Magazine.

One of the most descriptive articles of the season appears in The Canadian Magazine for October under the title 'Calgary: A Study in Optimism.' The author is Miss Jane Pratt, a writer whose name is not as yet very generally known. This article is well worth reading. While it gives some impression of Calgary in a commercial way, its chief charm is in the naive manner in which an insight is given into the daily life and spirit of the people of this city of the foothills. A more serious article is contributed by Stuart Jenkins, and entitled 'Is the Old Roman Race Still Dominant?' in which the author claims for the people of Great Britain a perpetuation of the Roman type that once dominated the whole world. 'Da-masce the Temptress' is the title of a fine travel article by A. B. Carman, and 'The Community of Municipal Policy' is a well-thought-out consideration of local government. Frank H. Newton gives a good account of the new domain in Northern Ontario, in which he predicts an important future for that part of the province. The last act of Arthur Stanger's fascinating drama 'The Lion' appears in this number, as well as several other good articles and a number of absorbing short stories and sketches.

Town Council.

The Finance Committee reported the amount received during September \$970.21 with disbursements \$602.49. The debit bank balance on Sept. 30th was \$3709.64.

The auditors presented balance-sheet showing the financial condition of the town.

A Good Idea.

The 1909 Year Book of the Department of Agriculture of the United States discusses the question of how to keep young men on the farms. It advocates the organization of boys clubs to study the best methods of producing the staple farm products of their neighborhood. It suggests county superintendents and rural teachers as the mentors; the parents to furnish the land and the implements; merchants and business men to furnish prices; and local papers the publicity. The idea, it seems to us, is well worth consideration. Agriculture has suffered, probably, more than any other human occupation, from a lack of interest in it. It has been placed in the eyes of young men upon a wrong footing; and they have been led to consider it the lowest of occupations, whereas it is one of the highest and most useful in the world.

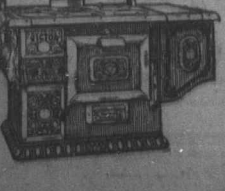
