LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

The Nova Scotia Steel Company's stock went to 9 3/8 Friday, the advance in two days being 22 points.

Messrs Crowell Bros. big hardware establishment in Halifax was gutted by fire on Saturday morning.

The Militia Department at Ottawa, is asking for the report of the war service of all the Canadian officers for publication.

JOHN P. Bull died at Toronto a few days ago, aged 80 years. He was the man who introduced Clarke Wallace to public life.

The Elder Dempster Liner Lake Michigan, arrived at St. John on Sunday from the Type with two cases of Smallpox on board.

REV. FATHER MCGUGAN, calls for tenders to complete the interior of the new church at Tracadie. His advertisement will be found in this issue.

The ferry waiting room at Southport has been badly damaged by some malicious persons. A heavy penalty is in store for the guilty parties if found out.

Cot. Francis Parker, the noted educationalist, who visited this city and addressed the Teacher's association last September is dead. His death took place at Pass Christian, Mich., on the 2nd inst., where he had gone in search of health.

Forty qualified lady teachers from Canada have been asked to go to South Africa to teach the Boer children in the concentration camps. The period of service is a year and a free passage both ways with a salary of £100. Quite a number of lady teachers from this Province have volunteered their services.

MR. CHARLES OWEN of Georgetown, who retired about six years ago from the captaincy of the Garrison Artillery Company there, has been recommended for an officers' decoration for long service. He has been about 40 years in the service and will be the first officer on the Island to receive the above honor.—Patriot.

SEVERAL improvements have recently been made in the Legislative Assembly room. The canopy overhanging the Speaker's desk has been removed and new curtains provided. The woodwork has been painted in white and gold. The coat of arms has been taken from the old legislative council, repainted and gilded and placed over the canopy. The whole effect is strikingly effective, the white and gold contrasting pleasingly with the crimson curtains.

The New Brunswick Legislature was opened last Thursday with the usual ceremonies by Governor Snowball. The speech referred to the prosperous condition of the Province in its various branches of trade, especially to the continued development of the dairy industries. Among the new measures promised are compulsory vaccination of children, the equitable distribution of estates of insolvent debtors, the importation of horses, forest preservation, and a workmen's compensation Act.

The price for P. E. I. lobsters the coming season will not be so high as last year. One cause is that there is a large quantity of last year's goods on hand yet, their quality not being satisfactory. The packers will have to exercise more care in putting up their goods, if they want to retain their reputation and good prices. Some contracts have already been entered into at prices about 75 cents per case below that of last year, but as far as we can learn no foreign ones have yet been made. There will be few packers in the business on the Island this season, especially with the small factories, which have not proved profitable.—Ex.

At a large and enthusiastic meeting of the citizens of Georgetown on Friday, at which the Hon. D. Gordon acted as chairman, the advisability of petitioning the Government to grant incorporation to the town was ably discussed by prominent townsmen. It was shown to the meeting that under present conditions, the town receives for local improvements but a small fraction of the amount paid in to the Provincial Treasury in taxes. It was decided almost unanimously that a bill for incorporation be prepared and introduced at the approaching session of the Legislative Assembly, and a petition to that end was circulated and largely signed.

REV. P. C. GAUTHIER was the preacher of the Lenten Sermon in St. Dunstan's Cathedral on Sunday evening last. The subject of his discourse was the Blessed Eucharist and his text was from the sixth chapter of the Gospel according to St. John, 52nd verse: "If any man eat of this bread, he shall live forever, and the bread that I give you is my flesh for the Salvation of the world." The Rev. preacher first pointed out that a covenant existed between God and man immediately after the creation which continued while man remained faithful to his Creator. But man by his fall broke this covenant and forfeited all its privileges. Our dear Lord and Redeemer reinstated man in the friendship of God and established between him and his Creator a means of communion. This means of communion is the Blessed Eucharist. No dogma of our holy religion is more solidly established than that of the Real Presence. The Evangelists and St. Paul set this forth in most emphatic and incontrovertible language. The words of our Lord in instituting the Blessed Eucharist could be taken in no other than their literal sense. Had we not understood them; for then some of them said: "This saying is hard and who can bear it?" But our dear Lord did not in any way modify or explain his words; but repeated them. Thereupon some of those present went away and walked no more with Him. Jesus seeing this turned to the twelve and asked them would they, too, go. But Simon Peter answered Him saying, "Lord to whom shall we go? Thou hast the words of eternal life. Would our dear Lord have permitted all this if his words were intended to be understood figuratively and if one word of explanation would have overcome the difficulty? From these and many other texts of Scripture the Rev. preacher proved his thesis. In conclusion he exhorted his hearers to avail themselves of the treasure of grace available by frequent reception of the Blessed Eucharist. We should lead lives worthy of the spiritual treasures thus placed at our disposal and thus merit eternal happiness in the life to come.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

The Nova Scotia Steel Company has decided to locate their blast furnace at Sydney Mines.

At the regular meeting of the City Council on Monday evening it was decided that the police be given full power to assist in the enforcement of the Prohibitory Law in Charlottetown.

The "Seaside" colored hockey champions of Halifax who were to play the Rangers of this city in the rink here last evening sent on word that they could not come. "A case of showing the 'white' feather."

The program of the entertainment to be given in the Opera House on St. Patrick's night by the Benevolent Irish Society will be found in this issue. It is a good one and anyone that reads it can scarcely refrain from attendance. We bespeak an overflowing house on Monday night.

The devotions of the "Forty Hours" were brought to a close in the Cathedral on Friday morning last. The Solemn Mass of Reparation was celebrated by Rev. A. P. McLellan, St. Andrew's, assisted by Rev. R. J. Gillis as deacon and Rev. Dr. Curran as sub-deacon while Rev. Dr. Morrison directed the ceremonies. After Mass the Blessed Sacrament was borne in solemn procession round the Church, his Lordship the Bishop carrying the monstrance.

The members of St. Joseph's Sodality do not intend celebrating the Festival of Saint Joseph with the usual pomp and ceremonies this year, as the feast comes in Passion-tide, but instead, will have a Triduum of prayers preparatory to the 19th inst. commencing on Sunday next at 3.30 p. m. All the members of the Society are respectfully invited to attend. The Solemnity of the Feast will be celebrated on the 20th prox., after which the annual circular will be issued.

By a fire which occurred at the residence of Arthur Bouchard, in the village of McLean Cove, early Sunday morning, ten lives were lost. The fire was discovered by a servant girl, who gave the alarm. Bouchard jumped from an upper window of the dwelling, a wooden one, which was soon in flames. Mrs. Bouchard and nine children, six boys and three girls were burned to death. Bouchard rose about 5 o'clock, lit the fire in the kitchen and returned to bed. He was awakened later by the alarm.

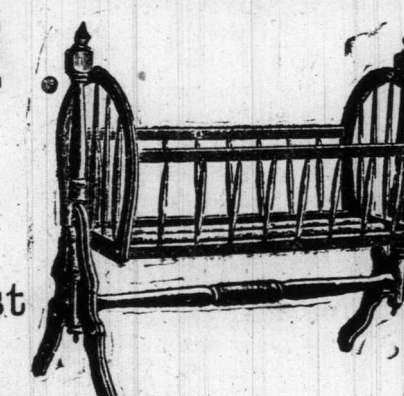
