MINISTER ASKS INVESTIGATION

Hon. Mr. Oliver Unequivocally Demands Investigations in Opposition Press—The Respectful Debate Continues.

Ottawa, May 2.—Hon. Frank Oliver in the Commons today gave an unequivocal denial to the insinuations which have been hawked round in the Opposition press concerning his recommendation to the government in reference to the transfer of the rights of the C.N.R. to certain lands from Manitoba to Saskatchewan.

"I made the recommendation," said the minister amid applause. "In particular, I believe to be sound public policy and due regard to the public interest. No specific charge has been made but I desire that the fullest opportunity shall be given to any who desire to make such a charge. I would therefore ask that a special committee be appointed to hear and thoroughly enquire into any charge made in connection with the transaction."

In making his request for a committee, Mr. Oliver read a statement which appeared in the Toronto World on Friday last to the effect that subsequent to the passage of an order-in-council transferring the right of the C.N.R. to certain lands from Manitoba to Saskatchewan a sum had been placed to Mr. Oliver's credit in the Imperial Bank at Edmonton. He said that there was no direct charge that there was any connection between these circumstances, but the insinuation was that a committee be named so that those who desired to make charges would have an opportunity of presenting them.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier reiterated his absolute confidence in his minister and friend and gave notice of motion for a committee of five members to conduct the investigation asked for. Farmers' Bank Again.

The remainder of the afternoon was occupied with a discussion of a motion by Houghton Lennox (South Simcoe) concerning Hon. Mr. Fielding and the treasury board in connection with the Farmers' Bank. It was defeated on a division by a governing majority of 44. At the evening sitting a bill to incorporate the Grain Growers Grain Company was taken out for the day and the reciprocity debate was continued by Geo. Taylor (Quebec) and Sir Charles Tupper (New Brunswick). Both spoke in opposition to the bill. Dr. Schaffner said that his constituents were disturbed on account of the lack of information as to the effect of the agreement.

During the course of Mr. Taylor's speech the chairman ruled that he could not place on Hansard the letter addressed by Sir Charles Tupper to Mr. Fielding the other day. He stated that a definite precedent had been established when it had been decided that a statement by the Toronto Globe regarding the proposed sections made in the House had been ruled out under the rule that a statement by an outsider concerning the proceedings of members was not permissible.

THE OPPOSITION VANISHES TO BILL

Balfour Refuses to Vote Against the Preamble of the Measure—Ministerialists Are Enthusiastic—In Place of Promised Hundreds of Amendments, Only Few Offered.

London, May 3.—The parliament bill, known as the "Bill to give effect to the recommendations of the Committee of Enquiry into the Affairs of the House of Lords," today passed the committee stage in the House of Commons without amendments and scenes of great enthusiasm.

The refusal of Mr. Balfour today of the opposition to vote against the preamble to the veto bill, removed any danger that might have been apprehended from the result of the vote. The bill, which is expected to occupy only two or three days next week, is expected to be passed by the House of Commons today, being present for the first time since his physical breakdown. He introduced the long proposed plan of state insurance against sickness and invalidity.

The chancellor divided his proposition in two parts, one dealing with the sickness and the other with unemployment. By the provisions of the measure every worker whose annual earnings fall below the income tax level of 160 pounds sterling will be compulsorily insured against illness so as to assure him the receipt of five shillings (£1.20) per week during his incapacity. Toward this the worker would contribute about one-half, the same being deducted from his wages, while the balance would be paid jointly by his employers and the state.

Mr. Lloyd George estimated that the expenditure required to carry out the plan would be £1,000,000,000 in 1912-13, rising to £1,500,000,000 in 1915-16. The Camorrista seem to have accomplished more than they intended by the "exposure" made through the Toronto Telegram. If they have not put themselves in the shoes of men who have falsified accounts, and hence within the scope of the criminal code, they have grazed the offence by a hair's breadth.

Had the photograph been genuine it could only have been secured by burglary, or by procuring the assistance of a dishonest employee of the bank.

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COMPETITION FOR MONTREAL ROUTE

All May Space and a Great Part of That of June Has Already Been Booked by Canadian Steamship Lines for American Corn.

Montreal, May 2.—An extraordinary situation in the shipping trade at the port of Montreal is brought out by the inquiries as to the effect upon the St. Lawrence route of the big cut in grain rates from Buffalo to the United States seaboard, which cut has been sanctioned by the Interstate railway commission.

It is admitted by Montreal transportation men that this cut will have a considerable effect upon the movement of Canadian wheat, but shippers here have unconsciously adopted a much more effective method of driving the wheat traffic from the port of Montreal. The steamship lines operating from Montreal have booked all their May space for American corn.

But even if Canadian shipping lines were seeking to retain the Canadian wheat traffic entirely, it is admitted that a considerable quantity would even then be diverted to New York and Boston as the result of the new rate of 4 cents per bushel from Buffalo to United States Atlantic ports.

When unfriendly critics condemn the clammy efforts which were made to decrease a public rate, it is necessary for those who have the utmost faith in Mr. Oliver to waste no time in pointing out that even if it may well be in mind the fact that though it was the hand of Mr. Oliver that directed the dagger, it was the mind of someone higher up which inspired it.

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THRILLING SCENES AT CAMORRA TRIAL

Former Mayor of New York is a Witness for the Prosecution—Is Regarded With Mingled Interest—Many Demonstrations With Difficulty Stopped.

Verona, Italy, May 2.—Two features made the Camorrista trial today of more than ordinary interest. These were the presence of George H. McClellan, former mayor of New York, in whose term of office Lieut. Petrosino arrested Enrico Alfano, the alleged head of the Camorra force, to which Petrosino is believed to have paid the penalty of his life and the confrontation of Abbatemangia, the informer, by Corrado Sorino, whom he accused of being one of the actual assassins of Cucciollo.

The scenes of disorder were even more marked than usual, the prisoners in the case interrupting the witness incessantly and shouting curses on his head. But though it has the sitting continued and Abbatemangia told again the story of the Camorra and details of the crime, Mr. McClellan, who appeared to be an object of interest to the crowd, was not permitted to speak.

While Abbatemangia repeated the details of the murder of Cucciollo, Sorino stood before him, and at times he seemed to be shouting out words about to spring at each other until carabinieri were placed as a guard between them.

Through the morning session was a stormy one, but in the afternoon several times a violent scene was prevented only by the intervention of guards. Sorino donned himself with a knife, and pointed out contradictions in the statements of the informer.

With reference to the evidence that he had received a stab in the hand and a phony witness, Sorino declared that he carried Sorino, but he finger left scissors, nor Cucciollo's knife, and that the wound had been dressed at a pharmacy.

Abbatemangia testified as to the date followed by Sorino after the murder of Cucciollo's wife and Sorino shouted "You insinuate that I had a cab to carry off the stolen goods."

Washington, D.C., May 2.—Several tentative drafts of the proposed arbitration treaty between the United States and Great Britain were discussed today by President Taft and his cabinet.
